Aboriginal Heritage Due Diligence Assessment Prepared by Extent Heritage

To Whom It May Concern,

Dural Health Hub, 679-685 Old Northern Road Dural – Aboriginal Due Diligence

We understand Healing ONR Pty Limited (Healing ONR) intends to develop 679-685 Old Northern Road Dural, Lot 3 DP395437 and Lot 1 DP120004 for a health services facility, as shown in the indicative concept design. To achieve this, a planning proposal is being prepared for the site by Healing ONR to Council requesting an additional permitted use for a health services facility and to increase the height control from 10.5m to 14m. The indicative concept design proposes a three-storey building with two levels of basement carparking. The indicative footprint of the basement carpark spans the two allotments meaning that deep excavation will be required across the study area. Extent Heritage Pty Ltd (Extent Heritage) have been engaged to prepare an Aboriginal heritage due diligence assessment for the proposed health services facility on the site (hereafter the "study area"; Figure 1).

This report identifies:

- whether or not there are any current Aboriginal heritage compliance requirements or permit approvals required under the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 and related Heritage NSW regulations, codes and guidelines;
- any known approvals required under the federal Environmental Protection & Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 or the Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984; and
- any other Aboriginal heritage risks we have identified with respect to the study area and the indicative concept design.

In summary, a review of the environmental context and previous archaeological assessments of the area suggest that the study area retains low potential to contain Aboriginal archaeological material. The study area is situated on the upper slope of a ridgeline in an area of Glenorie soils. Our understanding of the soils in the region indicates that only the upper 10-30cm of natural soils would have any potential for the presence of Aboriginal objects. A review of historical documentation concluded that the soil profile is likely disturbed and/or removed by historical



land use activities, which is likely to have resulted in the partial and/or total loss of the soil profile that is critical for the survivability of cultural deposits (if present).

A site inspection undertaken as part of the assessment confirmed this disturbance and the landform the study area is situated on, did not identify any Aboriginal sites, objects or places. Through undertaking an AHIMS search, the due diligence assessment identified no registered Aboriginal Objects or Places present within the study area. It is therefore considered that the proposal for a health service facility within the study area will have a low risk of causing harm to Aboriginal objects. Subsequently work may proceed with caution, and in accordance with the recommendations outlined in Part 12 of this report.

No further Aboriginal heritage investigations are currently required for the proposed health services facility and work can proceed with caution.

Legislative Protection for Aboriginal Heritage in NSW

All Aboriginal objects and places are protected in NSW under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974*. Under Section 86 of the Act, it is an offence to knowingly or unwittingly disturb, destroy or deface Aboriginal objects. An offence under Section 86 of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* could result in prosecution and significant penalties.

Heritage NSW has established a series of regulations, codes and guidelines as a framework for managing Aboriginal heritage in NSW. The staged risk management process can be summarised in the following steps:

- Any proposed activity that may cause harm to known Aboriginal Objects or Places (as defined by the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974) will require an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) approval prior to commencement of that activity. Harm means desecrating, destroying, defacing, damaging or moving an Aboriginal object or declared Aboriginal Place.
- 2. An Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHAR) report must be completed in support of an AHIP application to Heritage NSW.
- 3. There are a series of defences to prosecution available for 'low impact activities' under Section 58 of the National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2019. These low impact exemptions are applicable only in areas that do not contain known Aboriginal Objects or gazetted Aboriginal Places.
- 4. The Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW (DECCW, 2010) provides risk-based guidance regarding when an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHAR) report should be prepared in advance of a development proposal. The risk-based process is based around identification of projects that are 'likely' to harm Aboriginal Objects or Places.

There are Commonwealth Government heritage compliance obligations under the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) Act 1999 and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984 (ATSIHPA) Act 1984 that fall outside the NSW state heritage management framework.

While most projects are not affected by Commonwealth requirements, there has been an increasing application of the Commonwealth legislation over the last ten years and therefore this due diligence assessment includes identification of any Commonwealth requirements that may apply to the project.



2. Project summary




Figure 1. Study area in relation to the surrounding suburb of Dural and the Round Corner centre.




Figure 3. Proposed building footprint plan (Source: Health Projects International, Drawing IPD-SP-2, Issue 4, January 2022)).

Extent Heritage was commissioned by Healing ONR to undertake an Aboriginal heritage due diligence assessment for the proposed health services facility at 679-685 Old Northern Road Dural, within the Hornsby Local Government Area (Figure 1 and Figure 2). We understand that an indicative concept design has been prepared to support the planning proposal which identifies a three-storey health services facility with basement carparking. The indicative footprint of the proposed health services facility is provided in Figure 3.

3. Scope of work

The due diligence assessment scope of work included:

- 1. Search of the Heritage NSW Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) to identify whether or not there are any known Aboriginal Objects, Places, potential archaeological deposits (PADs) or other site recordings within the study area;
- Search of the World, National and Commonwealth heritage lists under the EPBC Act and a search of the Commonwealth Government Gazette for any relevant Declarations under the ATSIHPA;
- Desktop review of key regional Aboriginal heritage studies and any previous studies in the study area to understand local Aboriginal site patterning and implications for archaeological potential within the study area. The desktop review also sought to identify any previously documented Aboriginal cultural, social or intangible values that may be relevant to the study area;
- 4. Desktop review of geological mapping, soil landscape mapping, NearMap high resolution aerial photographs and historical aerial photographs of the study area to identify landforms and environmental features within the study area. The review also sought to identify previous disturbance and landscape modifications that have occurred within the study area that may have affected its archaeological potential;
- 5. Site inspection to identify any Aboriginal sites visible on current exposed ground surfaces and any old growth native trees with potential to retain cultural scars or carving. The site inspection also included documentation of previous ground disturbance and modification;
- 6. Identification of whether or not permit approvals or further ACHAR assessment is required in accordance with the risk assessment processes set out in the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* (DECCW, 2010).



4. Limitations

The due diligence assessment is not a formal Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report and cannot be used to support Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit applications to Heritage NSW. It did not include detailed field investigations, test excavation or formal community consultation with Registered Aboriginal Parties.

The assessment is limited to advice regarding Aboriginal heritage risks and compliance requirements. It does not include consideration of risks that may be associated with historical archaeology, built and urban heritage, maritime heritage, locally listed heritage schedule items, Native Title or landscape heritage.

The advice in the due diligence assessment is based on relevant Aboriginal heritage site register searches, desktop research, site inspection and identification of any heritage constraints, risks, and permit approval requirements.

5. Authorship

This report was written by Extent Heritage Pty Ltd. Francesca McMaster (heritage advisor) was the primary author. Mariska Marnane (GIS specialist) assisted with mapping and spatial analysis work. Andrew Costello (senior associate archaeologist) completed the technical and QA review.

Site register searches

6.1 AHIMS search

The Heritage NSW Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) database includes a register of recorded Aboriginal Objects and Places, and other site and potential archaeological deposit records. It is important to note that the AHIMS database is not vetted – it can include inaccuracies in the location and description of site recordings. AHIMS includes registrations of Aboriginal Objects and Places that are legally protected under the ambit of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 and it also includes other recordings that are not considered to be Aboriginal Objects or Places as defined by the National Parks and Wildlife Act. It is important that any records included on the AHIMS are verified and ground-truthed during ACHAR assessments to establish site status and confirm site locations.

An extensive search of the Heritage NSW AHIMS database was carried out on 18 November 2021 (Client ID: 639715) (Appendix B).




Figure 4. AHIMS sites near the study area. There are no AHIMS sites within 2km of the study area.

There are no registered Aboriginal sites within the study area (Figure 4).

There are 116 registered Aboriginal sites within an area measuring 14km east to west by 10km north to south surrounding the study area. The most common site features recorded are Artefact sites, as shown on Table 2 below.

6.2 EPBC Act search

A search of the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Act 1999* (EPBC Act) lists indicates the study area does not include any items included under the National, Commonwealth or World lists.

6.3 ATSIHPA declarations search

A search of the Commonwealth Government Gazette indicates that there are no Section 9 (emergency declaration) or Section 10 (other declaration) declarations currently applicable to the study area.

7. Desktop research – environment and landscape

7.1 Soil landscape mapping

The study area is located within the Glenorie soil landscape.

The local topography of the Glenorie soil landscape is characterised by low rolling to steep hills, with narrow ridges, hillcrests and valleys. Slopes are often 5-20%, though typically moderately inclined (10-15%), and the local relief is between 50-80m. Dominant soil materials in the Glenorie soil landscape includes friable dark brown pedal loam and hardsetting brown clay apedal loam (A horizons), overlaying a medium reddish-brown strongly pedal clay (B horizon). Soil materials in channels, such as parts of the Mars Creek channel, comprises humic gleys, consisting of brownish-grey silty clay (≤100cm), over mottled grey plastic clay. Ironstone nodules can often be found deep in the subsoil. On crests, friable loam (<15cm) overlies hardsetting clay loam (10-30cm), over a B horizon of strongly pedal clay (30-100cm). On upper and mid-slopes, friable loam (<15cm) overlies hardsetting clay loam (5-30cm) and strongly pedal plastic clay (>100cm). On lower slopes, friable loam (10-60cm) overlies medium reddish-brown strongly pedal clay (100cm) and mottled grey plastic clay (20-100cm).

The Glenorie soil landscape forms the moderately steep and undulating typographic landscape typical of the North Sydney region. While moderately steep in some areas, the landscape is highly urbanised and modified, and sharp exposed sandstone reliefs are present in this area but often not without modification; this restricts a few archaeological site types, such as rock shelters and rock engravings which require these landscape features and are sensitive to modification. Archaeologically, the landscape is more likely to exhibit surface artefact scatters and buried cultural material.

The study area is situated on the upper slope of the ridgeline that Old Northern Road is situated on. The study area slopes down in an eastward direction.

7.2 Hydrology

An analysis of topographical mapping and NearMap high resolution aerial photographs indicates the study area lies in proximity to an arm of Dooral Dooral Creek, 150m to the southwest and Georges Creek 250m to the east. Dooral Dooral Creek is a tributary of Cattai Creek which in turn is a tributary of Dyarubbin (the Hawkesbury River), joining the river at Clarence Reach. Georges Creek is a tributary of Pyes Creek which is a tributary of Berowra Creek which runs through Berowra Valley to Berowra Waters and Dyarubbin to the north. As minor tributaries, Dooral Dooral and Georges Creek are both low order creeks (Figure 6).




Figure 5. Hydrology map of the area surrounding the study area showing Georges Creek to the east and Dooral Dooral Creek to the west.

While both waterways appear to have been modified in modern times, with construction of dams at the conclusion of both waterways, in proximity to the site, historical aerials indicate that the watercourses (in the form of gullies) were present in roughly the same location in the 1940s prior to damming (Figure 5). Neither creek in close proximity to the study area appears to have



been permanent as both are at the cessation of the waterway, suggesting that the water supply would be dependent on the season. The closest permanent waterway appears to be the main arm of Dooral Dooral Creek, around 700m west of the study area.

Heritage NSW specifies five landscape features which are likely to indicate the presence of Aboriginal objects (DECCW, 2010):

- Within 200m of waters.
- Within a sand dune system.
- On a ridge top, ridge line or headland.
- Within 200m below or above a cliff face.
- Within 20m of or in a cave, rock shelter, or a cave mouth.

Based on analysis of topography and aerial photography, the study area is situated on the upper slope of a ridgeline, within 200m of a potential seasonal water source and 700m from a permanent water source (Dooral Dooral Creek).

8. Desktop research – heritage studies

8.1 Regional studies and site patterning

Aboriginal occupation of NSW spans at least 40,000 years (Stockton and Holland 1974; Nanson et al. 1987; JMCHM 2005, 107-125), although older dates have been claimed for artefacts and human remains found within the barrier sands of Lake Mungo in the Willandra Lakes Region (Bowler et al. 2003; Shawcross 1998). Within the Cumberland Plain, Aboriginal occupation dates back well into the Pleistocene period. This evidence comes from radiocarbon dating of charcoal retrieved from excavated sites at Cranebrook Terrace, Penrith (41,700 years before present [BP]), Shaw's Creek K2 (14,700 BP) and George & Charles Streets, Parramatta (c. 25,000-30,000 BP). As the dating of Cranebrook Terrace is currently under review (Attenbrow 2010, 21; see also Williams et al. 2017), the oldest reliable dates for Aboriginal occupation in the Cumberland Plain are presently derived from the George and Charles Streets site.

The archaeological record in the Cumberland Plain is well documented by a large number of academic studies, regional management studies and consulting impact assessment investigations over the past 30 years. Over 7,000 sites have been recorded and registered on the DPC Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) on the Cumberland Plain, reflecting both the wealth of the archaeological record and the number of archaeological investigations undertaken in this region. Consequently, the Cumberland Plain is the most intensively investigated archaeological landscape in Australia.

The distribution, density, size and features of sites on the Cumberland Plain largely depends on their environmental contexts. For instance, middens are typically found in close proximity to marine, estuarine and sometimes freshwater bodies. On the other hand, rock shelters are only found in areas of exposed sandstone escarpment, whereas grinding grooves are located in areas of exposed flat bedded sandstone near water sources.

Environmental and archaeological investigations of the region indicate that cultural material is commonly found in the form of surface and/or subsurface stone artefacts primarily due to the survivability of these site types with the widespread development of the region. These can come in the form of isolated artefacts or low-density scatters suggestive of ephemeral or transient use of the landscape, or denser deposits indicative of intense or repeated occupation. There is some evidence of rockshelters, engravings and grinding grooves found in the broader region, but these are constrained to areas of exposed sandstone geology, which is not found in the study area.

The regional studies indicate the most common site types found on the landforms present in the study area may include:

- Artefact scatters; and
- Buried archaeological deposits.



8.2 Local studies

This part provides a brief summary of Aboriginal sites and archaeological investigations undertaken in the vicinity of the study area to provide an indication of local site patterning and the nature of the local archaeological resource.

The regional studies discussed above indicate that the archaeological resource of the study area is likely to be characterised by isolated artefacts and artefact scatters (both surface and sub-surface) present in a relatively continuous state at varying levels of concentration, as well as potential archaeological deposits (PADs). The likely presence of these site-types within the study area, along with the potential for grinding grooves to occur along watercourses, are also supported by the results of recent investigations conducted within the Cumberland Plain as part of various public and private development projects. These studies are summarised and outlined below.

Hornsby Shire Aboriginal Study (Koettig 1996)

An extensive heritage study of Aboriginal cultural heritage sites within the Hornsby Shire Council local government area was conducted by Margrit Koettig Archaeological Services in 1996. The study demonstrated that the Hornsby area was rich with archaeological evidence of past Aboriginal occupation and utilisation. Due to its underlying geology and hilly landform, Koettig (1996) identified that the predominant site types within the Hornsby area are rock shelters with art, exposed sandstone with engravings and axe grinding grooves. A number of rock shelters were also found to contain shell middens and potential for intact occupation deposits.

In addition, Koettig (1996) also predicted that the estuarine foreshore of the Hornsby area is likely to have the highest frequency of sites. Unsurprisingly, sites with engravings were found predominantly on landforms such as ridges or crests, whereas axe grinding grooves occur more frequently on exposed sandstone near or within creeklines.

City of Ryde Aboriginal Site Management Report (AHO 2011)

In 2011, the Aboriginal Heritage Office – a joint initiative by the Ku-ring-gai, Lane Cove, North Sydney, Manly, Pittwater, Warringah, Willoughby and City of Ryde Councils – compiled a report documenting all known Aboriginal sites located within the City of Ryde (approximately 20km southeast of the study area). A total of 56 Aboriginal sites were documented and various management recommendations were made by the report to conserve Aboriginal cultural heritage values as well as provide a schedule for these conservation works (AHO 2011, 22-31). The list of sites documented within the City of Ryde included rock shelters with art and potential occupation deposits, rock engravings, shell middens, grinding grooves as well as isolated finds and stone artefact scatters (AHO 2011 25, 58-59). More importantly, the grave of Bennelong – the Eora man who served as an interlocutor between the Eora people and the British colonisers – was identified to be located within the suburb of Putney in the City of Ryde (AHO 2011, 59).

Similar to the Hornsby Shire Aboriginal study (Koettig 1996), this report also observed a strong correlation between landforms and site features (AHO 2011, 26). Rockshelters with potential deposits, engraving and grinding grooves are typically located on sandstone landforms, whereas shell middens are located along the Lane Cove River within the Lane Cove National Park. The report also observed that historical ground disturbances since British colonisation



have severely impacted the preservation of sites featuring isolated stone artefacts or scatters, shell middens as well as culturally-modified trees.

Hornsby Quarry Aboriginal Archaeological Survey Report (Artefact 2018)

In 2018, Artefact Heritage Services conducted an assessment of Aboriginal cultural heritage at the Hornsby Quarry (approximately 7km east of the study area) as part of the proposed rehabilitation works at the site. As a part of this assessment, an archaeological survey program was conducted to assess and identify any potential Aboriginal sites or places within the Hornsby Quarry study area that may be impacted by the proposed rehabilitation works. While the assessment had predicted that site types such as grinding grooves, rock art, culturally-modified trees and PADs may be present, no Aboriginal archaeological sites or PADs were identified during the survey itself (Artefact 2018, 24-27). In conclusion, the assessment determined that the levels of historical land use at the Hornsby Quarry had resulted in major subsurface disturbance and hence, low potential for intact archaeological resources to be present at the site.

Macquarie University Campus (Extent Heritage 2020).

In 2020, Extent Heritage Pty Ltd (Extent Heritage) undertook an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment as part of the proposed redevelopment of the Central Courtyard Precinct at Macquarie University (approximately 18km southeast of the study area). While a variety of Aboriginal sites – including pigmented and engraved art sites, grinding grooves, rock shelters with occupation deposit and art as well as artefact scatters and isolated finds – were identified within 6km of Macquarie University, no Aboriginal objects or sites were identified at this location during the archaeological survey program conducted as part of this assessment (Extent Heritage 2020, 55-56, 61-74). Nonetheless, the cultural significance of Lane Cove River as well as the importance of early Aboriginal and settler interaction following the settlement of this area was noted by the Aboriginal stakeholders identified in this assessment (Extent Heritage 2020, 75).

The local studies indicate there may be potential for Aboriginal sites within parts of the study area comprising of artefact scatters and/or buried archaeological deposits within relatively undisturbed land surfaces within 200m of permanent water.



9. Desktop research – previous disturbance




Figure 9. 1986 historical aerial photograph (Source: NSW Department of Finance and Spatial Services).

An analysis of NearMap high resolution aerial photography and a series of historical aerial photographs (Figure 6 to Figure 9) indicates the study area has been subject to disturbance in the form of:

- Land clearing;
- Possible grazing or orchard use as observed in surrounding areas; and
- Construction of residential structures.

In summary, the study area has generally been subject to moderate disturbance through land clearing and the development of the residential structures which remain extant on the site at present. Erosion of the upper natural soil profile is likely to have occurred following land clearing, due to the upper slope and gradient that the study area is situated upon.

10. Site inspection

A preliminary archaeological site inspection was undertaken on 29th November 2021 by Francesca McMaster (heritage advisor) of Extent Heritage. The objective of the inspection was to identify any previously unrecorded Aboriginal objects and/or areas of archaeological potential that may be present within the study area, and to assess the level of previous ground disturbance. The study area consists of two residential lots, 679-681 Old Northern Road and 683-685 Old Northern Road, containing residential structures on each (Figure 10 and Figure 11). Topographically the study area is located on the upper slope of a ridgeline, sloping eastward away from Old Northern Road. Prior to urbanisation the study area would have afforded a view east towards Berowra Creek and west towards the Blue Mountains.

The site inspection confirmed that the study area has been subject to moderate disturbance since European contact, namely from land clearing and the development of the two allotments for residential purposes. Overall, most of the study area was covered by grass with little visibility of the soil or soil profile afforded. At 679-681 Old Northern Road the grass was thick and overgrown in places with the only exposure present at the front of the property where gravel had been laid (Figure 12 and Figure 13). Several mature eucalypts were present on the allotment, they were inspected for any potential cultural modifications, but none were noted (Figure 14 and Figure 15). The size of the trees suggests that they were likely less than 100 years old. The structure at 679-681 Old Northern Road was a two-storey brick and weatherboard building (Figure 16). A concrete driveway provided access on the northern side of the property (Figure 17). At the rear of the house was a pool that had partially been dug into the slope of the hillside (Figure 18 and Figure 19).

683-685 Old Northern Road consisted of a single storey brick structure with a concrete driveway providing access to a carport at the front of the property (Figure 20). The rear yard was grassed with several small trees at the perimeter (Figure 21). Two concrete tanks were observed on the south-eastern side of the house (Figure 22). Two areas of exposed soil were visible at 683-685 Old Northern Road. One on the northern side of the property indicated a mixed clay fill, likely associated with the construction of the house. Another exposure was visible in the front portion of the property and revealed a mixed sandy loam material with some gravel inclusions. This exposure appears to have been the result of downslope erosion.

No Aboriginal sites or objects were identified during the survey, including in areas of good ground surface exposure and visibility.

11. Conclusions

This report assessed the proposed health services facility for the potential of Aboriginal objects to occur within the study area. Based on the environmental and archaeological background of the region, it is considered that the main evidence of past Aboriginal occupation would be in the form of artefacts (scatters or isolated finds) and potential archaeological deposits found upon and/or within a shallow duplex soil profile. Typically, the cultural deposits (if present) would be constrained to the upper 10-30cm of natural soils. A review of historical documentation indicates that the soil profile is likely disturbed and/or removed by historical land use activities, which is likely to have resulted in the partial and/or total loss of the soil profile that is critical to the survivability of cultural deposits (if present). A site inspection confirmed this disturbance and the landform the study area is situated on, and did not identify any Aboriginal sites, objects or places.

No Aboriginal objects or places as defined by the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* are located within the study area. Therefore, an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit approval is not currently required for the proposal.

There are currently no places within the study area included on the National, Commonwealth or World lists under the EPBC Act. There are no known Declarations under the ATSIHPA in relation to the study area. No Commonwealth heritage approvals are currently required with respect to Aboriginal heritage.

With reference to the risk management process set out in the *Due Diligence Code of Practice* for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW (DECCW, 2010), we note:

- There are no AHIMS sites recorded within the study area.
- The study area does not contain a landscape feature which is likely to indicate the presence of Aboriginal objects.
- The study area is located within an area of 'disturbed land' as defined in the Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW DECCW 2010.

The location of the study area on 'disturbed land' means the risk of encountering Aboriginal objects is lower than on undisturbed land. In accordance with Step 2b of the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* DECCW 2010, the proposed health services facility may 'proceed with caution'.

While the process set out in the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* DECCW 2010 indicates 'proceed with caution' for the proposed health services facility, there is always some risk that unexpected Aboriginal cultural deposits or skeletal remains may be encountered during development works, including in areas such as the current study area that have been heavily disturbed by prior earthworks.



12. Recommendations

In accordance with the risk management process set out in the *Due Diligence Code of Practice* for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW (DECCW, 2010) and the legal requirements of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974*, we recommend:

- 1. No Aboriginal objects are recorded within the study area. Therefore, there are no Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit approvals currently required for the proposed health services facility.
- The proposed health services facility may 'proceed with caution' in accordance with the risk management process set out in the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW.*
- 3. While the works may proceed with caution, there remains some potential for the presence of unexpected Aboriginal objects or Aboriginal skeletal remains within the study area.
- 4. In the event that unexpected Aboriginal objects (or potential Aboriginal objects) are discovered during development, all works in the vicinity of the discovery site should cease and Healing ONR should immediately notify Heritage NSW, to determine whether further Aboriginal heritage assessment or permit approvals are required.
- 5. It is an offence to harm Aboriginal objects without an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit approval from Heritage NSW. Work must not recommence at the location of the discovery site until any necessary permits under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 have been approved by Heritage NSW and all permit conditions have been completed.
- If any suspected human skeletal remains are identified during development, all works in the vicinity of the discovery site must cease immediately and Healing ONR should notify NSW Coroners Office, NSW Police and Heritage NSW for further advice.
- 7. The Coroners Act 2009 requires that all works must cease immediately when human skeletal remains are discovered, and the NSW Police and the NSW Coroner's Office must be immediately notified for further advice.
- 8. Traditional Aboriginal burials (older than 100 years) are protected under the *National Parks* and *Wildlife Act 1974* and must not be disturbed unless in accordance with specific approvals provided by Heritage NSW.
- 9. Interpreting the age and nature of skeletal remains is a specialist field and an appropriately skilled archaeologist or physical anthropologist should be engaged to inspect the discovery site and recommend an appropriate course of action in accordance with the requirements of the *Coroners Act 2009* and the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974*.
- 10. Should the skeletal material prove to be of Aboriginal ancestry and greater than 100 years old, notification of Heritage NSW and the Metropolitan Local Aboriginal Land Council will be required. Notification should also be made to the Commonwealth Minister for the Environment, under the provisions of the *Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984.*

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Appendix A. Information on legislation

A.1. Commonwealth Legislation

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act was enacted at a Federal level to preserve and protect areas (particularly sacred sites) and objects of particular significance to Aboriginal Australians from damage or desecration. Steps necessary for the protection of a threatened place are outlined in a gazetted Ministerial Declaration (Sections 9 and 10). This can include the preclusion of development.

As well as providing protection to areas, it can also protect objects by Declaration, in particular Aboriginal skeletal remains (Section 12). Although this is a Federal Act, it can be invoked on a State level if the State is unwilling or unable to provide protection for such sites or objects.

Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999

The Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act provides for the protection of natural and cultural heritage places. The Act establishes (amongst other things) a National Heritage List (NHL) and a Commonwealth Heritage List (CHL). Places on the NHL are of natural or cultural significance at a national level and can be in public or private ownership. The CHL is limited to places owned or occupied by the Commonwealth which are of heritage significance for certain specified reasons.

Places listed on the NHL are considered to be of State and local heritage value, even if State or local various heritage lists do not specifically include them.

The heritage values of places on the NHL or the CHL are protected under the terms of the EPBC Act. The Act requires that the Minister administering the EPBC Act assess any action which has, will have, or is likely to have, a significant impact on the heritage values of a listed place. The approval (or rejection) follows the referral of the matter by the relevant agency's Minister.

Native Title Act 1993

The Native Title Act provides recognition and protection for native title. The Act established the National Native Title Tribunal to administer native title claims to rights and interests over lands and waters by Aboriginal people. The Tribunal also administers the future act processes that attract the right to negotiate under the Native Title Act 1993.

The Act also provides for Indigenous Land Use Agreements (ILUA). An ILUA is an agreement between a native title group and others about the use and management of land and waters. ILUAs were introduced as a result of amendments to the Native Title Act in 1998. They allow people to negotiate flexible, pragmatic agreements to suit their particular circumstances.

An ILUA can be negotiated over areas where native title has, or has not yet, been determined. They can be part of a native title determination, or settled separately from a native title claim. An ILUA can be negotiated and registered whether there is a native title claim over the area or not.



A.2. NSW state legislation

Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979

The Environmental Planning and Assessment Act (EP&A Act) requires that environmental and heritage impacts are considered by consent authorities prior to granting development approvals. The relevant sections of the EP&A Act are:

- Part 4: Development that requires consent under consideration of environmental planning instruments.
- Part 5: An assessment process for activities undertaken by Public Authorities and for developments that do not require development consent but an approval under another mechanism.

Where Project Approval is to be determined under Part 4 (Division 4.1) of the Act, further approvals under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974, are not required. In those instances, management of Aboriginal heritage follows the applicable Aboriginal assessment guidelines (the Guidelines for Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Impact Assessment and Community Consultation, July 2005) and any relevant statement of commitments included in the Development Approval.

National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974

The National Parks and Wildlife Act (NPW Act) provides blanket protection for Aboriginal objects (material evidence of Indigenous occupation) and Aboriginal places (areas of cultural significance to the Aboriginal community) across New South Wales. An Aboriginal object is defined as:

Any deposit, object or material evidence (not being a handicraft made for sale) relating to the Aboriginal habitation of the area that comprises New South Wales, being habitation before or concurrent with (or both) the occupation of that area by persons of non-Aboriginal extraction, and includes Aboriginal remains.

An Aboriginal place is any place declared to be an Aboriginal place by the Minister for the Environment, under section 84 of the Act.

It is an offence to disturb Aboriginal objects or places without a permit authorised by the Director-General of the Office of Environment and Heritage. In addition, anyone who discovers an Aboriginal object is obliged to report the discovery to OEH.

The operation of the NPW Act is administered by OEH. With regard to the assessment of Aboriginal cultural heritage, OEH has endorsed the following guidelines:

- Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW 2010),
- Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (OEH 2010),
- Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents (2010), and



 Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW (2011).

Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983

The Aboriginal Land Rights Act allows for the transfer of ownership to a Local Aboriginal Land Council of vacant Crown land not required for an essential purpose or for residential land. These lands are then managed and maintained by the Local Aboriginal Land Council.
