



## **Council Notification - Scope of Works**

We wish to advise that Wollongong City Council is receiving a referral via the NSW Planning Portal. Please provide any of Council's comments via the NSW Planning Portal.

The proposal is considered 'development without consent' under the *State Environmental Planning Policy (Housing) 2021.* Homes NSW is seeking feedback from Council for consideration before deciding whether the development should proceed. Homes NSW will notify neighbours separately.

The notification period of 21 days commences when Homes NSW (Land and Housing Corporation) has completed the submission through NSW Planning Portal.

Property: 5-9 Alexander Street, Fairy Meadow Lot 125, 126 and 127 of DP 234877
Proposal: Consolidation of 3 lots into 1 lot, tree removal, and construction a 3 storey Residential Flat Building comprising 21 dwellings (9 x 1-bedroom and 12 x 2-bedroom units), 17 parking spaces and landscaping.
