Comment : **The objective of the Planning Proposal is to update and make corrections to Schedule 5 Environmental Heritage including property title descriptions, address changes and to correct mapping errors on associated maps.**

Comment : **The proposal will correct and update property details that have changed in relation to heritage items as well as correct mapping of heritage items. A description of inaccurate property details and justification for the proposed corrections is contained in Appendix 1 of the Planning Proposal. There are 76 proposed changes to Schedule 5 Environmental Heritage of Dungog LEP 2014 which facilitate these corrections and these are contained in Appendix 2.**

Appendix 3 contains 44 proposed changes to the Heritage maps which in many cases are linked to corrections to property details in Schedule 5.

SEPP (Exempt & Complying Development Codes) 2008 – the Planning Proposal will have an impact on how the Codes SEPP can be applied to sites where heritage identification has altered in Schedule 5 or on the Heritage map. This will effect exempt and complying development on these sites. The Planning Proposal is consistent with the Codes SEPP as it correctly applies heritage restrictions to exempt and complying development over land containing heritage items.

2.3 Heritage Conservation – the Planning Proposal is consistent with Direction 2.3 as it complies with clause 4 by protecting heritage items through ensuring the property description of each items accurately reflects its location.

PROJECT TIMELINE

Council's timeline nominates the Planning Proposal's completion within seven (8) months after the Gateway Determination. It is considered that a nine (9) month completion timeframe is appropriate which requires the Planning Proposal to be completed by August 2016.

DELEGATION AUTHORISATION

Council resolved that it was not in a position to accept delegations for making LEPs in 2012 and therefore LEP delegations are not sought for this Planning Proposal.

It is recommended that authority to exercise delegations not be granted as Council was not issued with this authority in the first instance.

Comments in relation to Principal LEP : **Dungog Standard Instrument was published 30 May 2014.**

Assessment Criteria

Need for planning proposal :

The planning proposal is the result of Dungog Heritage Study 1988 which was later reviewed in 2014 as part of the Standard Instrument process. It was determined through this process that the anomalies in Schedule 5 should be resolved as a separate Planning Proposal as it was thought that a conversion of the previous instrument to LEP 2014 was the most expedient course of action.

A planning proposal is considered the most effective and timely method available to implement this objective.

Consistency with strategic planning framework :

LOWER HUNTER REGIONAL STRATEGY 2006 (LHRS) does not apply to the Dungog LGA.
UPPER HUNTER STRATEGIC REGIONAL LAND USE PLAN 2012 (UHSRLUP)

The Planning Proposal is consistent with the UHSRLUP as it improves protection against impacts to cultural heritage. The PP also addresses one of the challenges for cultural heritage in the Upper Hunter which is that the current identification and protection of both Aboriginal and historic cultural heritage within the region is not comprehensive, as it is reliant on in some instances incomplete data sets.

The review of the Dungog Heritage Study 1988 improved the data set available to Council and its inclusion in Schedule 5 will ensure greater protection of heritage items.

Environmental social economic impacts :

ENVIRONMENTAL

There are no known environmental impacts as a result of the proposed changes to Schedule 5 and the Heritage Map.

HERITAGE

The proposal will increase the protection of listed heritage items by way of mapping and describing them more accurately in Dungog LEP 2014. It is recommended that the matter be referred to the Heritage Division of the Office of Environment and Heritage as there are changes to State Heritage items in Schedule 5.

ECONOMIC & SOCIAL

There are potential positive economic impacts for the community as the Planning Proposal will reinforce the heritage values of Dungog and surrounding towns and villages that forms part of the attraction to the place to visit and live. There are also positive social benefits to

3. A public hearing is not required to be held into the matter by any person or body under section 56(2)(e) of the EP&A Act. This does not discharge Council from any obligation it may otherwise have to conduct a public hearing (for example, in response to a submission or if reclassifying land).

4. The timeframe for completing the LEP is to be 9 months.
