# 6. Assessment Against NSW Heritage Council's Criteria

The NSW Heritage Council has defined criteria and guidelines for assessment of heritage significance. These include the questions that should be asked in making a heritage assessment.

The questions include inclusion and exclusion guidelines. The exclusion guidelines should not be applied in isolation from the inclusion guidelines, but should be used to help in reviewing and qualifying the conclusions reached.

In accordance with the guidelines, an item is significant in terms of the particular criterion if the kind of attributes listed in the inclusion guidelines help to describe it. Similarly, the item is not significant in terms of the particular criterion if the kind of attributes listed in the exclusion guidelines help to describe it.

59 McArthur Street has been assessed against these criteria and guidelines as follows (with applicable inclusion and exclusion guidelines bolded):

#### Comment

The house, in its original form, would have been a locally interesting example of a pair of semi-detached houses. However, the original 1890s pair of semis was "gentrified" c. 1927 to make it resemble a Bungalow, and was finally converted c. 1980s to a single Victorian-style residence. In the process, the house has lost the ability to interpret its original configuration.

Currently, it does not meet criteria for heritage listing, largely due to its loss of integrity. It meets one inclusion guideline, by virtue of its sheer age, however, it also meets at least five exclusion guidelines.

On balance, this suggests that it should not be listed as a heritage item.

#### Recommendation

### Remove form LEP list of items of heritage significance

#### **Recommended Management**

In accordance with the NSW Heritage Council guidelines, the heritage item should be photographically recorded to allow retention of information on its design and changes that it underwent over time.

## 7. Summary and Recommendation

The house at 59 McArthur Street, Guildford, was purchased as two allotments and developed as a pair of semis c. 1897. The original houses were apparently always investment properties of the well-off members of the middle class. In the 1920s, they were converted to a single residence with attempts to mimic Interwar Bungalow features. The now single residence was restored with mock features c. 1980s. In these two major waves of alterations the house(s) have lost all ability to interpret their original design to laypersons and the general public.

Importantly, the house has developed major structural issues as a consequence of apparent ground movement. There is readily apparent evidence of separation of ceilings from walls, and of structural cracking over 1m in length and over 5mm (up to 20mm) in width. This suggests that several major structural walls would likely need to be demolished and rebuilt in the forthcoming years, which would further reduce the already diminished integrity and heritage value of the remnant fabric.

On balance, it is recommended to remove the house from the LEP schedule of heritage items. It is recommended to prepare an archival record of the house, in accordance with the NSW Heritage Council guidelines, as evidence of its current configuration.
