Preliminary Aboriginal archaeological site investigation, Lot 6 DP703806, 51 Winter Lane, Summer Hill Creek NSW

1. Background

A large lot residential subdivision is proposed for Lot 6 DP703806, 51 Winter Lane, Summer Hill Creek NSW. The proposed lots will range in size from 2.64ha to 3.13ha. The residual lot will have an area of 31.64ha. The development will involve the construction of access roads, installation of services and construction of dwellings and associated infrastructure. The site comprises grazing on cleared grasslands.

A preliminary aboriginal archaeological assessment is required as part of the development application.

2. Scope

Search of the Department of Environment, Climate Change and Water Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) for Aboriginal archaeological sites within Lot 6 DP703806, 51 Winter Lane, Summer Hill Creek NSW.

3. Method

The AHIMS database was searched for Aboriginal sites in or near the investigation area.

4. Results

The AHIMS search was undertaken on Lot 6 DP703806, 51 Winter Lane, Summer Hill Creek NSW, with a buffer of 50 metres.

The search of the AHIMS database did not identify any recorded aboriginal sites or declared aboriginal places in or near the search location.

A copy of the report is included as Attachment 1.

5. Conclusion

No aboriginal sites or places were identified on Lot 6 DP703806, 51 Winter Lane, Summer Hill Creek NSW.

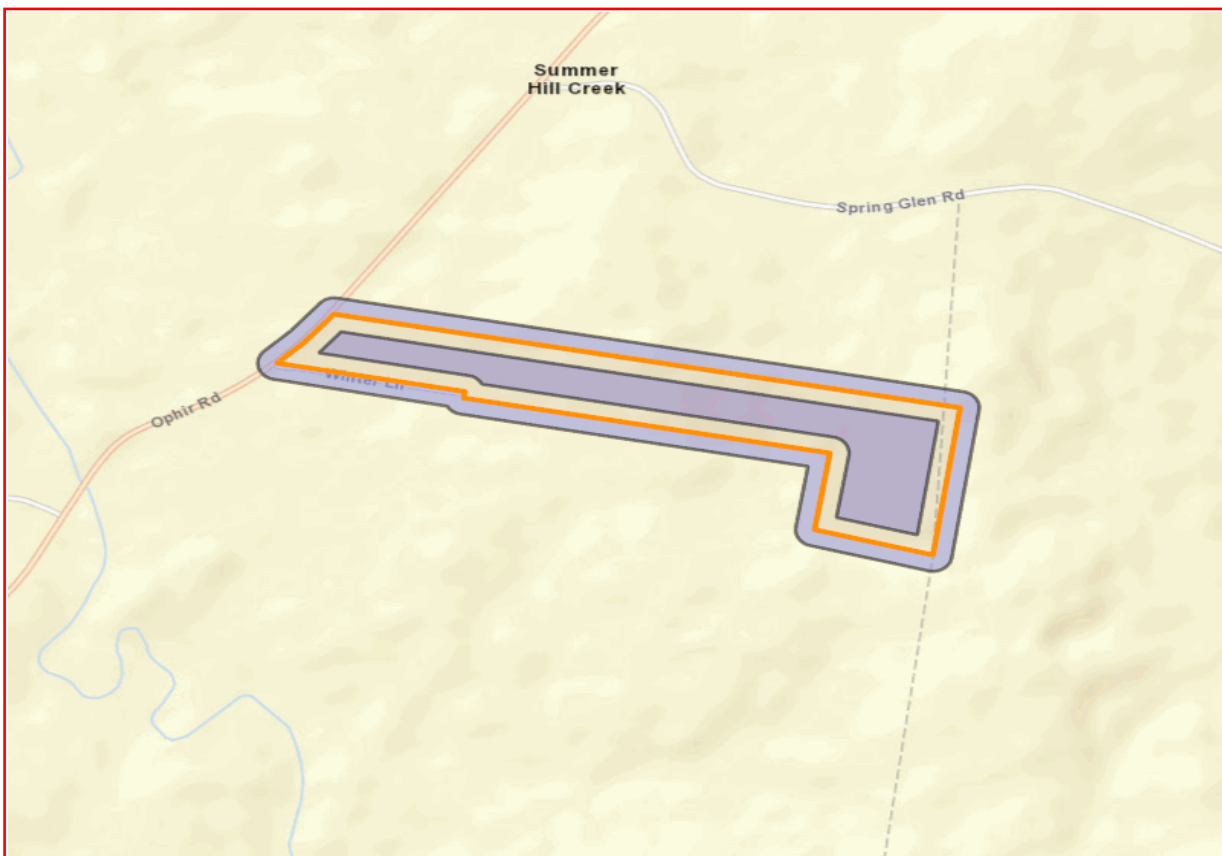
