Executive Summary

Heritage Now Pty Ltd was engaged by McCloy Project Management Pty Ltd to undertake an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment report to support a Planning Proposal for proposed rezoning, subdivision and subsequent residential development.

The Project Area is located at 39-41 Brocklesby Road, Medowie, and is approximately 5 hectares in size. It comprises Lot 2 DP508780 and Lots 300-301 DP625002, and is freehold land. The Project Area is located approximately 23km north-east of Newcastle in the Port Stephens Local Government Area and within the Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council boundaries.

A search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System did not identify any previously registered sites within the Project Area or its vicinity. Predictive modelling identified that as the Project Area is not within 300m of wetlands or fresh water it was unlikely to have been a place of intensive occupation and was more likely to have been subject to very low intensity use for hunting or gathering resources or for transitory movement.

The Project Area was surveyed on Friday 17 March 2023 by Sarah Mané and Kyle Howie (Heritage Consultants from Heritage Now), with Jamie Merrick (Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council), Bec Young (Mur-Roo-Ma Inc.), and Rachel Davis (Nur-Run-Gee Pty Ltd).

No Aboriginal sites, potential archaeological deposits or areas of sensitivity were identified within the Project Area. As a result, there are no impacts to Aboriginal cultural values as a result of the proposed works. The works may proceed, with the following precautionary recommendations:

Recommendation 1

All on-site personnel are to be made aware of their obligations under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NSW). This includes protection of Aboriginal sites and the reporting of any new Aboriginal, or suspected Aboriginal heritage sites. This may be done through an on-site induction or other suitable format.

Recommendation 2

In the unlikely event that Aboriginal, or suspected Aboriginal archaeological material is uncovered during the development, then works in that area are to stop and the area is to be cordoned off. The Project Manager is to contact the Heritage Consultant to make an assessment as to whether the material is classed as Aboriginal object/s under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NSW) and advise on the required management and mitigation measures. Works are not to recommence in the cordoned off area until heritage clearance is given and/or the required management and mitigation measures have been implemented.

Recommendation 3

In the very unlikely event that human remains, or suspected human remains are uncovered during the development, then works in that area are to stop and the area is to be cordoned off. The Project Manager is to contact the NSW Police to establish whether the area is a crime scene. If it is not a crime scene, and the remains are determined to be Aboriginal ancestral remains, then Heritage NSW is to be notified via the Environment Line on 131 555 and management measures are to be devised



in consultation with the local Aboriginal community. Works are not to recommence in the area until the management measures have been implemented.

1 Introduction

Heritage Now Pty Ltd (Heritage Now) was engaged by McCloy Project Management Pty Ltd to undertake an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHA) report to support a Planning Proposal for proposed rezoning, subdivision and subsequent residential development.

This report is a combination of an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHA) and an Archaeological Report (AR)¹ as per Heritage NSW guidelines. The key objectives of this assessment are to identify cultural heritage values through consultation with Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs), and provide recommendations to manage and protect Aboriginal objects and values identified during the assessment.

1.1 Project Area

The Project Area is located approximately 23km north-east of Newcastle in the Port Stephens Local Government Area and within the Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council (LALC) boundaries (Figure 1-Figure 2). The Project Area is located at 39-41 Brocklesby Road, Medowie, and is approximately 5 hectares in size. It comprises Lot 2 DP508780 and Lots 300-301 DP625002, and is freehold land.

1.2 Overview of Project Proposal

The planning proposal will seek to rezone 39, 39A and 41 Brocklesby Road, Medowie as follows:

- Rezone RU2 Rural Landscape to R2 Low Density Residential,
- Reduce the Minimum Lot Size from 2ha to 350m², and
- Identify the site as an Urban Release Area (URA).

1.3 Project Methodology

This ACHA report was prepared in accordance with, but not limited to, the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974, the National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2019 and the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979. The following guidelines and codes of practice have been used in preparing this ACHA report:

- Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW (OEH 2011)
- Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010 (DECCW 2010a).
- Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in NSW (DECCW 2010b)

In accordance with the guidelines this report has outlined:

- The Project Area and proposed activity (project proposal) (Section 1.2 and 7.1)
- The Aboriginal consultation process (Section 3 and Appendix 1),
- Relevant background information (Section 4.1 and 4.2),
- An assessment of cultural heritage values (Section 6),
- An impact assessment, including consideration of avoidance and/or mitigating harm (Section 7), and



• Recommendations (Section 8).

2 Legislative Context

This section provides an outline of the Acts, Regulations and guidelines under which this assessment was undertaken. It is for information purposes only and should not be taken as legal advice.

2.1 Native Title Act 1993 (Cth)

The Native Title Act 1993 recognises and protects the native title rights and interests of Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders. The Act established the National Native Title Tribunal as an independent body to administer native title claims. It also authorises the making and registration of Indigenous Land Use Agreements about the use and management of land or waters.

A search of the National Native Title Tribunal registers of native title information was undertaken on 9 March 2023. There are no relevant entries for the Project Area on the Register of Native Title Claims, National Native Title Register, or Register of Indigenous Land Use Agreements.

2.2 National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974

The National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NPW Act) contains provisions for protecting Aboriginal objects and declared Aboriginal Places in NSW. An Aboriginal object is defined as:

...any deposit, object or material evidence (not being a handicraft made for sale) relating to the Aboriginal habitation of the area that comprises New South Wales, being habitation before or concurrent with (or both) the occupation of that area by persons of non-Aboriginal extraction, and includes Aboriginal remains.

An Aboriginal Place is an area of land that "is or was of special significance with respect to Aboriginal culture", and is recognised by a declaration published in the Government Gazette by the Minister for Environment and Heritage.

Under Section 86 of the NPW Act, it is an offence to harm (destroy, deface or damage) or desecrate an Aboriginal object or an Aboriginal Place. The definition of harm includes moving an object from the land on which it is situated. The NPW Act sets out tiered strict liability offences and penalties for harming or desecrating Aboriginal objects or places.

Under Section 87, there are certain defences to the offence of harm. These include that harm was carried out under an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP); that due diligence was exercised to determine if an action would harm an Aboriginal object; or that an activity was prescribed by the National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2019 as being low impact.

Under Section 89A, an Aboriginal object must be reported to Heritage NSW within a reasonable timeframe unless they have previously been recorded and submitted to the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS).

2.2.1 National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2019

This Regulation provides a framework for exercising due diligence and outlines codes of practice in respect to Aboriginal objects (Section 57), as well as defences for carrying out certain low-impact activities (Section 58). The Regulation also outlines requirements for Aboriginal consultation (Section 60), particularly in relation to an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit. Under the Regulation, the following codes of practice are recognised, amongst others:



- Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW (DECCW 2010c),
- NSW Minerals Industry Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects (NSW Minerals Council 2010), and
- Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in NSW (DECCW 2010b).

2.3 Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983

This Act provides land rights to Aboriginal people through the Local Aboriginal Land Councils. It details a process for claiming unused Crown land in NSW and for enabling land use. It also allows for agreements to permit traditional hunting, fishing and gathering. The Office of the Registrar, Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 (NSW) (ORALRA), registers land claims and maintains the Register of Aboriginal Land Claims and Register of Aboriginal Owners.

The Project Area is not Crown land and cannot be subject to a claim under this Act.

2.4 Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979

The Environmental Planning and Assessment (EP&A) Act provides triggers for undertaking environmental and heritage assessments as part of the wider land-use planning framework. This Act has three main parts of direct relevance to Aboriginal cultural heritage: Part 3, which governs the preparation of planning instruments; Part 4, which relates to development assessment provisions for local government (consent) authorities; and Part 5, which relates to activity approvals by governing (determining) authorities. Planning decisions within Local Government Areas (LGAs) are guided by Local Environmental Plans (LEPs). Each LGA is required to develop and maintain an LEP that includes Aboriginal and historical heritage items which are protected under the EP&A Act and the NPW Act.

The Project Area is located within the Port Stephens LGA and falls under the Port Stephens LEP.

2.4.1 Port Stephens Local Environmental Plan 2013

The Port Stephens LEP 2013 requires development consent to demolish, disturb, excavate or develop land on which an Aboriginal object is located or that is within an Aboriginal place of significance. Council must consider the effect of a proposal on an Aboriginal Place and any Aboriginal object located within an area of works. Council must inform the local Aboriginal community about the application where impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage may occur. Protected heritage under the LEP is listed in Schedule 5.

There are no Aboriginal sites or objects of heritage significance in the Project Area listed on the LEP.

3 Aboriginal Consultation

This section documents the Aboriginal consultation that was undertaken for the project in accordance with the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010* (OEH, formerly DECCW 2010b) and will be referred to as the 'Aboriginal Consultation Requirements'. The four stages of Aboriginal consultation were undertaken and additional documentation is available in Appendix 1.

3.1 Stage 1

In accordance with Stage 1 of the Aboriginal Consultation Requirements, requests for information on knowledge holders were sent to the Heritage NSW Office, the Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council, the Office of the Registrar, Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983, Native Title Services, the Port Stephens Council and the Hunter office of Local Land Services. The National Native Title Tribunal only accepts searches of Crown land for Aboriginal knowledge holders. There is no Crown land in the Project Area.

Based on information collected from government agencies, expressions of interest were sent to the knowledge holders inviting them to become a Registered Aboriginal Party for the project on 18 February 2023.

A public notice was placed in the Port Stephens Examiner local newspaper on 16 February 2023.

As a result of the expressions of interest invitations and the public notice, 11 Aboriginal representatives nominated to become Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs) for the Project (Table 1).

3.4 Summary

As a result of the Aboriginal consultation process, 11 Registered Aboriginal Parties were identified. Feedback from the Aboriginal consultation was incorporated into the assessment of significance and the development of heritage management and mitigation strategies for the Project.

4 Environmental and Heritage Context

4.1 Environmental Context

This section provides the environmental context for the assessment of past Aboriginal occupation in the Project Area.

4.1.1 Geology and Soils

The Project Area is located within one class of geological formations: the Tomago Coal Measures, consisting of shale, mudstone, sandstone, coal, tuff and clay (Gorbet and Chestnut 1975). Suitable quality sandstone in this region could provide natural sandstone exposures suitable for grinding axes and other stone artefacts.

The Project Area is located across the Medowie soil landscape (Figure 3), which is residual and comprises gently undulating low hills on relict sediments in the Medowie Lowlands region, with very broad, flat crests and long, gently inclining side-slopes (slopes 2-15%, elevation 30-70m). This soil landscape is expected to consist of 30-60cm of brown fine sandy clay loam (A horizon), overlying yellowish brown pedal clay (B horizon) (Department of Planning, Industry & Environment (DPIE) 2022). Archaeological deposits within duplex soils are generally limited to A horizon soils, as B horizon soils often predate human occupation (Hughes, Spooner, and Questiaux 2014, 36). Furthermore, B horizon clay soils (or bedrock) form a compact barrier through which artefacts typically do not penetrate. Therefore, if the Medowie soils have not been subject to erosion or stripping, and depending on the landform upon which they are located and in consideration of surrounding archaeological indicators, they are likely to consist of 60cm of potential artefact bearing deposit.

4.1.2 Topography, Hydrology and Landforms

The topography, hydrology and landforms of the Project Area provide information on the likelihood and nature of past Aboriginal occupation.

Access to fresh water is known to have been a primary consideration for Aboriginal people when establishing a suitable camp location. Studies from the Hunter Valley (Peter Kuskie and Kamminga 2000; Peter Kuskie 2015a) demonstrate that areas within 300m of wetlands and fresh water are considered to have been ideal locations for camping and focused occupation (i.e., repeated visits, visits of longer duration). Conversely, areas further than 300m from wetlands and/or water sources were outside the primary or secondary resource zones and are considered likely to only have had low to very low intensity use for hunting and/or gathering during the course of the normal daily round, or for transitory movement.

The Project Area is located on side-slopes between two hills and has an elevation of 30m. There is a 3rd order, non-perennial waterbody approximately 1.5km east of the Project Area, which forms part of Moffats Swamp. This unnamed waterbody flows into the perennial estuarine Saltwater Creek approximately 4km east, which flows into Port Stephens. The Project Area is also situated approximately 2km north-east from Campvale Swamp.

4.1.3 Flora and Fauna

This section is intended to give a general overview of the flora and fauna that may have been used by Aboriginal people in the past. The information is supplied for understanding the past Aboriginal use of the landscape and is not intended for ecological assessment purposes.

Past Aboriginal people are likely to have encountered vegetation similar to the Sydney Coastal Dry Sclerophyll Forests in the Project Area. This vegetation class contains open eucalypt forests and woodlands 10-25m tall with a prominent and diverse sclerophyll shrub understorey and ground cover of sclerophyll sedges. Canopy trees include Sydney red gum and red bloodwood. In gullies, Sydney peppermint, old-man banksia and Christmas bush may also be present. Ridges may also have brown stringybark, broad-leaved and narrow-leaved scribbly gum and silvertop ash. Shrubs include flax-leaved and sunshine wattle, hairpin banksia, wallum heath, waxflower, grey and pink spider flower, broad-leaved hakea and drumsticks, mountain devil, prickly broom-heath, broad-leaved and pine-leaved geebung, heath phyllota and grass trees. The grassy layers include bushy clubmoss and leafy purple flag.

Of these flora, old man and hairpin banksia, broad-leaved geebung and grass trees are known to have been used by Aboriginal people, as well as attracting animals which could be hunted. Some of these species would have been used as raw materials for implements and weaving, as well as food and medicine. Geebung, for instance, has known antiseptic properties and some varieties produce edible fruit (Robinson 1991, 100). The broad-leaved geebung has edible fruit as well as seeds. The juice and flesh of unripe fruit were used for treating burns, scratches and rashes. The ripe fruit on the ground also attracted possums, bandicoots and wallabies (Caton and Hardwick 2018, 337).

The nectar of the flowers of old-man and hairpin banksia were used as a sweetener and the dried flowers used to strain water. The flowers also attracted parrots, bandicoots and possums, which were often hunted in the vicinity of the trees. The seeds were edible, and grubs beneath the bark provided a source of protein. The cones were used to carry fire as they smoulder for long periods (Caton and Hardwick 2018, 46,122). The nectar of mountain devil was used as a sweetener and areas

with mountain devil were good for hunting reptiles who were attracted to insects feeding on the nectar (Caton and Hardwick 2018, 335).

Grass trees had multiple uses. The leaf bases were edible, along with the immature seeds and flowers, the terminal bud and rhizomes. The tree resin was used as an adhesive, including attaching stone barbs to spears. The flower stems were used as spear shafts, particularly for fishing spears. The leaves were used as cutting tools, as well as for basket weaving (Caton and Hardwick 2018, 129).

These forests and heaths provide the habitat for wallabies, kangaroos, potoroos, possums, bats and quolls. These faunae could have provided a source of food and their hides could be used as a resource to make clothing.

4.1.4 Land Use

Land is disturbed if it has been the subject of human activity that has changed the land's surface, being changes that remain clear and observable. Examples include ploughing, construction of rural infrastructure, roads, trails and tracks, vegetation clearance, construction of buildings, structures and utilities and other impacts involving earthworks (DECCW 2010c, 18).

Parish maps indicate that the land where the Project Area is situated was originally owned by Richard Windeyer, and show how close the Project Area is to both Moffats Swamp and Campvale Swamp (Figure 4).

A series of historic aerials between 1954 and 2001 show a change in land use and development within the Project Area, as well as its surrounds. In a 1954 aerial (Figure 5), there is only one building, possibly a residential dwelling, with a driveway within the Project Area, located on Lot 301 in the approximate position of the building currently on this lot. This aerial also shows portions of cleared land on the east and western portions of the Project Area for agricultural use, possibly orchard or plantation trees. An aerial from 1966 (Figure 6) shows more land cleared on the eastern portion, and the orchard/plantation trees only in the western portion of the Project Area. There is also a rectangular patch of land located behind the pre-existing building, which appears to be cleared of turf. In the 1974 aerial (Figure 7), multiple buildings are visible within the Area. In Lot 2, there is a building located on the eastern edge of the remaining pre-existing dense vegetation, which is in the same position as the current residential house. There is also a small building (possibly a shed) on the southern edge of the Project Area, and another to the west of the dense vegetation. All buildings have access tracks or driveways. Orchard/plantation trees are spread across the southern portion of the Area (Lots 300 and 301), with some also in Lot 2. In the 1984 aerial (Figure 8), there is a residential building on Lot 300 and an outbuilding (possibly a shed) in the western portion of this Lot. The small building west of the dense vegetation in Lot 2 is no longer there. Orchard/plantation trees are only seen in the western section of Lot 301. In the 1993 aerial (Figure 9), there are more buildings in Lot 301, near the pre-existing dwelling. There also appears to be a swimming pool next to the residential building on Lot 2. There is planted vegetation around the perimeter of Lot 2, which define the Lot's boundary. The majority of land within the Project Area is cleared, except for the preexisting dense vegetation in the middle of Lot 2. Orchard/plantation trees are only visible in Lot 2, with a large group in the west of the Lot, a thin strip west of the dense vegetation, and another thin strip east of the residential building. The 1998 aerial reflects what the Project Area looks like today (Figure 10). Both residential buildings on Lot 300 and 301 have been extended, and the orchard/plantation trees in the west of Lot 2 have become dense vegetation.

Currently, the Project Area contains several buildings, and has areas of dense vegetation, similar to what is seen in the 1998 aerial. While coal mining is known to have occurred in the general area, mining does not appear to have occurred within the Project Area itself.

The planting and removal of orchard/plantation trees, the construction and demolition of the buildings shown in the historic aerials, and construction of the current buildings and installation of associated services (including water and sewer, telecommunications and electricity) is likely to have had an impact on the archaeology of the Project Area. It is unknown whether any of the buildings had basements, and there is a pool located on Lot 2. However, as there was no mining conducted within the Project Area and there is a remaining area of dense vegetation, it is possible that any subsurface deposits may not have been greatly disturbed. The degree of disturbance was further examined during the visual inspection (Section 5).

4.1.5 Synthesis

The Project Area is situated on the side-slopes of two low hills, approximately 1.4km from a nonperennial fresh water stream. As the Project Area is located in the vicinity of forest, estuarine, swamp and riverine resources, it may have historically been attractive as a resource and food gathering location for past Aboriginal people. The historical land use of the Project Area suggests that the ground has been disturbed by land clearing, planting of orchard/plantation trees, construction and demolition of buildings, as well as the installation of associated services (including

water, sewer, telecommunications, and electricity). However, as there is a section of remaining uncleared vegetation, and mining activities are not known to have taken place in the Project Area, it is possible that any subsurface archaeological deposits may not have been greatly disturbed.

4.2 Heritage Context

A review of the archaeological, ethno-historical and post-contact history of an area provides contextual information for Aboriginal sites within the local and regional landscape. Previous archaeological research undertaken in the region, as well as a review of environmental factors, can inform predictive models for the locations of Aboriginal sites. Predictive models can be further refined by the consideration of the post-contact land use of the area which may identify potential sources of post-depositional disturbances that may have occurred.

4.2.1 Historic Records of Aboriginal Occupation (Ethnohistory)

The Worimi are the traditional custodians of the area now known as Port Stephens, and the area continues to hold cultural significance to the Worimi community today. The southern boundary of Worimi Country is thought to begin on the northern side of the Hunter River (near Newcastle) and extend west towards Maitland. The northern boundary was Forster, and then inland their territory extended to Gresford, Glendon Brook, Dungog and the upper Myall Creek (Tindale 1974). Oral histories passed down by elders record that their territory was bound by four rivers, these being the Hunter River in the south, the Manning River in the north and the Allyn and Patterson Rivers in the west (Worimi Conservation Lands n.d.). The European understanding of this roughly translates to the same territory and includes the whole Port Stephens area, including the Project Area in Medowie.

The social organisation of the Worimi was recorded by Enright, who began studying the Worimi language and material culture in the 1890s. He described how the Worimi people were divided into four bands (which usually consists of a small kin group, an extended family or clan), known as Guruagal, Maiangal, Gamipingal and Buraigal (Enright 1900; 1932). Each of these clan groups had a specific territory within the broader Worimi country. Worimi people use the term "ngurra" to identify groups living within their own particular territory, and elders record that there were eighteen different ngurra, although these were generally categorised within four distinct groups, with Maiangal and Gamaipingal being saltwater groups, and Garuagal and Buraigal being inland groups (Worimi Conservation Lands n.d.).

In 1826, Robert Dawson, an agent for the Australian Agricultural Company (which acquired one million acres from Port Stephens to the Manning River), set up camp near the shoreline of Port Stephens at Carrington. He described the Worimi people more favourably than other groups he had encountered, and apparently did his best to protect them from the violence of cedar cutters and convicts. The presence of colonists had profound effects on the local Aboriginal people, displacing them from the land and resources, and disrupting their way of life. Dawson noted that during his period of residence, Aboriginal people discarded their traditional tools, replacing them with European axes and fishhooks (made of iron). Many Aboriginal people were "employed" by the Australian Agricultural Company (in return for food and clothing), with jobs including carrying water, collecting and chopping wood, catching fish, sawing planks, rowing boats, burning shells into lime, washing clothes and caring for children.

Despite these general associations and historical records for the region, there are no known specific historic records which reference the Project Area at Brocklesby Road, Medowie. This is not to

suggest that Aboriginal people did not have a presence in the area, just that local histories often pay little attention to the Aboriginal history of the locality (OEH 2011).

4.2.2 Archaeological Background

Australia and New Guinea were connected as a single continental landmass called Sahul and have been occupied by humans for at least 65,000 years (Clarkson et al. 2017). Eastern NSW has been occupied from at least 50,000 years ago (Williams et al. 2017). The earliest archaeological evidence of occupation from the Port Stephens area is 14,000 years Before Present (BP), a date that comes from the Moffats Swamp Dune approximately 1.5km east of the Project Area (Baker 1994).

There are many types of evidence of past Aboriginal occupation which form the archaeological record of a region. Places which show evidence of Aboriginal occupation of an area in the past are described as archaeological sites. These sites contain numerous site features, as defined in Table 4. Some archaeological sites contain more than one of these features.

Most details of known Aboriginal archaeology in the region are contained in the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS), which is discussed below.

4.2.3 Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS)

Aboriginal sites recorded in NSW are registered with geographic co-ordinates in the AHIMS, and are protected under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974. Information in AHIMS can provide information on Aboriginal site patterning as well as showing if Aboriginal sites occur in the Project Area.

The AHIMS was searched on 23 January 2023 covering a 6km x 6km area (from coordinates GDA, Zone 56, Eastings 388602 to 400602, Northings 6370343 to 6382343). The search produced a result

of 65 sites (Figure 6). The patterning of sites corresponds with development in the area including roads, utilities and residential development, rather than specific environmental features.

Almost 70% of the total number of sites comprise stone artefacts (including isolated finds and artefact scatters). Stone artefacts often dominate the archaeological record because they are preserved well in comparison to other materials such as bone implements, clothing, ornamentation, medicinal supplies, woven goods, and wooden weapons used by Aboriginal people. Sites with shells and potential archaeological deposits were also recorded in the region (Table 5).

The majority of sites identified in the search are valid, usually meaning they have not been subject to an AHIP. The AHIMS search indicated that one site has been completely destroyed/salvaged and thirteen sites have been partially destroyed/salvaged. The status of sites identified in the search is summarised in Table 6.

4.2.4 Heritage Report Summaries

Heritage reports relevant to the Project Area have been summarised in this section to provide an understanding of the previous assessments that have been undertaken and the implications for Aboriginal site patterning.

Smith (1988) Archaeological Survey, Tomago to Karuah section of the Tomago to Taree 132kV transmission line

An archaeological survey was conducted along a proposed transmission line between Tomago Sub-Station and Reedy Creek, approximately 1.6km north-west of the current Project Area. It was expected that midden sites may be found along Reedy and Twelve Mile Creeks, burials may be found in sand beds between Tomago and Medowie, artefact sites may be found on dry landforms (with larger sites closer to water), and scarred trees and stone arrangements may be found throughout the area.

The area was surveyed on foot, and two stone artefact scatters (TK 1 and TK 2) and an isolated stone artefact were identified. TK 1 was located approximately 110m south-west of tower number 66 in the existing easement and along a vehicle track, across an area approximately 2-5m x 100m. There were more than 50 artefacts identified in brown sand that was dumped in this location, and it is likely that these artefacts were transported in this sand. TK 2 was located on the west bank of Telegraph Swamp which had previously been dredged as a sand quarry, on the slope of a knoll in a 40m x 40m area. The artefact scatter consisted of over 1,000 artefacts which were eroding out of the knoll. As the artefacts at both TK 1 and TK 2 were similar in in material and artefact type, it was considered likely that the artefacts at TK 1 originated from the sand quarry. An isolated tan fine-grained silcrete flaked piece was identified on the southern slopes inside the existing easement.

Site TK 2 confirmed the prediction that larger artefact sites would occur close to water. Artefacts identified at TK 2 consisted of a wide range of materials, suggestive of multiple knapping events at this site. It was considered to be highly archeologically significant, with a high research value as

there were not many examples of artefact sites at inland sand beds. It was recommended that the sand quarry owners be informed of the site and that it be protected from further damage. It was also recommended that the site be stabilised due to ongoing erosion, and that the planned vehicle track avoid the knoll containing artefacts. Site TK 1 was considered to have low archaeological significance as the artefacts were not considered to be in situ; nevertheless, it was recommended that the artefacts be left in place as they were unlikely to be disturbed or destroyed by the development (Smith 1988).

Dean-Jones (1990) Study on the Newcastle Bight

This study researched and identified the different eras of sand sheets within the Newcastle Bight. Some of these sand sheets have been dated to the Pleistocene era and have the potential to contain evidence for early Aboriginal sites. The current Project Area is located approximately 3km north of this study area. The study identified that sites with dense concentrations of stone are found within this type of landscape in the Newcastle Bight. Further, the majority of the sites in the region (71%) were found to contain shells and shell fragments (Dean-Jones 1990).

Baker (1993) Archaeological Subsurface Testing, Moffats Swamp

Subsurface investigations were conducted at two sites along Richardson Road, south-west of Moffats Swamp in Medowie. The two sites (MS2 and MS3) were situated on sand dune crests. The current Project Area is located approximately 3km north of this study area. Investigations were conducted as there was a proposal to mine heavy titanium minerals (rutile and zircon) in the area. Regional information suggested that Aboriginal archaeological sites would most likely occur on the crest of dunes associated with water.

Testing involved several investigation methods. During auguring, over 80 holes (spaced 10m apart) were dug along 7 transects. When two transects crossed at the crest of a dune, an additional transect was dug in a perpendicular direction. A total of 3 artefacts (pink silcrete) were found, from 3 augur holes. At three locations, road cutting tests were conducted with two pits dug every metre down the cutting's slope. Only test pits 1 and 3 recovered artefacts: white chalky tuff and grey silcrete flakes, grey silcrete and yellow grey silcrete debitage, a yellow grey silcrete broken blade, and a yellow grey silcrete flaked piece from pit 1; and chalky white tuff flake from pit 3. A test pit (1m x 1m) was excavated adjacent to two augur holes that both recovered a silcrete artefact, in order to investigate the area further. The test pit recovered a small scatter of pink silcrete flakes, from a depth of 30-60cm. Shovel pits (40cm x 40cm) were dug to a depth of 50-60cm every 5m between road cutting test pit 3 and the test excavation area; a total of 10 pits were dug and 2 artefacts were recovered.

Site MS2 was not considered to be of archaeological significance, as only small flakes and debitage were recovered, indicating that the site had been previously destroyed from the construction or Richardson Road. This site was also not located in the path of the proposed mine and was not to be affected by mining activities. Site MS3 was also considered to be of low archaeological significance as it also consisted of small flakes and debitage, and was considered to belong to a single knapping event. It was recommended that MS2 be protected from disturbance and that the dune crest should not be impacted by post-mining rehabilitation. For site MS3, it was recommended that a Section 90 Consent to Destroy be obtained and that the site be salvaged (Baker 1993).

Biosis (2011) Archaeological Survey and Test Excavation, Campvale and Medowie

Investigations were conducted into a study area located in Campvale and Medowie, south-east of Grahamstown Lake, where a proposed underground electrical distribution cable was proposed to be installed. The study area is located approximately 4.6km south-west of the current Project Area, and extended across Wade Close and Richardson Road into the Tilligerry State Conservation Area.

A survey was conducted over 17 units and identified an artefact scatter (Campvale AS1). The previously recorded site AHIMS 38-3-0037 was located, although no artefacts were identified during this survey. As both sites had subsurface archaeological potential, subsurface testing was carried out. During subsurface testing, test pits (50cm x 50cm) were excavated along the proposed cable route (eight pits at Campvale AS1 and four pits at AHIMS 38-3-0037). No subsurface deposits were recovered at either site. Both sites were considered to have low archaeological potential. It was recommended that the potential cable path avoid Campvale AS1 and minimise its impact to AHIMS 38-3-0037. It was also recommended that an AHIP be obtained so that surface artefacts could be collected and moved (Biosis 2011).

4.2.5 Artefact Density Predictive Modelling

Predictive models are based upon the assumption that environmental factors provide distinctive sets of constraints that influence land use patterns (Kuskie 2015, p. 8). In the Hunter Valley, for instance, JW Fawcett in 1898 said of the Wonnarua, that when choosing the sites for their camps, access to fresh water was one essential, and a food resource of secondary importance, whilst a vantage point in case of attack by an enemy was third (Brayshaw 1987, 42).

Artefact density is linked to different types of activities falling on a scale from long-term occupation to short-term transitory movement. Attenbrow (2006) built on earlier archaeological models to develop a model of occupation within the Australian context, identifying base camps, activity camps and transit camps. Base camps are similar to residential bases in that they were occupied for a longer period of time (several days or longer). Activity camps, conversely, are characterised by short



periods of use, and are usually functionally specific. Activities that may take place at activity camps in Australia include hunting, artefact preparation, gathering of raw materials, and ceremonial activities (Attenbrow 2006, 220–21). 'Transit camp' refers to places that were used to camp for short periods, usually overnight, often when travelling between base camps or resource areas. Archaeologically, base camps are characterised by a larger archaeological context (in square metres), higher concentrations of stone artefacts, and a more diverse assemblage than transit and activity locations. Stone artefacts in these assemblages may show signs of tool manufacture and maintenance, skin working and food preparation (Attenbrow 2006, 221).

A clear trend has been identified in the Hunter Region in which higher artefact densities occur closer to wetlands, indicating that wetlands were a major focus of activity in the area (P Kuskie 1994). Specifically, areas within 300m of wetlands and fresh water are considered to have been suitable sites for camping and focused occupation (i.e., repeated visits, visits of longer duration), whereas areas further than 300m from wetlands and/or water sources were outside the primary or secondary resource zones, and would only have had low to very-low intensity use for hunting/gathering during the course of the normal daily round, or for transitory movement (Peter Kuskie 2015b).

As the Project Area is not within 300m of wetlands or fresh water it was unlikely to have been a place of intensive occupation, and was more likely to have been subject to very low intensity use for hunting or gathering resources or for transitory movement.

4.3 Summary of Local/Regional Character of Aboriginal Land Use and its Material Traces, and Archaeological Predictions for the Project Area

AHIMS search results indicate that artefacts, potential archaeological deposits and shell sites are the most common site types in the region, with shell sites occurring along the coastline or in association with larger rivers or wetland environments. This follows the predictive model patterning for the region. Based on the background research, it was predicted that, pending on site conditions and preservation rates, the Project Area may contain stone artefacts or potential archaeological deposits.

The environmental context of the Project Area influences the likelihood of locating such sites. The Project Area is situated on a gradual slope, over 1km away from wetlands and fresh water sources. Therefore, it is more likely to have been utilised on a low to very low basis for hunting/gathering or for transitory movement. Table 7 describes the assessed likelihood of Aboriginal archaeological site features being present in the Project Area, on a scale of very low – very high likelihood.

5 Archaeological Survey

The Project Area was surveyed on Friday 17 March 2023 by Sarah Mané and Kyle Howie, Heritage Consultants from Heritage Now, with Jamie Merrick of Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council, Bec Young of Mur-Roo-Ma Inc., and Rachel Davis of Nur-Run-Gee Pty Ltd. The aim of the survey was to identify any Aboriginal sites within the Project Area as per the guidelines (DECCW 2010b, 12).

5.1.1 Survey Units and Methods

Due to the whole Project Area being within the same landform element of a gradual slope, it was surveyed in one unit. The area was traversed by foot, generally with a 2-10 m spacing between survey personnel. Areas of high visibility and exposure were subject to detailed inspection. A summary of visibility and exposure is detailed in Table 8.

5.2 Survey Results

The Project Area consisted of a gradual slope oriented in an east-west direction, divided into three Lots. Each of these three Lots had road frontage to the east on Brocklesby Road (Plate 1), with a dwelling in the front portion facing east, a driveway and various smaller sheds and outbuildings (Plate 2), and fenced paddocks at the rear in the western portions (Plate 3-Plate 4). Vegetation varied from lawn cover, established gardens and remnant orchards, to open paddocks and areas of recently disturbed exposures after plantation felling.

Aerial imagery indicated dense vegetation in the north-western portion of the Project Area. During the survey, this portion was found to be devoid of vegetation, but extensive amounts of sticks, branches and broken wood pieces indicated the area had been recently cleared (Plate 5). The ground also appeared to have been churned up by machinery or to have introduced fill on the surface (Plate 6).

No Aboriginal archaeological sites, intact soils and/or potential archaeological deposits were identified.

5.2.1 Aboriginal Consultation

The representative from Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council and two representatives from local Worimi Traditional Owner groups were present during fieldwork and were satisfied that there were no Aboriginal sites, potential archaeological deposits or areas of cultural sensitivity within the Project Area. It was noted however that the removal of vegetation including large mature native trees prior to the survey was inappropriate, and that scarred trees could have previously been located within the Project Area. It was also noted that the nearby wetland areas (Moffats Swamp



and Campvale Swamp) would have been places highly utilised for resources in the past and that dated sites from these areas indicate a long presence of their ancestors in the region.

5.2.2 Summary

The Project Area was surveyed as three separate Lots but was considered all the same landform element and therefore the same survey unit. No Aboriginal sites, potential archaeological deposits or areas of sensitivity were identified within the Project Area.

6 Significance Assessment and Aboriginal Cultural Values

Cultural heritage refers to the tangible and intangible values that we choose to pass on to future generations. In order to identify the values worth passing on, a significance assessment needs to be undertaken. The significance assessment needs to identify the range of values present across the Project Area and assess their importance.

6.1 Methodology

Identifying the Aboriginal cultural values is part of the significance assessment process and is guided by the Burra Charter and the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW.*

There are four recognised classes of values under the Burra Charter (Australia ICOMOS 2013):

- Social,
- Historical,
- Aesthetic, and
- Scientific.

Within this significance assessment, Aboriginal cultural values are captured within social, historical and aesthetic values. The archaeological values are contained within scientific values.

Social value refers to the spiritual, traditional, historical or contemporary associations that Aboriginal people have for place. Historical value refers to the associations of a place with a historically important person, event, phase or activity in the Aboriginal community. Aesthetic value refers to the sensory, scenic, architectural and creative aspects of the place.

Archaeological values refer to the importance of the landscape, area, place or object because of its rarity, representativeness and the extent to which it may inform our understanding of Aboriginal culture.

6.1.1 Aboriginal Cultural Values Methodology

Aboriginal cultural values are identified through the Aboriginal consultation process. Formal opportunities for the Aboriginal community to contribute to identifying cultural values are provided in the ACHA methodology review period, during fieldwork and during the draft report review period. In addition, RAPs are invited to provide feedback at any time through the consultation process, by phone or in writing (email or letter).


6.1.2 Archaeological (Scientific) Values Methodology

Archaeological (scientific) values relate to whether the Project Area can contribute to our understanding of Aboriginal culture. Under the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW*, archaeological values are to be considered within the below sub-categories:

- Representativeness,
- Rarity,
- Research potential, and
- Educational potential.

Significance is expressed as grades: low, moderate or high.

6.2 Aboriginal Cultural Values Assessment

All of Worimi Country is considered to hold cultural value to Worimi Traditional Owners, but discussions during fieldwork indicated that there are no specific values associated with the Project Area, and no additional cultural values were identified when the draft ACHA report was sent out for review.

6.3 Archaeological Values Assessment

This section assesses the archaeological values of the Project Area according to the criteria in the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW*.

No Aboriginal sites, potential archaeological deposits or areas of sensitivity were identified within the Project Area, and therefore no archaeological values are considered to be present.

6.4 Summary: Statement of Significance

Any Aboriginal objects or features located in the Project Area would have cultural values and are likely to have archaeological values; however, no Aboriginal sites, potential archaeological deposits or areas of sensitivity were identified within the Project Area. In terms of cultural values, the Worimi People have strong connections with the landscape being part of Worimi Country.



7 Impact Assessment and Mitigation

This section assesses the potential impact of the proposed works in relation to Aboriginal heritage values in the Project Area and provides options for mitigating loss of Aboriginal cultural values.

7.1 Proposed Works

The proposed works include the rezoning, subdivision and subsequent residential development of the Project Area.

7.2 Impact Assessment

There are no impacts to Aboriginal cultural values as result of the proposed works.

7.3 Mitigation

7.3.1 General mitigation strategies

The below strategies have been developed to mitigate harm and/or loss of Aboriginal cultural values as a result of the proposed works.

All on-site personnel are to be made aware of their obligations under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974; this includes protection of Aboriginal sites and the reporting of any new Aboriginal, or suspected Aboriginal heritage sites. This may be done through an on-site induction or other suitable format.

In the unlikely event that Aboriginal, or suspected Aboriginal archaeological material is uncovered during the development, then works in that area are to stop and the area is to be cordoned off. The Project Manager is to contact the Heritage Consultant to make an assessment as to whether the material is classed as Aboriginal object/s under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NSW) and advise on the required management and mitigation measures. Works are not to recommence in the cordoned off area until heritage clearance is given and/or the required management and mitigation measures have been implemented.

In the very unlikely event that human remains, or suspected human remains are uncovered during the development, then works in that area are to stop and the area is to be cordoned off. The Project Manager is to contact the NSW Police to establish whether the area is a crime scene. If it is not a crime scene, and the remains are determined to be Aboriginal ancestral remains, then Heritage NSW is to be notified via the Environment Line on 131 555 and management measures are to be devised in consultation with the local Aboriginal community. Works are not to recommence in the area until the management measures have been implemented.

7.4 Consideration of Sustainable Development

Under the NSW Protection of the Environmental Administration Act 1991, ecologically sustainable development principles (ESD) are to be considered in the assessment of environmental impacts; this includes impacts to heritage. The consideration of ESD principles is required under the *Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in New South Wales.* In



particular, the precautionary principle and the principle of inter-generational equity are to be considered where there are proposed impacts to the environment (which includes heritage).

7.4.1 Precautionary Principle

The precautionary principle states that if there are threats of serious or irreversible damage to the environment, then a lack of full scientific certainty should not be used as a reason to postpone measures to prevent environmental degradation.

The proposed works do not pose a threat of serious or irreversible damage to the environment (specifically, Aboriginal sites).

7.4.2 Inter-generational Equity & Cumulative Harm

The principle of inter-generational equity states that the present generation should ensure the health, diversity and productivity of the environment are maintained or enhanced for the benefit of future generations. Cumulative harm involves understanding the cumulative effects of the Proposal.

The mitigation measures proposed satisfy the principle of inter-generational equity.

8 Conclusions and Recommendations

No Aboriginal sites, potential archaeological deposits or areas of sensitivity were identified during the survey of the Project Area.

There are no proposed impacts to Aboriginal sites of archaeological or cultural significance. The works may proceed, with the following precautionary recommendations:

Recommendation 1

All on-site personnel are to be made aware of their obligations under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NSW). This includes protection of Aboriginal sites and the reporting of any new Aboriginal, or suspected Aboriginal heritage sites. This may be done through an on-site induction or other suitable format.

Recommendation 2

In the unlikely event that Aboriginal, or suspected Aboriginal archaeological material is uncovered during the development, then works in that area are to stop and the area is to be cordoned off. The Project Manager is to contact the Heritage Consultant to make an assessment as to whether the material is classed as Aboriginal object/s under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NSW) and advise on the required management and mitigation measures. Works are not to recommence in the cordoned off area until heritage clearance is given and/or the required management and mitigation measures have been implemented.

Recommendation 3

In the very unlikely event that human remains, or suspected human remains are uncovered during the development, then works in that area are to stop and the area is to be cordoned off. The Project Manager is to contact the NSW Police to establish whether the area is a crime scene. If it is not a crime scene, and the remains are determined to be Aboriginal ancestral remains, then Heritage NSW is to be notified via the Environment Line on 131 555 and management measures are to be devised in consultation with the local Aboriginal community. Works are not to recommence in the area until the management measures have been implemented.
