

# PLANNING PROPOSAL - HERITAGE REPORT SUPPLEMENTARY VIEW ANALYSIS

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This report has been prepared under the guidance of the Expert Witness Code of Conduct in the Uniform Civil Procedure Rules and the provisions relating to expert evidence. The opinions in the report represent the professional opinions of the author based on an assessment of the available information cited in the report.

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#### **Revision Notes:**

Version 1.0 of this report examined a proposal for a 34 metre height limit over the subject land. Following consideration of the reports supporting the proposal, Parramatta City Council considered that a height limit of 49 metre and floor space ratio of 3.5:1 would be acceptable. Version 2.0 amends the original report to consider the nominated increase in the height and density controls. Refer to TPG Report for details of 'Concept Evolution'.

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# **PLANNING PROPOSAL - HERITAGE ISSUES** SUPPLEMENTARY VIEW ANALYSIS FOR 10-12 VICTORIA ROAD, PARRAMATTA

#### 1.0 BACKGROUND

This View Analysis has been prepared for The Planning Group NSW Pty Ltd on behalf of the Catholic Diocese of Parramatta. It is supplementary to NBRS+Partners Heritage Report for the proposed rezoning of 10-12 Victoria Road, Parramatta prepared in October 2013 (Revised September 2014) and should be read in conjunction with that report. This Analysis has been carried out by the same authors.

The October report identified and analysed potential impacts on significant views. Among those views, Section 7.0 of that report considered view impacts arising from the relationship of the World and National Heritage Listed Old Government House and the Government Domain and the Old King's School and its setting.

'Development in Parramatta City and the Impact on Old Government House and Domain's World and National Heritage Listed Values: Technical Report' [the Planisphere report] was prepared in response to the need to assess potential impacts on views and the setting associated with the National Heritage Listed and World Heritage Listed Old Government House and the Government Domain. Formerly, there had been guidance of the Parramatta City Centre Development Control Plan 2007 [PCCDCP 2007] and the Parramatta Park Management Plan submitted with the World Heritage List nomination documentation. That management plan relied on planning controls which had been superseded. The Planisphere report further defines significant views in terms of extent, nature of significance, and degree of significance and provides management recommendations that anticipate change.

Parramatta City Council has resolved to include the Planisphere report in a Conservation Agreement between all levels of Government. Until a Conservation Agreement is executed by the Commonwealth and New South Wales governments and Parramatta City Council, the Planisphere report remains only as a reference document and the PCCDCP 2007 stands as the principal guiding document for the management of historic views.

After preliminary assessment of the Planning Proposal, Parramatta City Council wrote to the proponent on 20 December 2013. Among that assessment's comments was one related to heritage impacts upon significant views. Although point 1 of Council's letter identifies the importance of the heritage context, point 3 sets out Council's specific comments on heritage issues as follows:

As shown from the Statement of heritage issues included with your planning proposal, development would form a backdrop and could possibly remove the ability for the spire of St Patrick's Cathedral to be read against the sky in the significant View 3 which is identified in 'Development in Parramatta City and the Impact on Old Government House and Domain's World and National Heritage Listed Values: Technical Report' [aka 'the Planisphere report']. Council officers consider that the proposal would remove the ability of the spire to be read against the sky in this significant view. A review of proposed built form controls is required to ensure that there is no detrimental impact on the legibility of this view and setting. Furthermore, the planning proposal does not appear to have assessed the impact of development on identified Views 1, 8 and 9 in the Parramatta City Centre DCP 2007 from

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Old Government House to the Old Kings School Building and from Parramatta Park to the distant hills.

Page 12 of The October Heritage Report notes that 'Although development on the subject site will not intervene in the significant View 3, it is likely that it would form a backdrop and could possibly remove the ability for the spire of St Patrick's Cathedral to be read against the sky from this perspective.' Some analysis is then given on the recommended management of View 3 provided by the Planisphere report.

The planning proposal has been revised by The Planning Group NSW Pty Ltd. This supplementary view analysis is based on the revised proposal.

NBRS+Partners interpret that, although there would be some impact, there is unlikely to be a 'significant impact' in terms of the World and National Heritage listed values.

The following sections examine both the view impacts in relation to the spire of St Patrick's in greater detail and potential impacts of development of the subject site on views 1, 8 and 9 of the DCP.

#### 2.0 METHODOLOGY

This View Analysis follows the methodology of the October 2013 report but gives more detailed analysis of documented and actual views of historic and cultural significance in relation to development of the subject site. The Analysis has:

- Involved discussion with Council staff on 17 January and 18 February 2014 together with initial review of the draft conservation agreement concerning views associated with the World and National Heritage Listed Old Government House and Government Domain (OGHGD).
- Examined in greater depth certain views identified in Planisphere's 'Development in Parramatta City and the Impact on Old Government House and Domain's World and National Heritage Listed Values: Technical Report';
- Examined in greater depth views 1, 8 and 9 identified in Parramatta City Centre Development Control Plan 2007's 'Appendix 2 Historic Views';
- Conducted a joint site survey with TPG and an officer of Council to 'ground-truth' views and agree on exact locations of originating viewpoints.

Views 1, 8 and 9 of the Parramatta City Centre Development Control Plan 2007, were not assessed explicitly in NBRS+Partners October 2013 Heritage Report as those in the Planisphere Report were, for the greater part, ostensibly the same but more comprehensively and rigorously described and substantiated.

A draft Conservation Agreement referencing the Planisphere Report has been agreed by Parramatta City Council subject to the agreement of the other parties – New South Wales and the Commonwealth of Australia. However, in February 2014, the Parramatta City Centre Development Control Plan 2007 has some statutory weight as a guideline to the implementation of the *Parramatta City Centre Local Environmental Plan 2007* whereas the Planisphere report is not currently a statutory consideration.

Geographic positioning is approximate only and was determined and cross-checked with two Apple iPhone 5's using the 'Compass app'. Locations have not been surveyed or located using a global positioning system. Coordinates have been rounded to the nearest second (+/- 15 metres). As the distances point to point are relatively small, only a single bearing has been given.

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### 3.0 PARRAMATTA DEVELOPMENT CONTROL PLAN 2007 'APPENDIX 2 -**HISTORIC VIEWS' AND THE PLANISPHERE REPORT**

This development control plan identified nine historic views over and beyond the area covered by the DCP. Council's letter of 20 December 2013 questions whether the plan's views 1, 8 and 9 had been assessed for impacts arising from the planning proposal. The heritage report did not include specific assessment of these as these views (described graphically by arrows and viewsheds and verbally described) were covered in the Planisphere report where they were renumbered, broken down and given more detailed analysis of their nature and level of significance, extent and recommended management.

It was agreed with Council Officer Mr Paul Kennedy that for the purposes of this View Analysis the following would be accepted:

- 1. The originating location of View 1 of the Parramatta City Centre Development Control Plan 2007 was materially the same as the originating location of Planisphere's View 3;
- 2. The originating location of View 8 of the Parramatta City Centre Development Control Plan 2007 was not the same as the originating location of Planisphere's View 16;
- 3. Planisphere's originating location of View 16 as described graphically did not afford a view of the ridge line, the subject site or the spire of St Patrick's Cathedral and therefore was not considered to be a significant focus of any assessment; and,
- 4. The originating location of View 9 of the Parramatta City Centre Development Control Plan 2007 was materially the same as the originating location of Planisphere's View 6.

# 8.0 CONCLUSION

In summary, potential optimal development as provided for by the planning proposal will be visible in 'historic views' 1, 8 and 9 as identified in the Parramatta Development Control Plan 2007, however the heritage impacts of this visibility are capable of being minor and acceptable for the following reasons:
