Preliminary Heritage Assessment

100 LUCAS ROAD – POTENTIAL HERITAGE ITEM ASSESSMENT

EXECUTIVE SUMARY

Investigations reveal ample sources of historical evidence relating to the original owners.

While important to Burwood, the Ipkendanz family was also well known and well regarded in Marrickville and Springwood. They were emigrants who established themselves in these places.

Their time in Burwood is dominated by the experiences of the family in World War 1.

Historical material available would support listing of the building for its ability to tell the story of an Australian emigrant family at war. Such material would be necessary for the interpretation of the house in that context.

At the same time the aesthetic qualities of the house are substantial and apart from some intervention the fabric is in a good state of preservation with high integrity particular of the joinery which is of a high standard of craftsmanship.

For these reasons the house is recommended for advancement to the next stage of consideration for listing as a Local Heritage Item.

Further analysis of research already assembled should be supplemented with:

Comparative Analysis with similar homes in Burwood

An attempt to contact the descendants of the Original Owners.

Analysis of the other items associated with the family and the relative importance of this house in that context.

1. INITIAL REFERRAL

No 100 Lucas Road was one of two properties referred to in correspondence received from the Burwood & District Historical Society. The referral specifically identifies the property at No 100 Lucas Road as having potential "aesthetic significance".

3. PHYSICAL EVIDENCE (REFER ATTACHMENT 4)

An inspection was conducted with the co-operation of the owners. This included the interior of the property. The property is tenanted with boarders and not all the rooms were available for inspection. Sufficient areas were accessible to permit photo documentation of interior details and to permit an appraisal of the general condition and intactness of the original portions of the house.

Preliminary analysis indicates that modifications have generally been superficial. Apart from the bricking up of the original archway to enclose the front porch, the majority of the alterations have been constructed in timber framing. There is some loss throughout of original plaster ceilings. This may have resulted from requirements for fire upgrading for use of the house as a Lodging House.

Elsewhere there is a high level of survival of internal joinery including doors, frames, fanlights, architraves, skirting boards and wall plaster. Where visible timber floors appear sound but may have been repaired or replaced. Many of the original windows survive including stained glass inserts to fanlights and sidelights. The front door suite is in excellent condition and has been protected by the enclosure of the front porch. One bathroom was accessible which retains its original wall and floor tiling. Fixtures are later and unsympathetic.

Major interventions apart from enclosure of the front porch include enclosure of the southern verandah. This is reasonably sympathetic in expressing verandah posts and brackets and appears to

be reversible. Adaptations to the rear of the property are moderately intrusive. The Attic, roof terrace and timber access stair are of later construction of lesser quality. Apart from these the house retains its original form and Federation Period character. The style is of a large Federation bungalow with Arts and Crafts influence seen in the raking buttresses, roughcast stucco and tall chimneys. The same influence is present in the interior joinery with unusual extended door architraves.

New unsympathetic underfloor air vents have been inserted. The intrusion is minor but suggests that underfloor areas had been subject to high moisture in past years.

4. HISTORICAL ASSOCIATIONS - FAMILY HISTORY - ORIGINAL OWNERS

William Ipkendanz was born in Hanover and migrated first to Britain as a youth and to Australia in 1883 at the age of 39. He met his future wife Lina when both were employed in European hotels. She came separately to Sydney in 1884 and married William soon after. The couple operated the Royal Exchange Hotel in Marrickville from about 1885 and in 1889 were commended for housing people displaced by local flooding.

William was naturalised in 1891 and become owner of the Royal Exchange. They lived in Marrickville with a growing family until 1895 when they purchased 21 acres in Springwood in the Blue Mountains. In 1897 they built "Elmhurst" there as a family home.

The family sold *Elmhurst* and the Ipkendanz family moved back to the city around 1909 for better access to educational opportunities, settling in Burwood. By 1915 they are recorded in Sands as residing at "Bulwarra" in Lucas Road Burwood.

Four of five sons enlisted, Robert in the 7th Light Horse; Herbert in the 36th Australian Heavy Artillery and Eric in the 3rd and then 55th Infantry. Arnold was a fitter & turner and may not have embarked for Europe. Eric died on active service in April 1917, aged 22. Their names appear on the Honour and Service Rolls in the Memorial Arch in Burwood Park and at the War Memorial in Canberra. A fifth son Edward (Ken) was too young to serve.

William Louis Ipkandenz died in February 1923 at Burwood. His wife Lina also died at Burwood in September of 1930. Both were buried in the Anglican Cemetery at Springwood, having retained the property "Urunga" and family links with the Blue Mountains. Their former home "Elmhurst" is part of the St Columba's College Heritage Item at Springwood. Its significance is listed as follows: "Elmhurst is a good representative Federation bungalow which retains a sense of its original rural setting". After the death of Lina both "Bulwarra" in Burwood and "Urunga" at Springwoood were sold.

5. ASSESSMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The house originally known as "Bulwarra" is representative of subdivision activity in the Burwood area. It was subject to several adjustments of the original allotment to suit the needs of the initial owners.

5.2 Criterion (b) (local significance):

An item has strong or special association with the life or works of a person, or group of persons, of importance in the cultural or natural history of the local area.

DISCUSSION:

The Ipkandenz are of some historical interest as a migrant family of the 1880's with origins in Germany who achieved a high level of acceptance and integration within Australian Society in the Late Victorian; Federation and Inter-War Periods.

Their influence is recorded in the several places with which they are associated including Marrickville, Springwood and Burwood. There are surviving buildings directly associated with them in each of those places.

It is evidence of the WW1 period as the home of W.L. Ipkandenz and his family along the theme of "A Burwood Family at War". As such it relies strongly on supporting documentation for its interpretation.

It also provides a valuable piece of the physical context against which to understand those times and the story of one family of whom four sons served and one was killed in action.

5.3 Criterion (c) (local significance):

DISCUSSION:

The house itself is an expression of contemporary tastes for the times. It demonstrates a high degree of design skill and craftsmanship in its details which are of above average quality. Although not the finest houses in Burwood they are indicative of the gentleman's residence as an expression of successful émigré family.

As such the house forms a pair with another listed house in Springwood. Together they provide an insight into the tastes and of the times as adopted by a successful and well regarded family, allowing some potential for comparative analysis.

The inclusion of Arts and Crafts detailing and influence is perhaps a reference to emigrant nostalgia.
