3.6.1 Orielton Homestead (B1)



The construction of the house is a layering of styles ranging from the original Colonial Vernacular Georgian construction through to the Victorian Italianate and Classical Federation styles. The house displays evidence of early construction with a layering of Italianate features thought to be added during the Beard occupation.

Current use/condition	Housing This area is in fair condition and used by the occupiers of the flat building. Area G14 is used as a kitchen and dining area and has evidence of 1940s fit out including timber kitchens and partition walls. The space leads into area G15 which has been converted into a laundry with access to an external toilet G16. Area LG3 has been converted into a bathroom for the occupiers of the flat building and includes timber partition walls that date from the 1940s. The space is though to have been a cellar and shows evidence of the original/early concrete bench space.
