Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Due Diligence Assessment

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#### 1 INTRODUCTION

Kayandel Archaeological Services (KAS) has been commissioned by Elton Consulting on behalf of Tamworth-Industrial Pty Ltd (the Proponent) to prepare an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Due Diligence Assessment in relation to Aboriginal Heritage within 21 Wallamore Road (Lot 2 DP1234850) and 55 Dampier Street (Lot 3 DP1234850), Taminda, NSW.

This report outlines the results of the Aboriginal heritage due diligence assessment which meets the requirements of the *Due Diligence Code of Practice* (DECCW, 2010b) and includes recommendations regarding Aboriginal heritage constraints for the proposed rezoning.

Please note that this report is an initial investigation of constraints and opportunities pertaining to identified Aboriginal heritage sites and places on and/or in the immediate vicinity of the proposed development site. It is not an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report (ACHAR) prepared in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH). As such, it would not be sufficient to support an application for an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit, in accordance with Section 90 of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974. Similarly, the report does not consider historical heritage, and would not be sufficient to support an application for a permit under Section 60 or Section 140 of the Heritage Act 1977.

#### 1.1 Location of the Subject Area

The Subject Area is located within the Tamworth Regional Council (TRC) Local Government Area (LGA) and the Tamworth Local Aboriginal Land Council (TLALC). The Subject Area is located within the Parish of Murroon, County of Parry (refer to Figure 1).

The Subject Area consists of 21 Wallamore Road (Lot 2 DP1234850) and 55 Dampier Street (Lot 3 DP1234850), Taminda, NSW (refer to Figure 2). The Subject Area covers approximately 11.35ha.

#### 1.2 Proposed Works

Lot 3 DP1234850 is currently zoned as RU4 (Primary Production Small Lots) under the TRC Local Environment Plan 2010 (LEP).

The Proponent has proposed that the Subject Area is rezoned to IN1 (General Industrial).

#### 1.3 Study Limitations

This report is based on a review of available Aboriginal archaeological assessments (sourced from the Heritage Branch library, grey literature and KAS' report library). It is possible that further Aboriginal archaeological assessments or the emergence of new analysis of the Historic archaeological landscape within the Tamworth area may support different interpretations of the evidence in this report.

This report is based exclusively upon desktop assessment.

A summary of the statutory requirements regarding heritage is provided in Section 2. This is made based on our experience of working with the NSW Aboriginal heritage and European heritage systems and does not purport to be legal advice. It should be noted that legislation, regulations, and guidelines change over time and users of this report should satisfy themselves that the statutory requirements have not changed since the report was written.

The results from the 'AHIMS Database Search' (Section 4.2) are valid for 12 months from the date of the search. If this report has not been finalised and/or if it is necessary to update this report, and the


previous AHIMS search is over 12 months old, it will be necessary to undertake another search of the AHIMS to ensure information is current.

#### 1.4 Personnel

#### **2 LEGISLATIVE CONTEXT**

The National Parks & Wildlife Act 1974 provides statutory protection for all Aboriginal 'objects' (consisting of any material evidence of the Aboriginal occupation of NSW) and for 'Aboriginal Places' (areas of cultural significance to the Aboriginal community). Under Section 86 of the National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974, Aboriginal objects are afforded automatic statutory protection in NSW whereby it is an offence to:

Damage, defence or destroy Aboriginal sites without the prior consent of the Director-General of the National Parks and Wildlife Service (now referred to as the Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH).

The Act defines an Aboriginal 'Object' as:

Any deposit, object or material evidence (not being a handicraft for sale) relating to indigenous and non-European habitation of the area that comprises New South Wales, being habitation before or concurrent with the occupation of that area by persons of non-Aboriginal European extraction, and includes Aboriginal remains.

The Due Diligence Code of Practice was introduced in October 2010 by the OEH (formerly the Department of Environment, Climate Change and Water (DECCW)). The aim of the guidelines is to assist individuals and organisations to exercise due diligence when carrying out activities that may harm Aboriginal objects and to determine whether they should apply for consent in the form of an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP).

A due diligence assessment should take reasonable and practicable steps to ascertain whether there is a likelihood that Aboriginal sites will be disturbed or impacted during the proposed works. If it is assessed that sites exist or have a likelihood of existing within the development area and may be impacted by the proposed development, further archaeological investigations may be required. If it is found that Aboriginal sites were to exist within the Subject Area, an AHIP would be required if the proposed impacts cannot be avoided. If it is found to be unlikely that Aboriginal sites were to exist within the Subject Area and the due diligence assessment has been conducted in accordance with the Due Diligence Code of Practice, then the proposed works could proceed without an AHIP.

The Native Title Act 1994 was introduced to work in conjunction with the Commonwealth Native Title Act 1993. Native Title claims, registers and Indigenous Land Use Agreements are administered under the Act. A search of the Native Title register identified a claim by the Gomeroi People over the Subject Area.

#### 3 LANDSCAPE CONTEXT

Tamworth is located in the southern portion of the Nandewar Bioregion. The Nandewar bioregion is bounded by the North Coast, New England Tablelands and Brigalow Belt South Bioregions in the south, east and west respectively. The larger scale geology of the Nandewar Bioregion is characterised by Mesozoic sediments, Devonian sedimentary and volcanic rocks, and Triassic sandstones and shales (NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service, 2003).

The Subject Area is situated within the Liverpool Plains, which is typified by prime agricultural land, with multiple depressions which create lakes after long periods of rain and steep hills arising suddenly from the plains. The Liverpool Plains are bordered to the east by the Great Dividing Range, the south by the Liverpool Range and the west by the Warrumbungle Range. The Namoi River drains the area along with its tributaries, the Peel and Mooki rivers. The Subject Area is located on an alluvial floodplain of the Peel River and Wallamore Anabranch.

Data for rainfall at the Subject Area was taken from Tamworth Airport AWS. The highest mean rainfall is attributed to November, with the highest daily rainfall occurring over the summer months (BOM, 2018).

Soils within the Subject Area consist of the Duri (du) and the Goonoo Goonoo (gn) soil landscapes (Banks, 2001).

The Duri soil landscape is described as a complex geological setting with a mixture of the Devovian sedimentary rocks of the Tamworth belt and interdigitated carboniferous geological units, with soil distribution highly variable owing to the underlying geology. Soils range from Chromosols, Rudosols, Vertosols and Sodosols, all of which vary from red through to brown in colouration The Lithology of the Duri landscape includes arenite, polymictic conglomerate, greywacke and mudstone (Banks, 2001) – some of which are known to be resources utilised by Aboriginal people for the manufacture of stone artefacts.

The Goonoo Goonoo soil landscape is comprised of diverse but individually locally extensive soil types. Soils encountered in this landscape include very deep to giant, imperfectly drained Brown Sodosols (solodic soils); deep to giant, imperfectly drained, Black Vertosols (black earths); very deep to giant, poorly drained Grey Vertosols (grey clays); shallow, moderately well-drained Calcareous Rudosols (calcareous Alluvial Soils); and deep to giant, imperfectly drained Brown Vertosols (Brown clays). These soils have poor drainage and are identified as a flood hazard (Banks, 2001).

Soils are typically shallow duplex soils, comprised of thin clay loam topsoil (A1 horizon) over heavy clays (B horizon), and usually <50cm deep. The heavy clay unit is generally considered to pre-date the Aboriginal colonisation of Australia, and therefore only the upper A1 horizon has the potential to contain Aboriginal objects. The shallow nature of these deposits has implications for the potential and survivability of Aboriginal objects - even minor disturbance and/ or de-vegetation will often result in the complete removal of the upper parts of the soil profile in which objects may occur. Originally, this area would have been dominated by open and/or dry sclerophyll forest, but most of the area is now urbanised and cleared; only creek lines and associated riparian corridors contain dense bushland that may reflect pre-European vegetation (Murphy & Murphy, 2000).

The Subject Area is located 400m south of Wallamore Anabranch on the associated alluvial floodplain. Timbumburi Creek is approximately 426m west of the Subject Area; and is bisected by a number of 1st and 2nd order streams (as defined by the Strahler model). These streams drain north,

through the Subject Area, into the Wallamore Anabranch, and would have provided a temporary water source.

Wilson and McAdam (2000) noted that aerial photography and testimony from local residents attest to the instability of the Peel River, which migrated back and forth across the floodplain. (Wilson & McAdam) suggested that this was typical for all of the watercourses in the region.

It is difficult to reconstruct an understanding of vegetation present in the Tamworth region owing to European land clearing practices. Landform generally has an impact on the vegetation present, with River red Gum, Yellow Box and She-Oak common in the vicinity of major water courses. Blakelys Red Gum, White Box, Kurrajong and Rough-barked Apple are common on slopes and hill sides, with White Box dominant on hills and slopes south of the Peel River (Wilson & McAdam, 2000). The vegetation present within the Subject Area, while also potentially used as Aboriginal economic plants, would also have supported a range of faunal species that would have been utilised by Aboriginal people. The rivers and watercourses in the Tamworth region would also have provided aquatic flora and fauna.

#### 3.1 Historical Land-Use Disturbance

European presence in the Tamworth Region is recorded as early as 1818, and by 1820 the area was already being employed for sheep and cattle grazing. The land was primarily employed by Europeans for grazing with limited more intensive rural practices until late in the nineteenth century, when the alluvial flats along the peel river began to produce successful crops and the demand was stimulated for further agricultural land releases (Jonathan Falk Planning Consultants Pty Ltd & Rodney Jensen and Associates Pty Ltd, 1988).

While specific information relating to disturbance at the Subject Area is difficult to determine, from aerial photographs and an understanding of the use of the region it can be understood that the Subject Area has been used primarily for agricultural purposes, mainly relating to crop growth and animal grazing. Current aerials of the Subject Area show disturbance relating to irrigation systems and fence installation, as well as the impacts caused by animal grazing.

#### **4 ARCHAEOLOGICAL CONTEXT**

#### 4.1 Ethnohistory

The oldest site identified within the Tamworth Region is Bendemeer II, dating to 4,950BP (Wilson & McAdam, 2000); although this is arguably a reflection of the lack of archaeological investigations within the region and preserved datable material rather than a reflection of actual occupation dates.

The Tamworth region and it's surrounds are generally accepted as having been originally inhabited by the Gamilaroi (also referred to as Komilaroi) people, who are recognised by researchers as the primary linguistic group for the greater New England Region (Tindale, 1974; Wilson & McAdam, 2000). Europeans identified a number of groups in the Tamworth region including the Goonoo Goonoo, Gunnedah, Manellae (people who traditionally utilised the Manilla River) and Moonb (Tindale, 1974). Carey (2006) dentifies two sub-communities of the Gamilaroi, who occupied the area now known as Tamworth: the Mooni, and the Goonoo Goonoo people. The Gamilaroi people spoke a range of dialects throughout the New England Region, with Wilson and McAdam (2000) commenting that there were two distinct groups – the Corbon Gamilaroi, who occupied areas surrounding the Peel River including Liverpool Plains, and the Gammon Gamilaroi, who occupied the southern part of the language territory.

European settlement had a devastating effect on the traditional life ways of the Kamilaroi. Violent conflicts between settlers and Aboriginal groups, disease and dispossession of land resulted in population decrease. Conflict in the district was not uncommon. Descendent of Thomas Bowman, one of the early landowners within the project area, passed on stories of Bowman working through the night to build fences to secure them from Aboriginal people (Boileau, 2007). One of the more violent recorded conflicts was the reprisal campaigns of Major James Nunn. Boileau (2007) describes the action thus:

"They travelled in a circuit north across the Nandewar Ranges through Archibald Bell's Barraba station, on to Thomas Hall's new station at Bingara, then to Snodgrass Lagoon on Waterloo Creek, midway between the Namoi and the Gwydir, where they massacred an estimated forty or fifty Aboriginal people who were camped there. On their return journey through the foothills the posse engaged in a typical frontier style 'mopping up' operation, hunting down and killing any Aborigine they encountered."

#### 4.2 AHIMS Database Search

The locations and details of Aboriginal sites are considered culturally sensitive information. It is recommended that this information, including the AHIMS data and GIS imagery, is removed from this report if it is to enter the public domain.

KAS carried out a search of the AHIMS database on the 2nd October 2018 using the Client Service ID 373803 with the coordinates set out in Table 2 below.

The search area was a 9km by 9km square centred upon the Subject Area, with a 1km buffer (see Figure 3). The results of the AHIMS search are presented in Figure 3 and Table 3. A total of 113 Aboriginal sites have been registered within the search area. Figure 4 shows that Aboriginal sites recorded in proximity to the Subject Area.

It should be noted that the distribution of sites in the AHIMS database is a reflection of where site surveys have been conducted, where exposure and visibility conditions have enabled the detection of sites, and where sites have survived modern land disturbance. The distribution of sites from AHIMS may not be a true reflection of the existing Aboriginal sites in an area.

The AHIMS search indicates that fifty-three (53) of the one hundred and thirteen (113) identified sites were Open Camp Sites, or Open Camp Sites with other associated features, which comprises of 46.9% of the site types. A further 34% of the site types were identified as Isolated Finds. The site types present from the AHIMS search reflect the landforms present within the region.

#### 4.3 Regional Archaeological Context

Extensive archaeological studies are rare within the Tamworth region or Subject Area. These extensive studies provide material evidence of Aboriginal occupation in the Tamworth region, and provide an indication of where and what types of Aboriginal sites may be located in the landscape.

The most comprehensive analysis of Aboriginal Archaeology in the Tamworth Area is that undertaken by Wilson and McAdam (2000), which involved the survey of a number of areas within the region. The Tamworth Heritage Study (Jonathan Falk Planning Consultants Pty Ltd & Rodney Jensen and Associates Pty Ltd, 1988) is another regional study, which focused on European Heritage within the Region generally and specific areas within it, as opposed to exclusively focusing on a limited Study Area.

Other archaeological studies within the Tamworth region have involved specific focus on a study area, and primarily restricted to archaeological survey.

Within the greater region, there have been few Aboriginal archaeological studies, most focused on specific study areas and involving primarily archaeological survey. Below is a discussion of various relevant Aboriginal archaeological investigations within the Tamworth Region.

#### Everick Heritage Consultants (2015)

Everick Heritage Consultants (Everick) (2015) undertook an archaeological study across a range of properties in 2015, on behalf of the Tamworth Regional Council for the Glen Artney Industrial Development. Their Subject Area was approximately 745ha; and was located 6km northwest of the Subject Area.

Everick (2015) undertook a desktop study, and a targeted archaeological field inspection in the process of completing their Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report which was undertaken in accordance with the Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW, 2010b). A total of six (6) Aboriginal sites during the inspection: four (4) isolated artefacts, one (1) low density artefact scatter and one (1) scarred tree.

#### Wilson and McAdam (2000)

The Tamworth Aboriginal/Archaeological Site Study was undertaken in 2000 by Wilson and McAdam (2000), and involved an extensive series of surveys across the Tamworth city region.

Wilson and McAdam (2000) identified a number of sites across their study area, including one (1) scarred tree (Wallamore Anabranch Scarred Tree (AHIMS #29-2-0285) in proximity to the Subject Area, to the west on the southern bank of the Wallamore Anabranch.

#### 4.4 Previous Archaeological Investigations

There have been no previous archaeological investigations within the Subject Area.

#### 4.5 Previous Predictive Models

#### Wilson and McAdam (2000)

Wilson and McAdam (2000) proposed a predictive model for the Tamworth region based on their extensive survey and analysis of background information:

- The climatic information suggests Tamworth would have allowed for year-round Aboriginal occupation, with the topographic data suggesting favourable conditions for Aboriginal habitation south of the Peel River (which corresponds to our Subject Area);
- Even though major watercourse are the most likely places for Aboriginal people to congregate, the wandering nature of the Peel River and its tributaries along the flood plain suggest a low likelihood of locating preserved Aboriginal camp sites;
- Aboriginal camp sites are most likely to be preserved in the deep, brown, structured clays or solodic soils of the lower slopes where they meet the alluvial flats but above the flood plain;
- Isolated finds will most likely be located in areas of low gradient within 200m of a watercourse, with artefacts likely to be large or made from highly observable stone;
- Artefact scatters will be most likely located in areas of low gradient in close proximity to a watercourse, and are most likely to contain flakes, retouched flakes, broken flakes, flaked pieces and cores. With axes, mullers and grindstone predicted to be rare. The size of scatters is anticipated to increase with the proximity to reliable watercourses;
- Scarred trees will likely be located within 100m of a watercourse, but are anticipated to be rare extrapolating from previous data owing to European land clearance, with tree types most likely to contain scars being white box and river red gums;
- Carved trees are considered unlikely owing to the tradition of their removal to museums;
- Stone quarry sites are likely to be located on ridges, hill tops and areas of steep slopes, not in proximity to watercourses;

- Grinding grooves may be located where weathered andestitic greywacke outcrops, especially if these outcrops are in proximity to an Aboriginal axe quarry; and,
- Stone arrangements related to ceremony are not anticipated in proximity to watercourses and are unlikely to occur in the region.

#### **Everick Heritage Consultants (2015)**


Everick Heritage Consultants (2015) observed that:


- Specific environment contexts including alluvial landforms, low kills, lower slopes and spurs are likely to contain the majority of evidence of Aboriginal occupation;
- Isolated artefacts will be the result of random discard and may occur in almost any environmental context;
- Open Campsites will be primarily secondary flakes in low- or high-density scatters, and associated with other features, potentially containing burials when located on sand strata
- Middens, while the Peel River does contain freshwater Shellfish, are unlikely given their absence in the region; and,
- Modified trees will potentially be present within 100m of the watercourses in old stands of trees.

#### 4.6 Aboriginal Heritage Predictions for the Subject Area

The following predictions for Aboriginal sites to be present within the Subject Area are based on the landforms present:

- Open artefact scatters are more likely in areas less than 100m from a major watercourse, or from a confluence of watercourses;
- The size, density and significance of sites will vary, although it is anticipated that sites will be considerably less complex and less dense at distances greater than 100m from a major watercourse;
- The wandering nature of the Peel River, and the presence of the Subject Area on a floodplain suggests that the potential for surface artefacts is low;
- Where mature trees are present, there is moderate potential for modified trees to exist;
- As past land use disturbance increases in intensity, the ability for Aboriginal objects to provide spatial and chronological information about past Aboriginal land use will decrease;
- Burials are not anticipated to be present in the Subject Area. No instances of Aboriginal burials were identified from the AHIMS search within 9km of the Subject Area; and,
- Areas of Potential Archaeological Deposits (PADs) may be present in locations with minimal previous land disturbance and in close proximity to a watercourse.





#### 5 PRELIMINARY ASSESSMENT OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL POTENTIAL

This due diligence assessment provides a preliminary assessment of archaeological potential, that is to determine likelihood of potential archaeological deposits (PAD) being present within the Subject Area. A more comprehensive and detailed investigation of the extent and nature of any archaeological potential would be completed during an archaeological survey report (ASR), where required, under the Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW 2010 (now referred to as the Office of Environment and Heritage).

This desktop assessment has identified no Aboriginal cultural material within or abutting the Subject Area. One (1) AHIMS site is located approximately 962m to the northeast of the Subject Area, identified as WAB ST 1 (Wallamore Anabranch Scarred Tree 1) (AHIMS #29-2-0285). Given the lack of mature vegetation within the Subject Area resulting from land clearance for agricultural and pastoral activities, it is unlikely that scarred trees will be present. Furthermore, Wilson & McAdam (2000) commented that any artefact-bearing deposits that may have been present across the alluvial plain of the Peel River and its tributaries are likely to have disappeared as a result of the unstable creek line.

Based on the information presented above, no further archaeological investigation is recommended for the Subject Area. If the proposed works as identified in Section 1.2, do uncover any Aboriginal cultural material, further archaeological work will be necessary.

#### **6 DUE DILIGENCE ASSESSMENT**

KAS was asked to conduct an Aboriginal archaeological assessment of the Investigation Area in accordance with the Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW, 2010b). This Due Diligence Code of Practice sets out the matters which are to be addressed when assessing whether or not an activity may harm Aboriginal Objects.

The Due Diligence Code of Practice, with reference to the DECCW process (Appendix VI), outlines in regard to the proposed project (refer to Section 1.2) within the Subject Area, the following:

- 1. It is not an activity under Part 3 under s.75B of the EP&A Act;
- 2. The proposed activity is not exempt under the National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974 or National Parks and Wildlife Regulation, 2009;
- 3. The proposed activity will not involve harm that is trivial or negligible;
- 4. The activity is not within an Aboriginal place and no previous investigations meeting the requirements of this code have identified Aboriginal objects;
- 5. The proposed activity is not a low impact one for which there is a defense in the *National Parks and Wildlife Regulation*, 2009; and,
- 6. The proponent is not eligible to use an industry specific code of practice.

Consequently, the Generic Due Diligence Code of Practice (DECCW, 2010b) is to be followed. The decision process determining whether an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) is required is as follows (Appendix VI):

- 1. The activity will disturb the ground surface, but will not disturb any culturally modified trees;
- 2. a. the Subject Area does not have previously confirmed site records or other associated landscape feature information on AHIMS;
  - b. there are no sites identified within the Subject Area;
  - c. there are landscape features that are likely to indicate the presence of Aboriginal objects;
- 3. The carrying out of the proposed activity can be avoided at the relevant landscape features identified over the Subject Area; and,
- 4. The desktop assessment completed indicate that the likelihood of Aboriginal objects being present is low.

As such, it is determined that an AHIP is not required for the project as currently proposed, however caution must be exercised. It is extremely important to note that the above conclusions are relevant only to the current Investigation Area and not the Subject Area as a whole, which does contain a registered Aboriginal site and therefore will require further investigation.

#### 7 RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations regarding Aboriginal heritage are based on consideration of:

- The legal requirements of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (as amended), whereby it is illegal to damage, deface or destroy an Aboriginal relic without first obtaining the written consent of the Director General of National Parks & Wildlife Service;
- The legal requirements of the Heritage Act 1977, whereby it is illegal to disturb or excavate any land knowing or having reasonable cause to suspect that the disturbance or excavation will or is likely to result in a relic being discovered, exposed, moved, damaged or destroyed unless the disturbance or excavation is carried out in accordance with an excavation permit;
- The results of the background research, and the desktop assessment; and,
- The likely impacts of the proposed works (refer to Section 1.2 and Error! Reference source not found.).

#### It was found that:

The desktop assessment did not identify any Aboriginal sites within the Subject Area.

#### It is therefore recommended that:

- 1. Works as currently specified can proceed with caution, subject to the recommendations included below;
- 2. This due diligence assessment must be kept by the Proponent so that it can be presented, if needed, as a defence from prosecution under Section 86(2) of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974;
- 3. All relevant staff and contractors should be made aware of their statutory obligations for heritage under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974*, which may be implemented as a heritage induction;
- 4. Should the design and/or extent of the proposed development be altered, further archaeological assessment may be required. This may include the need to complete an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHA), the full Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements (ACHCR), sub surface investigations under the Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in NSW (DECCW, 2010a) and apply for an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) from the Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH), NSW;
- 5. If unrecorded Aboriginal object or objects are identified in the Subject Area during works, then all works in the immediate area must cease and the area should be cordoned off. OEH must be notified by ringing the Enviroline 131 555 so that the site can be adequately assessed and managed;
- 6. In the unlikely event that skeletal remains are identified, work must cease immediately in the vicinity of the remains and the area must be cordoned off. The proponent must contact the local NSW Police who will make an initial assessment as to whether the remains are part of a crime scene, or possible Aboriginal remains. If the remains are thought to be Aboriginal, OEH must be contacted by ringing the Enviroline 131 555. An OEH officer will determine if the remains are Aboriginal or not; and a management plan must be developed in consultation with the relevant Aboriginal stakeholders before works recommence; and,
- 7. If, during the course of development works, suspected historic cultural heritage material is uncovered, work should cease in that area immediately. The Heritage Branch, Office of

Environment & Heritage (Enviroline 131 555) should be notified and works only recommence when an approved management strategy has been developed.


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
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### **APPENDIX I.** State Heritage Register Search Results


