Labor is promising to build a multi-purpose school hall at Sutherland Public School if it wins the March 25 state election.

Deputy State Opposition Leader and spokeswoman on education, Prue Car made the commitment with Labor candidate for Heathcote, Maryanne Stuart on Wednesday.

They said the school currently doesn't have a school hall, and the 340 students are forced to go offsite for assemblies or large indoor events.

The promised hall project will include new toilets and canteen facilities.

Ms Car said the project would be completed within the first term of a Minns Labor Government, allowing whole-of-school assemblies on site, as well as an indoor sport area during poor weather.

"The Sutherland Public School community have gone without a proper school hall for too long," she said.

Ms Car said Labor's schools policy also includes:

- New co-located preschools, with 100 new public preschools and 50 new and expanded preschools at Catholic and Independent schools.
- Converting 10,000 casual teachers to permanent positions to reduce the reliance on temporary teachers.
- · Cutting administration hours for teachers by five hours per week.
- Banning the use of mobile phones in all NSW public schools to reduce distraction, cyberbullying and improve education outcomes.
- Ending the failed overseas recruitment program and redirecting resources towards recruiting NSW teaching students into schools.
- Expanding co-ed school access for all families so every parent has the choice of where to send their children.
- Labor's Growth Areas Schools Plan, which will deliver new and upgraded schools in growing areas across New South Wales.

THE state budget provides continuing funding for major infrastructure in St George, with modest sums for some new initiatives.

However, the Opposition accused the government of failing the region, with promised funding to help rebuild Carss Park pool a noticeable omission

Big ticket items include an allocation of \$1.5 billion this year towards the \$3.1 billion cost of the M6 Stage 1 tollway between Arncliffe and Kogarah.

A further \$653 billion has been allocated towards the \$2.6 billion Sydney Gateway link from WestConnex to Sydney Airport.
The final stage of the re-

building of St George Hospital, which will bring together a range of ambulatory, outpatient and community health services, has received \$294 million in funding to-wards the \$411 million cost.

Parents' concerns that a new school hall to be built at Sutherland Public School will not fit all pupils and staff will be "incorporated as part of design works", says a spokesperson for Minister for Education and Early Learning Prue Car.

A statement was released ahead of a scheduled meeting today between Ms Car and Education Department infrastructure officials.

Ms Car has yet to confirm a 2023 election promise that the hall will allow the entire school to be accommodated.

"The NSW Labor Government is fulfilling its election commitment to deliver a new multipurpose school hall for Sutherland Public School," the spokesperson said.

"The multi-million hall will be delivered by the NSW Labor Government in its first term, after the Liberals and Nationals failed to deliver for the Sutherland Public School community for 12 years.

"Indicative plans were recently shared with the P&C, and their feedback will be incorporated as part of the design works for the new school hall.

"The NSW Labor Government is delivering record school infrastructure investment and an historic wage increase for teachers.

"The Liberals and Nationals have continually opposed the wage increases for all of NSW public school teachers, including the 1876 teachers in the Sutherland Shire.

"We are committed to addressing the school infrastructure backlog left after 12 years of neglect by the Liberals and Nationals, lifting student outcomes, and restoring respect for our valued teacher workforce as part of our long-term plan to repair public education in NSW."

Deputy Premier and Education Minister Prue Car has finally assured parents a new hall to be built at Sutherland Public School will be large enough to cater for whole-of-school assemblies.

After more than a week of uncertainty and statements that lacked a clear undertaking, Ms Car issued a statement on Friday afternoon confirming the election promise she made in February 2023.

"The NSW Government is committed to working with Sutherland Public School on a layout for the new school hall that can facilitate school functions, including accommodating all students and teachers for whole-of-school assemblies," Ms Car said.

"A new hall that is fit for purpose is long overdue and we look forward to the delivery of the hall as soon as possible, and by no later than Term 1, 2027.

"Our kids deserve nothing less than what they were promised."

Opposition Leader Mark Speakman had earlier accused the government of "hiding behind weasel words, instead of giving a clear commitment to honour the election promise."

Mr Speakman added, "And, they still won't explain how they can get a hall for 340 students for \$4 million?"

The Opposition showed support for the school community on Wednesday morning.

DEPUTY Premier and Education Minister Prue Car says a promised new hall at Sutherland Public School will be large enough to fit all students and teachers.

Ms Car said the govern-ment was committed to working with the school "on a layout that can facilitate school functions, including accommodating all students and teachers for whole-ofschool assemblies".

Heathcote MP Maryanne Stuart said the hall "will be fit for purpose-large enough for whole of school assemblies, students and staff".

"With regards to space to play sport, the hall will have basketball court surfacing basketbail court surfacing to enable indoor sports," Ms Stuart said. "It's planned to include the canteen and tol-let facilities."

P&C president Meryl Remedios welcomed the assur-ances, adding, "We appreci-ate the advocacy of our local member, Maryanne Stuart and the Opposition".

Mark Speakman had earlier claimed the government was "hiding behind weasel words", instead of confirming its 2023 election pledge.
