Statement of This cemetery is on the NSW Heritage list. It is of historic significance, partly because of its origins as the

significance: Mandamah Public Cemetery.

**Historical notes** This is the cemetery of the earlier planned village of Mandamah. Early in 1884, a sketch of this proposed village of provenance: was was drawn up and sent to the Surveyor General on 24th March, 1884. Between the 22nd and 28th October,

1884, Surveyor Arthur Bray visited the site, surveying the proposed boundaries of the village and its suburban lands, which was accepted by the Surveyor General on 30th July, 1885, with the "Village of Mandamah" and its reserves being formally gazetted on 28th September, 1885. The "Suburban Lands" of "Mandamah" comprised a block two miles square, with the cemetery, now known as the Ariah Park Cemetery, at its south-western corner. In October, 1896 the cemetery was formally surveyed, being now known as the "Ariah Park Cemetery". It was dedicated on 9th June, 1897. Twelve months later, Messrs Campbell and Harmon successfully tendered to grub and clear the block and enclose it with rabbit-proof fencing. Local stories recall that Clara Fong and Mabel Baker rode out to see the surveying and clearing work, and speculated on who would be the first to rest in the newest of "God's Acres". Two years later, Mabel Baker, became to the first to rest there, following her death from measles which had deteriorated into pneumonia. One historic headstone there is that of James Wilson who died at Broken Dam on 14th December, 1902. His headstone erected later by his friend Thomas Peadon,

the publican, bears the incorrect date of 15th December, 1892.
