The following matters were taken into consideration in making this decision:

- the relevant matters listed in section 4.15 of the Act and the additional matters listed in the statutory context section of the Department's Assessment Report;
- the prescribed matters under the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021;
- the objects of the Act;
- all information submitted with the development application and during the assessment and information considered in the Department's Assessment Report;
- the findings and recommendations in the Department's Assessment Report; and
- the views of the community about the project (see Attachment 1).

The findings and recommendations set out in the Department's Assessment Report were accepted and adopted as the reasons for making this decision.

The key reasons for granting consent to the development application are as follows:

- the project is permissible with development consent under the State Environmental Planning Policy (Precincts Regional) 2021 and is consistent with NSW Government policies including the South East and Tableland Regional Plan 2036 aim to support and increase visitation to the NSW ski resorts.
- the impacts on the community and the environment can be appropriately minimised, managed or offset to an
  acceptable level, in accordance with applicable NSW Government policies and standards. The consent
  authority has imposed conditions relating to construction standards, environmental considerations, vegetation
  management and post construction certification;
- · no issues were raised by the community during exhibition of the proposal; and
- weighing all relevant considerations, the project is in the public interest.

### Attachment 1 - Consideration of Community Views

The Department's Community Participation Plan, November 2019, prepared in accordance with Schedule 1 of the Act requires applications of development consent to be exhibited for a period of fourteen (14) days. However, applications under the Precincts - Regional SEPP are not required to be publicly exhibited if the proposal relates to works which are wholly internal to a building or where the site is located more than fifty (50) metres away from a tourist accommodation building.

While the works are not within fifty (50) metres of tourist accommodation buildings, the Department elected to make the application publicly available from 23 February 2023 until 8 March 2023 on the NSW Planning Portal website to ensure any interested parties had the opportunity to review the development.

Comments were received from the National Parks and Wildlife Service pursuant to section 4.27 of the Precincts - Regional SEPP.

The matters raised by the National Parks and Wildlife Service are addressed in detail in the Department's Assessment Report.

There were no community views that needed to be taken into consideration in making this decision as no public submissions were received.
