Cridland described the canal or 'Drain' at north end of Woolooware Road, dug by Connell in the 1820s or 30s for access to timber, as being still visible. T. Murray, in his Archaeological Survey of the Kurnell Peninsula, 1979, found evidence of the canal located on Sutherland Shire Golf Links near junction with Woolooware Road, but not the siding, log and earth wharf or saw pit. No archaeological evidence has been found of the 'Drain'.
