Re: Addendum to the Preliminary Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (PACHA) for the Belmore Road Precinct – Updated ILP (Niche ref: #7259)

Niche Environment and Heritage Pty Ltd (Niche) has been engaged by The Trustee for CKDI Bringelly Holding Trust (the Proponent) to complete Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHA) including Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation requirements (ACHCRs).

This report, the Addendum for the Belmore Road Precinct (the Project), outlines a proposed methodology for conducting an ACHA under the ACHCRs guidelines (DECCW 2010). It seeks to address comments raised by Camden Council in their Request for Further Information (RFI) to CKDI, dated 24 December 2021.

Revised Final ILP - 5 September 2023

As an outcome of the RFI, an updated Indicative Layout Plan (ILP) has been provided to Niche (Appendix 1). This Addendum and the PACHA have been updated to reflect the current Belmore Road Precinct ILP.

Project Background

As outlined in the previously PACHA (Niche 2022), and in this updated PACHA (Niche 2023), the Proponent is seeking to rezone the Belmore Road Precinct, within the South West Growth Area (SWGA). The Belmore Road Precinct will accommodate up to 3,754 dwellings to be confirmed through detailed planning and provide access to schools, employment, open space, parklands, and transportation corridors within proximity to the Western Parkland City and Western Sydney Aerotropolis.

The proposed impact footprint for the Belmore Road Precinct is approximately 112.25 hectares in size (the Subject Area). The Precinct has an open space of 47.22 hectares. It is bounded by the Lowes Creek Maryland Precinct to the South, The Northern Road to the east, and the South West Growth Area boundary to the west (at Greendale Road), south and north of the Precinct.

The South Creek West Release Area – Precinct 5 Indigenous Heritage Proposal Request by the NSW Government identifies that an Indigenous Heritage Assessment will be required to identify the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage (ACH) needs of the Precinct, undertaking all necessary background research and primary



investigations to enable the identification, assessment, significance of ranking and mapping of ACH places and values within the Precinct.

Request for Additional Information

A number of issues relating to heritage were highlighted by Camden Council in their RFI dated 24 December 2021. These issues are summarised below for reference:

- Further information has been requested as to how ACH will be incorporated into the ILP and provision of open space (including the Landscape Masterplan). Council have determined that the current ILP does not "clearly note or protect the item/sites that have been identified".
- Further consideration of opportunities to retain existing significant sites and landscapes of
 moderate archaeological or high cultural values, in particular any modified trees. Camden Council
 have recommended that these items are protected through incorporation within passive open
 space.
- The ILP should be assessed against the objectives and principles of both Designing with Country and the Connecting with Country Framework (Government Architect NSW 2020).
- Aboriginal community consultation should be undertaken in the early stages of ILP development, including evidence as to how the ILP will adopt a country-centred design approach; and
- A Heritage Interpretation Plan should be developed with Aboriginal Stakeholders to enable
 Aboriginal cultural knowledge to be incorporated into the design and development of the Belmore
 Road Precinct. Specifically, Camden Council have required that Aboriginal stakeholders be included
 in the design of the Landscape Masterplan and with an intent to Design with Country.

In specific reference to the PACHA, a number of recommendations were provided by Camden Council, namely:

- Further consideration of Aboriginal sites and areas of moderate and high archaeological sensitivity are incorporated into conservation zones where possible to avoid harm.
- Further consideration of how existing significant sites and landscapes of moderate archaeological or high cultural values (in particular, modified trees) can be incorporated into the ILP and provision of open space (including the Landscape Masterplan); and
- Amending the PACHA to incorporate an assessment of the development proposal against the principles and objectives of 'Draft Connecting with Country' to ensure that the planning and design approach is inclusive of Aboriginal culture and considerate of Country.

In order to address the issues raised by the RFI, Niche has developed an outline of the methodology that will be undertaken as part of the full ACHA including full details of the Aboriginal community consultation that would occur.

ACHA Methodology

Niche Environment and Heritage Pty Ltd (Niche) was commissioned by Urbis, on behalf of CDKI (the Proponent) to assist with the following for the Subject Area:

- Detailing the community consultation process and any Aboriginal cultural heritage values identified, in compliance with the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010 (Part 6 National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974) (DECCW 2010).
- Determining the cultural significance of Aboriginal objects and/or places relevant to the Subject Area.
- Preparation of an impact assessment and providing appropriate management recommendations for any identified Aboriginal objects that might be identified during the process and,
- The preparation of an ACHA report.

ACHA

The ACHA will follow the requirements and guidelines set out in the:

- Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW (OEH 2011)
- Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW 2010)
- Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010 (Part 6 National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974) (DECCW 2010)
- National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974
- The Burra Charter The Australian National Committee of the International Council on Monuments and Sites
- Protocol for Aboriginal Stakeholder Involvement in the Assessment of Aboriginal Heritage in the Sydney Priority Growth Areas and,
- Precinct Assessment Method for Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in the Sydney Priority Growth Areas.

The ACHA will follow the general methodology described by the tasks below:

- **Desktop assessment** compile and analyse previous assessments within the local region. The assessment will:
 - Include searches of the relevant heritage registers (Aboriginal Heritage Information System (AHIMS), Heritage Branch Heritage Inventory and Local Environmental heritage schedules from Camden City Council)
 - Include background research including previous Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal heritage studies and reports, historical development and use of the area, and landscape analysis and settlement characterisation consistent with the current archaeological codes of practice
 - Develop a model for the prediction of Aboriginal objects in the landscape consistent with current archaeological codes of practice
 - Identify and predict areas of potential cultural value and archaeological potential.
- **Survey** A comprehensive site survey would be undertaken by Niche along with representatives from the Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs). Previously recorded Aboriginal cultural sites will be



revisited as well as areas of archaeological potential. This survey will inform the identification of conservation zones within the Belmore Road Precinct in order to incorporate known Aboriginal sites and areas of archaeological sensitivity.

- Aboriginal Community Consultation As part of the ACHA process and in line with the Aboriginal
 Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010 (DECCW, 2010b), a full program
 of community consultation will commence as part of the ACHA. Individuals and organisations which
 have previously registered their interest during the development of the PACHA for the South Creek
 West Precinct (North-West) Release Area Rezoning (Niche 2021) will automatically be registered for
 the ACHA.
- Reporting- A draft report that satisfies the requirements of the Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW, 2010a), the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010 (DECCW, 2010b) and the Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW (OEH, 2011) will be prepared, including:
 - Significance assessment and recommendations in accordance with the Burra Charter and relevant Aboriginal community consultation guidelines.
 - Impact assessments, including cumulative effects of the Project on Aboriginal cultural heritage values and areas of archaeological potential.
 - Incorporation of RAPs review comments into final reports.
 - Recommendations to minimise the impact of the proposed works on Aboriginal cultural heritage present by the identification of opportunities to retain significant sites and landscapes of moderate archaeological or high cultural values; and
 - Incorporating an assessment of the proposed works against the principles and objectives of 'Draft Connecting with Country' (Government Architect NSW 2020).

1.1 Site Assessment

As part of the development of the PACHA, a limited site inspection has previously been undertaken for the Subject Area. The survey was undertaken on 11 May 2020 by two Niche heritage consultants and one Aboriginal community representative. Only 30% of the Subject Area could be surveyed due to restricted access. An effective survey coverage of the total Subject Area of approximately 10% was achieved, comprising 33% of the accessible Subject Area.

As part of the Belmore Road Precinct ACHA, a renewed survey program will be carried out (including representative of RAPs) across the entirety of the Subject Area. The site survey will inspect areas of archaeological potential within the Subject Area and will identify any Aboriginal cultural heritage sites that may be present. This survey aims to provide further information on the Aboriginal cultural heritage values of the Subject Area and will inform the development of heritage conservation areas relevant to the project. The survey team will walk the entire Subject Area as a systematic meander and record all data following the methodology process listed below:

- A hand-held GPS unit will be used to record all survey tracks as well as any important landscape features or areas of disturbance
- Recording data including landform type, existing environment and level of disturbance



- Representative photographs to be taken of the survey units, different visibility levels, exposures, surface features and disturbed areas
- Flagging and recording the location of artefacts and features using a handheld non-differential GPS unit
- Photographic recording of the location and surroundings of flagged artefacts and features and,
- Recording every identified archaeological site on pro formas, including details such as a written
 description, photographic recording, a sketch of the context of the recorded site and extent using a
 handheld non-differential GPS unit.

The assessment of the Aboriginal cultural heritage sites will follow the methodology process listed below:

- A detailed photographic record of each of the Aboriginal cultural heritage sites
- Detailed scaled plans of each site including physical characteristics and features
- Detailed information regarding the dimensions, composition, and features of the site
- A discuss of site conditions with RAPs and a record made of all comments and recommendations for each site.

The field survey would consist of two Niche heritage consultants and a number of Aboriginal representatives, the number of which will be determined by CKDI. Niche recommends a minimum of three (3) RAPs and have estimated the time required to adequately survey the area based on a team of five (5) people. The survey would be conducted over a two-week period (Monday – Friday) based on the Subject Area as depicted in the ILP being approximately 112.25 hectares.

1.2 Draft Report

Niche would prepare a comprehensive ACHA Report inclusive of an Archaeological Report (AR) as an appendix. The ACHA which would initially inform the existing environments and constraints of the study and subsequently inform the developments. It would demonstrate the attempts to avoid impacts on cultural heritage values and identify any conservation outcomes. The significance of cultural heritage values for Aboriginal people who have a cultural association with the land will be documented in the ACHA.

The ACHA will outline procedures to be followed if Aboriginal objects, Aboriginal burials, or skeletal material are found at any stage during the works and formulate appropriate measures to manage impacts. The ACHA Report would contain:

- A detailed literature review including a description of the context of the Subject Area, identification
 of known Aboriginal cultural heritage sites and/or declared Aboriginal places in the Subject Area
 and surrounds
- A description of the historical context of the Subject Area and identification of previously identified Aboriginal cultural heritage items in the area and surrounds
- Documentation of the consultation process and responses from RAPs, including how the requirements for consultation with Aboriginal people have been met, and the views of those Aboriginal people regarding the likely impact of the proposed activities on their cultural heritage
- Documentation of the survey and assessment methodology
- Documentation and mapping of relevant Aboriginal heritage items in the Subject Area and surrounds



- Documentation of archaeological significance
- Documentation of cultural heritage values
- Assessment of the actual or likely harm posed to the Aboriginal objects or declared Aboriginal
 places from the proposed activity, with reference to the cultural heritage values identified
- A discussion of the cumulative impacts of this Project with other regional major projects (at both a local and regional scale)
- Identification of practical measures that may be taken to protect and conserve those Aboriginal
 objects or declared Aboriginal places, and any practical measures that may be taken to avoid or
 mitigate any actual or likely harm, alternatives to harm or, if this is not possible, to manage
 (minimise) harm. This would include areas of archaeological sensitivity and areas of significant
 cultural values.



Aboriginal community consultation

Consultation would be undertaken in compliance with the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010* (DECCW 2010). All consultation material will be provided to CKDI for review and approval prior to distribution.

A consultation log will be maintained and will document all external correspondence in relation to the ACHA in MS Excel format, including date of each contact, contacting organisation and person, organisation and person contacted, method of contact and the nature of the consultation. The consultation log will be kept up to date at all times. The consultation would require the following staged approach.

All potential stakeholders will be provided with 14 days to register their interest. The names and contact details of all registered groups and individuals will be compiled at the completion of this period.

A copy of the notification letter (Stage 1.3 RAP Notice) and a list of parties who expressed their wish to be registered for the project will be provided to Heritage NSW and to Tharawal LALC within 28 days from the closing date for registering an interest.

Stage 2 - Presentation of Project Information

Stage 2 Presentation of Information about the Project would be supplied to RAPs including background information about the information on the Project in accordance with Stage 2 of the consultation requirements. Stage 2 and 3 can be submitted to the RAPs at the same time.

Desktop Assessment

Stage 3 - Gathering of cultural significance

Assessment Methodology for review

Stage 3.1 Providing the Niche would facilitate Consultation Meeting #1 with all RAPs including the presentation of project information, required by consultation requirements and to:

- Hear and discuss stakeholder requirements for the assessment methodology
- Discuss the Connecting with Country draft framework and methods of integration within the Project
- Discuss roles and responsibilities
- Discuss engagement for fieldwork
- Provide a project timeline
- Discuss privacy and intellectual property issues
- Discuss any potential information restrictions

The consultation meeting is proposed to take the form of a one-hour videoconference meeting.

Niche would:

- Incorporate Registered Aboriginal Party feedback from Consultation Meeting #1 into the draft assessment methodology
- Provide a draft assessment methodology for internal review
- Provide a draft assessment methodology for client review
- Provide a draft assessment for RAP review (28-day mandated review period)

Field Investigation

Niche would:

- Facilitate stakeholder involvement in the field investigation by providing the opportunity to be involved in any site surveys that would take place
- Provide an opportunity for stakeholders to provide cultural information relating to the culturally significant places and objects present within the Subject Area.
- Provide an opportunity for stakeholders to identify potential conservation zones within the Belmore Road Precinct project area.



• If the survey identifies that past land disturbance has not eliminated the risk of buried Aboriginal objects, it may be necessary to undertake subsurface testing ("test excavation") to fully understand the Aboriginal heritage values present and prepare an adequate assessment to support the AHIP application to harm. If subsurface testing was considered necessary, Niche would discuss options with CKDI to develop a suitable strategy and scope of works. Niche would develop an excavation methodology in consultation with the RAPs.

Draft ACHA

Stage 4 – Draft ACHA

4.2 Providing Draft ACHA for Review

At this stage, Niche would provide a copy of the draft ACHA report for review. The document will first be reviewed internally before being sent to CKDI. Once complete, the draft ACHA would be sent to all RAPs for review, at which time all individuals and groups will be provided the mandatory <u>28 days</u> for their submission of comments.

During this stage, Niche would facilitate Consultation Meeting #2 in order to:

- Discuss impacts, management and mitigation measures
- Discuss the identification of proposed conservation areas within the Belmore Road Precinct

The consultation meeting is proposed to take the form of a one-and-a-half-hour videoconference meeting.

Stage 4.5 Final ACHA

Niche would finalise the ACHA report with feedback from CKDI and the RAPs in order to provide an assessment report suitable for submission to Heritage NSW in support of any potential AHIP application.

B.2 INDICATIVE LAYOUT PLAN

LEGEND

Belmore Road Precinct

Belmore Road Precinct has a total area of 196ha.

Primary Watercourse

The primary watercourse of the riparian corridor is categorised as Strathler stream order 2 and 3.

Riparian Corridor

This Riparian Corridor represents a provided buffer of 20-30m for the primary watercourse.

Playing Fields

There are three sporting fields located close to the riparian corridor. The size ranges between 5.0ha and 5.5ha. These sporting fields enhance the overall open space network and support the provision of double playing fields. One (1) of the double playing fields will be co-located with the village centre, south of Belmore Road.

Local Parks

Parks are distributed across the Precinct based on every 400m radius. These local parks ranges between 0.5ha and 3.7ha.

Open Space - Tree Retention

Village Centre

School

A government public school (approx. 2ha) is colocated with the playing fields and the village centre, where future multi-purpose community centre will be located.

Employment Precinct

The northern end of the Precinct is dedicated for employment generating uses to response to the Employment-based Precinct at Badgerys Creek.

Heritage Listed Site

The existing cottage on-site is identified as a heritage item of local significance, formerly known as the Fibro House (I2).

Bringelly Zone Substation

The operation of Bringelly Zone Substation will be retained, with an opportunity to expand in the future.

SP2 Drainage

Five (6) drainage basins have been proposed to appropriately manage water flows. Three (3) of these are integrated with the riparian corridor, with two (3) others located at the north and south-west of the Precinct.

These are designed with dual-use functionality, where it could support passive recreational uses and be treated as an open space.

Bio-retention Raingardens

Eleven (11) bio-retention raingardens are located across the Precinct to manage stormwater quality runoff.

Sub-Arterial Road

Belmore Road will be the main access route to Belmore Road Precinct. It will be upgraded as a sub-arterial road.

A new sub-arterial road is proposed along the western boundary to provide a north-south connection from Lowes Creek Maryland to Greendale Road.

Collector Road

Loftus Road will be upgraded as a collector road, servicing the northern portion of the Precinct. One (1) new north-south collector road is proposed at the east of the Precinct, connecting the southern sub-arterial road at Lowes Creek Maryland to Wentworth Road and Loftus Road.

Low Density Residential (LDR) Band 1

LDR-Band 1 (ranging between 10-20dw/ha) is located at the north and south of the Precinct.

Low Density Residential (LDR) Band 2

LDR-Band 2 (ranging between 20-25dw/ha) is located around high amenity area, e.g., along riparian corridor and around local parks or playing fields

Medium Density Residential (MDR) Band 1

MDR-Band 1 (ranging between 25-35dw/ha) is distributed within 500m radius of the Local Centre. It acts as a transition zone between the MDR Band 2 and LDR areas.


Medium Density Residential (MDR) Band 2

MDR-Band 2 is located around the local centre, typically within 200m radius. The density typically ranges between 35-60dw/ha.

Executive summary

Niche Environment and Heritage Pty Ltd (Niche) was commissioned by CKDI Bringelly to complete a Preliminary Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (PACHA) to inform the Precinct Planning Process, the Indicative Layout Plan (ILP) and Precinct Planning Report, which are to be submitted to the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) for rezoning of the Belmore Road Precinct (formerly known as South Creek West (North-West) Release Area (Precinct 2), herein referred to as the 'Subject Area'.

The Subject Area is located in the north-west corner of the South West Growth Area (SWGA) and is bound by the Lowes Creek Maryland Precinct to the south, the Northern Road to the east, Thompsons Creek and the north-west SWGA boundary to the west. The Subject Area comprises fifty-eight separate lots that are zoned for primary production and have been characterised by agricultural land uses, primarily in the form of cattle grazing. The proposed rezoning of the Subject Area will accommodate up to 30,000 dwellings, to be confirmed through detailed planning, and will provide access to schools, employment, open space, parklands, and transportation corridors within proximity to the Western Parkland City and Western Sydney Aerotropolis.

This assessment was initiated in early 2020 but was put on hold in May 2020. It has now been reinitiated using the research, Aboriginal community consultation, and partial site inspection data that were collected in 2020 to support the rezoning application.

Seventeen Aboriginal groups identified themselves as Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs) through the consultation process following the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010* (Section 3). This assessment has been completed by Niche Environment and Heritage in consultation with representatives of the RAPs (Appendices B and C). Due to limitations of site access, only 30% of the Subject Area was surveyed as part of this assessment. The remaining 70% was assessed via desktop analysis only.

Eight previously recorded Aboriginal cultural heritage sites and two new Aboriginal cultural heritage sites were identified within the Subject Area during this PACHA. The Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs) have also identified cultural values associated with the landscape, including, that creek lines were used as thoroughfares through the country and ridgelines as lookout points. The RAPs see the entire area is a cultural landscape and that every tree and stone is a cultural item as part of the wider landscape. As such, there are opportunities to incorporate heritage protections, conservation zones, active heritage management and incorporate, respond and celebrate Aboriginal heritage values into the design of the precinct, in consultation with the local Aboriginal community.

Aboriginal objects are protected under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974*. Should further works follow on from the rezoning and potentially impact Aboriginal cultural heritage sites, an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) must be obtained under Section 90 of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974*.

The following recommendations have been made:

1. CDKI should incorporate known Aboriginal sites and areas of moderate and high archaeological sensitivity into conservation zones wherever possible. 2. Areas for conservation of Aboriginal cultural heritage must be considered as part of the future

development of the Precinct. Conservation areas should be within areas of high/moderate

	archaeological potential, preferably within the less disturbed parts of these areas, as well as riparian zones and ridgelines. Impacts to these conservation areas (e.g. drainage infrastructure, sporting fields, footpaths and other facilities/landscaping) should be avoided.			
3.	Consultation should be conducted with the RAPs to inform Designing with Country across the precinct. Following the recommended ACHA (see below) an Interpretation Plan should be developed with the Aboriginal Stakeholders, to enable Aboriginal cultural knowledge to be incorporated into the design and development of the Precinct.

7.	AHIMS site cards should be submitted for newly recorded sites SCW PAD 1 and SCW PAD 2			
8.	SCW PAD 1 and SCW PAD 2 should be subject to an archaeological test and/or salvage excavation program prior to any development works.			
9. Recommendations

- In the unlikely event that suspected human remains are encountered during construction, all work in the area that may cause further impact, must cease immediately and:

 - No further action is to be undertaken until the NSW Police provide written notification to CKDI Bringelly.
 - If the skeletal remains are identified as Aboriginal, CKDI Bringelly or their agent must contact:

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1. Introduction

This report presents the findings of the Preliminary Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (PACHA) undertaken for the proposed rezoning of agricultural land located within the suburb of Bringelly, NSW (Figure 1 and Figure 2; hereafter referred to as the 'Subject Area').

CKDI Bringelly has engaged Niche Environment and Heritage Pty Ltd (Niche) to assist with the development of a Preliminary Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (PACHA) that informs the preparation of an Indicative Layout Plan (ILP) and Precinct Planning Report.

1.1 Proposed activity

CKDI Bringelly is undertaking a development project in the South West Growth Area (SWGA); the Subject Area is currently zoned for agricultural purposes and requires rezoning prior to development. CKDI Bringelly has initiated this rezoning through the Precinct Planning Process, which includes the development of an ILP and Precinct Planning Report. The ILP will be informed by constraints assessments undertaken by consultants, including Aboriginal cultural heritage constraints identified during this assessment. The ILP and Precinct Planning Report will be submitted to NSW Department of Planning, Infrastructure and the Environment (DPIE) to assist in the rezoning process.

1.2 Statutory controls

Aboriginal objects are protected under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW Act). The assessment, investigation and reporting on Aboriginal objects and cultural heritage is guided by regulation This report includes a PACHA, which was prepared in accordance with the following guidelines:

- Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW
- Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECCW, 2010c) (hereafter referred to as 'the Code of Practice')
- Guide to investigating, assessing and reporting Aboriginal cultural heritage in NSW (Office of Environment and Heritage [OEH], 2011)
- The Burra Charter: The Australia ICOMOS Charter for Places of Cultural Significance (Australia ICOMOS, 2013).

Where any Aboriginal objects are identified, a full Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHA) will be triggered.


1.3 Objectives

This PACHA report is designed to inform the rezoning process and to assess whether Aboriginal objects and/or places are present or are likely to occur within or near the Subject Area, if those Aboriginal objects and/or places may be harmed by the proposed works, and if further investigation is required.

1.1 Limitations

Limitations to this PACHA have included:

- Insufficient survey coverage. Only a small section of the Subject Area was accessible to the survey team, therefore, further survey is required.
- Limited Aboriginal community consultation on the results of this PACHA.

2 Description of the area

2.1 Location

The Subject Area is situated within the suburbs of Bringelly and Cobbitty in the Camden Local Government Area (LGA) and is located 11 km to the north-west of the Campbelltown Central Business District (CBD) (Figure 1). It lies within the Parish of Bringelly and the County of Cumberland. It is within the Tharawal Local Aboriginal Land Council (LALC) boundary. The Subject Area is located in the north-west corner of the SWGA and is bound by the Lowes Creek Maryland Precinct to the south, the Northern Road to the east and Thompsons Creek and the SWGA boundary to the west (Figure 2). The Subject Area is approximately 187.3 ha in size and comprises of fifty-eight separate lots as detailed in Table 1.

2.2 Environmental context

The Cumberland Plain originally contained a complex woodland and forest, which had adapted to the clayey soils (Benson & Howell, 1990). According to the Cumberland Plain Recovery Plan (NSW DECCW 2010b), only 13% of the area's native vegetation is still remnant on the landscape in highly fragmented patches due to the increased activity in the area since European settlement.

Historically the native vegetation in the Subject Area would have consisted of dry sclerophyll forest with open woodland, and its dominant species would have included grey box (*E. moluccana*) and red gum (*E. tereticornis*) (Artefact, 2016: 6). These communities supported a range of resources that would have been utilised by Aboriginal people. Cumberland Plain Woodland exists along the Bringelly Road exits in the form of mature remnant trees (Rossington, 2011). Little native vegetation now remains due to clearing for rural grazing and farming with some urban land management, and though there is a small area of wooded land at the northern end of the Subject Area, the rest of the site is cleared grazing land.



The climate of Bringelly consists of mild summers and winters with an average maximum of 30.3 degrees Celsius in January, an average minimum of 17.5 degrees Celsius in July and a long-term average rainfall of 63.6 mm per month (Accessed 11 January 2020 at: http://weather.mla.com.au/climate-history/nsw). Recorded rainfall readings indicate an average annual rainfall of 658.1 millimetres (Bureau of Meteorology 2020, based on records taken at Badgerys Creek Weather Station between 1995 and 2020).

The conditions in south western Sydney region can be summarised as being moderate and would have had sufficient rainfall for year-round hunter-gatherer occupation of the region.

Water is one of the most important resources to human occupation in a landscape and is considered the primary factor for the prediction of Aboriginal objects potential presence in a landscape. Across NSW, there is a strong correlation between the presence, frequency and density of Aboriginal objects and the abundance and permanency of water sources. Areas within 200 m of water are identified by the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales (DECC, 2010c)* as landscape features likely to indicate the presence of Aboriginal objects.

The Subject Area contains the non-perennial streams of South Creek and Lowes Creek. Second and third order streams of the Hawkesbury River are present to the south of the Subject Area and Thompsons Creek, a third order stream of South Creek, is located to the west of the Subject Area. Several small non perennial chain ponds are also present in the Subject Area. These water bodies may have supported diverse aquatic plants and fauna, as well as providing drinking water. Such ponds have since been developed into dams to provide a sustained water source for agricultural practices. Tributaries of Cobbitty Creek, a third order stream of the Nepean River, are located to the south west of the Subject Area. The presence of water has led to the formation of fluvial landscape features such as raised level creek terraces along the tributary. Such terraces have the potential to retain surface or sub-surface Aboriginal objects, owing to the close proximity of permanent water and resources and its nature as an aggrading land type.

2.3 Geomorphology of the Subject Area

The Subject Area is mostly located within the Blacktown soil landscape of the Cumberland Plain, with a small area along the south-western boundary situated within the Luddenham soil landscape (Figure 3, Plate 1 through to Plate 4).

The Blacktown soil landscape generally features broad rounded crests and ridges with gently inclining slopes and low relief (<5 m). Soils are shallow to moderately deep (>100 cm) with predominantly shallow duplex soils over a clay base. The topsoil covers less than one metre of heavily textured subsoil. Intact archaeological deposits are likely to occur in the A horizon (up to 30 cm in depth), although stratigraphic potential is limited. (Hazelton & Tille, 1990: 38). The underlying geology of the area consists of Wianamatta Group Bringelly Shale remnant from the Triassic deposits of the Sydney Basin, which generally consist of a combination of shale, carbonaceous claystone, laminate and coal.

The Luddenham soil landscape generally features undulating to rolling hills with narrow ridges, hillcrests and valleys and local relief 50-80m. The soils of this landscape are generally shallow on crests (<100cm) and moderately deep (70-50cm) on upper slopes (Hazelton & Tille 1990: 79). Intact archaeological deposits are possible in the A horizon (up to 10cm) and B horizon (<40cm) although the shallow depth and potential of erosion and soil movement may be limiting. As with the Blacktown soil landscape, the underlying geology of the area consists of Wianamatta Group Bringelly Shale.

2.4 Land use and disturbance

The Subject Area is located in the south west region of Sydney where the general use of the land is characterised by small rural holdings, light industrial, commercial premises, educational facilities and local road networks. As such, the Subject Area contains evidence of past land use disturbance associated with previous road construction, urbanisation and horticulture and agricultural practices which may reduce the potential for any archaeological evidence to survive within certain zones. Low to high levels of disturbance such as clearing of native vegetation will have impacted the original soil profile and environment of the Subject Area.

Historical aerial photos can provide further information about previous land use and impact on the ground surface. Details of the available historical aerial photos (Figure 4) are outlined below in Table 2.

Year	Description
1930	A historical aerial image of the Subject Area from this time show that by this period the landscape was still distinctly pastoral and sparsely vegetated with vegetation concentrated in the southern portion of the Subject Area. There is some evidence of development in the form of buildings and related infrastructure particularly in the north of the Subject Area during this era.



1979	By the mid-1970s, there had been a population boom which resulted in the urbanization of the region surrounding Subject Area. The image taken in 1975 shows that, the landscape is still largely pastoral in character and several small-scale landscape changes have taken place including the construction of a small dam in the south-west of the Subject Area (i.e. within Lot 6/ DP 1216926). Vegetation has also been cleared particularly within Lot 6/ DP 1216926 in the South of the Subject Area and the construction of a small complex of buildings/structure is evident in this same area.
2020	Current aerial imagery of the Subject Area shows a continuation of the changes witnessed in the 1979 imagery. Another small dam has been constructed in the north-west of the Subject Area and several additional small dwellings are present. The character of the landscape, however, remains largely pastoral in nature.

The overall landscape context of the Subject Area provides a picture of a landscape that has been subject to various disturbances relating to its primary use for pastoral/agricultural activities with disturbances including vegetation clearance, dam construction and building/house developments and the construction of access tracks.

2.5 Aboriginal life in the Cumberland Plain region

The Subject Area is located in the Cumberland Plain, a physiographic region of western Sydney characterised by its open undulating hilly landscape with alluvium rich soil underlain by the sedimentary geology. The landscapes within the Cumberland Plain are largely interrelated, which has led to many studies of archaeology in correlation with the landscapes types in which they occur. Aboriginal cultural heritage sites in quaternary fill sequences within creek and river valley context, specifically on floodplains, terraces, dunes, levees and lower slopes are strongly represented throughout the Cumberland Plain region (McLaren et al, 2019).

It is proposed that Aboriginal occupation of Australia dates back at least 65,000 years (Clarkson et al, 2017) and the Sydney Basin was occupied and used by Aboriginal people for thousands of years prior to European settlement. The result of this extensive and continued occupation has left a vast amount of accumulated depositional evidence. The earliest known occupational site of the Cumberland Plain and generally in the Sydney Basin is located north of Pitt Town, south of the Hawkesbury and the cultural deposits have been dated by optically stimulated luminescence (OSL) to 36,000+/-3000 BP (Williams et al, 2012).

The general location of the Subject Area is considered to be the corner country of the Darug, Dharawal and Gandangara groups (Tindale, 1974). The first documented groups in the ethnographical records was the Darug tribal group also known as Dharr'-ook, Dharook, Dhar'rook and Dharruk. According to the anthropologist R.H. Matthews, the south western Cumberland Plain area was populated by the Darug language group:

"The Dharukk speaking people adjoined the Thurrawal on the north, extending along the coast to the Hawkesbury River, and inland to what are now Windsor, Penrith, Campbelltown, and intervening towns." (Matthew, 1901: 55 in Attenbrow, 2010: 32)

The Darug populated a large part of the Sydney basin to the Georges River to the south, to the Blue Mountains to the west and up to the Hawkesbury in the north. The Darug Hinterland dialect was different to the Darug Coastal dialect and other small language groups also existed around Port Jackson (Attenbrow, 2010: 33).

The area of Catherine Field, to the south-east of the Subject Area, lies within a transitional area between traditional boundaries, with the Georges River, Appin and Camden areas all having been used to form arbitrary boundaries between the Darug, Dharawal and Gundungurra language groups (Attenbrow, 2002).



Family groups belonged to clans who were united by language and cultural affinities with ties to specific areas of land. Specific clan group names for the Subject Area were not recorded with the possible exception of the Cobbity Barta or Cubbitch Barta in the Cobbity-Camden area, who were generally known in early historic times as the Cowpastures people (EMGAM, 2011).

The Darug Hinterland people were semi-nomadic hunter gatherers and according to early records, exploited mostly terrestrial animals and plants. They hunted wallabies, kangaroos, possums, flying foxes, birds and possibly freshwater yabbies and fish. Banksia flowers, wild honey, Burrawong nut and some wild yams were amongst the flora which have been recorded as important food sources (Artefact, 2016: 10). In proximity to the Subject Area, South Creek would have been a particularly valuable supply source. Flora was also valuable as a material source with plants such as grass trees (*Xanthorrhoea*, used for food, resin as a hafting medium and flower spikes used for spear barbs) (Artefact, 2016: 6). Past Aboriginal occupation of the land is expressed in the archaeological data and resources prevalent throughout the landscape in the Cumberland Plain.

The arrival of the First Fleet in Sydney Cove in 1788 was followed the next year by a smallpox epidemic, which spread to the neighbouring regions and, although the exact effects are not known, killed over half the Aboriginal population of the areas effected (Organ, 1990: 5).

Early in the nineteenth century, European graziers began taking land in the south of the Cumberland Plain which had previously been Aboriginal lands (DECC, 2005), leading to competition for resources and the alienation of Aboriginal people from their traditional lands. Access to traditional and everyday resources (such as water) and clearing the land of trees would have seriously impacted the ways in which Aboriginal people would have been living, and also caused significant social disruption between Aboriginal groups, and pressure between Aboriginal people and the ever-increasing European population. Those who survived the impacts of disease, alienation from food sources and country and/or relocation to punitive mission stations continued to live a semi-traditional life on the peripheries of European settlements or within the newly formed country estates that now occupied their traditional lands, with some continuing to live on what had been traditional campsites until at least the mid-1800s (Attenbrow, 2010: 22).

When Australia federated in 1901 to the exclusion of Aboriginal Australians, it was a continuation of the policy, procedures and behaviours which had existed throughout the 1800s, allowing and/or encouraging the discrimination, oppression, division, and in some cases murder of Aboriginal people. A series of segregationist, assimilative, and integrationist policies, along with statutory bodies such as the NSW Aboriginal Protection Board, continued to monitor and control the everyday reality of Aboriginal life well into the 1960s. A growing civil rights movement throughout the sixties culminated in the 1967 Referendum, where an overwhelming majority of Australians voted to count Indigenous Australians in the census and include them under the power of the Commonwealth Government (with both positive and negative effects). Although it did not immediately facilitate change, the decision provided a baseline for later federal legislation concerning land rights, discriminatory practices, financial assistance, and preservation of cultural heritage.


Continued civil rights activism throughout the 1970s included landmark events such as the Tent Embassy (1972), Gough Whitlam's 'hand back' of Gurindji land and the Racial Discrimination Act (1975), and the 1976 Aboriginal Land Rights Act (NT). This land rights act was the first national land rights legislation in Australia and the basis for the Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 (NSW) which recognised the dispossession and displacement of NSW Aboriginal peoples from their traditional lands. A three-tier system of Aboriginal Land Councils (state, regional and local) was set up in NSW under this legislation which continues today, with Local Aboriginal Land Councils (LALCs) now closely interconnected to their local community. They



manage and deliver a range of support services and continue to work towards Aboriginal selfdetermination.

In the greater Sydney region, post-colonisation has always had a strong population of immigrants. As the township grew to a city over time, Aboriginal people from around NSW moved to the area to live, work, and forge new relationships as an urban Aboriginal community. Despite widespread historic devastation and later destructive social and political policies, aspects of traditional knowledge and culture survive today. With 1,118 people who identify as Aboriginal in the Camden LGA in 2011 according to census data (ABS, 2013), the Aboriginal people today who live and continue culture in the area retain strong cultural attachments to land and country.

The current Subject Area contains landscape features, namely raised level creek terraces along the tributaries of Cobbitty, South, and Lowes Creeks, which have the potential to yield surface and/or buried Aboriginal objects. Due to the close proximity of permanent water and resources and its nature as an aggrading land type, the likelihood of Aboriginal objects surviving within the Subject Area is considered high. According to the results of previous investigations and predictive models developed for the wider region, the Subject Area was likely associated with low intensity (infrequent and/or sporadic) occupation and use by Aboriginal people in the past. The past Aboriginal land use is demonstrated to a large extent by the Aboriginal cultural heritage sites currently registered on AHIMS.

3 Previous archaeological work

3.1 Heritage Registers

An extensive search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management system (AHIMS) was carried out on the 17 February 2021 (AHIMS Client ID #568769) for the following area at Lat, Long from: -33.972, 150.6992 – Lat, Long To: -33.9303, 150.7653 with a Buffer of 1000 meters. A total of 114 Aboriginal sites were recorded, sixteen of which exist within or directly adjacent to the Subject Area. No Aboriginal places have been declared in or near the above location.

The previously recorded AHIMS sites within the Subject Area consist of Open Camp Sites (with low densities of artefacts), modified trees (carved or scarred) and/or Potential Archaeological Deposits (PADs) (Table 4 and Table 5).

Within the wider local area, artefact (n=47), open camp sites (n=40) and PAD with artefact (n=10) were the most common Aboriginal site features within the AHIMS register (summarised in Table 3). Three out of the five culturally modified trees (carved or scared) registered within the wider local area exist within the Subject Area. It must be noted that care should be taken when using the AHIMS database to reach conclusions about site prevalence or distribution. The distribution of registered sites does not reflect patterns of occupation, but rather is often indicative of survey coverage and conditions.

3.1.1 Assessment of robustness AHIMS data

The area surrounding the Subject Area has been subject to some archaeological study over the last decade. Most of the archaeological work has been initiated by impact assessments for various infrastructure, and commercial development projects. To date, the main issues that have been dealt with by these studies have necessarily been to do with the presence, absence and disturbance of sites over time, and broad characterisation of where the sites occur in the landscape.



3.2 Existing AHIPS

A search of the AHIP register was undertaken on 18 February 2021 for the Subject Area. Two AHIPs that are covering sites directly adjacent to the Subject Area were listed in the register (Table 6). One of the sites, AHIMS ID#45-5-4142 is located within the Subject Area. One of these AHIPs, C0001407, was varied in October 2020 to extend the duration for another 2 years .The sites covered by these AHIPs are identified in Figure 5; however, despite requesting further information about the status of these sites from Heritage NSW on 18 February 2021, it is unknown at this stage if the sites have been impacted and the AHIP works have been conducted. No Aboriginal Site Impact Recording Forms have yet been submitted to AHIMs for these sites. Where AHIPs are valid within the Subject Area, actions within these areas must be consistent with the terms of the AHIP. Additional negotiations may need to be entered into with AHIP holders and Heritage NSW.

3.3 Other registers

Searches of the Australian World Heritage Database, the Commonwealth Heritage List, National Heritage List, State Heritage Register, State Heritage Inventory, the Camden Local Environmental Plan (LEP) (2010) and the Camden City Council Growth Centre Precincts Development Control Plan's (DCP) (2016), Section 170 Heritage and Conservation Registers and the Register of the National Estate (non-statutory archive) were conducted on the 21 February 2020. As the Subject Area is located within the South West Growth Area (SWGA), development is also controlled by the State Environmental Planning Policy (Sydney Region Growth Centres) 2006 (SEPP). 3.4 Previous heritage assessments of the Subject Area

Eco Logical undertook a widescale Heritage Constraints Assessment for the South Creek West Precincts (2018c and d). This assessment assisted in the collection of local knowledge of the cultural heritage values of the Subject Area. A summary of the assessment is provided in Table 8 below.

While these reports mostly focus on the presence and absence of Aboriginal objects within a limited area of works, they also provide an insight into the broader archaeological and ethnographic landscape and are an insightful resource for examples of the continuing Aboriginal connection with traditional lands. A summary of the most relevant heritage assessments undertaken in the surrounding region is provided in Table 9 below.

Archaeological Investigation of the Oran Park Precinct within the South West Growth Centre, Camden, NSW

This report presents the preliminary results of the Stage 2 assessment of Oran Park Precinct, located southeast of the current Subject Area. The report provides an overview of existing information (as of the time of the study), the preliminary archaeological fieldworks undertaken and preliminary recommendations for the management of Aboriginal cultural heritage in the Precinct. The results of the survey work undertaken for this preliminary report resulted in the identification of 44 Aboriginal heritage sites and four PADs. Site features included: Open Camp Sites, Isolated Artefacts, Scarred Trees and flaked glass artefacts. The flaked glass identified (Site OPD-7, AHIS ID#45-5-3360) indicates signs of contact archaeology and is located approximately 6 km south-west of the current Subject Area. The report noted that there were many areas of extensive exposure that were surveyed and where no sites were identified leading to the conclusion that Aboriginal cultural heritage sites, when present, tended to be clustered in proximity to tributaries and drainage systems. The results are consistent with the known characteristic of the local archaeological record with the addition of evidence for contact sites as indicated by the presence of flaked glass artefacts. This report is of relevance as it contributes to the archaeological record of the region and assist in establishing a predictive model for the nature and distribution of Aboriginal sites for the region. Archaeological Investigation of the Turner Road Precinct within the South West Growth Centre, Camden, NSW

This report presents the preliminary results of the Stage 3 assessment of the Turner Road Precinct, located southeast of the current Subject Area. The report provides an overview of existing information (as of the time of the study), consultation with the Aboriginal community and the fieldwork that was undertaken during this stage. The results of the survey work undertaken for this report resulted in the identification of 14 Aboriginal heritage sites consisting mostly of Open Camp Sites and Isolated Artefacts. While several scarred trees were also located and recorded, the likelihood of them being of Aboriginal origin was assessed as being low. The results are consistent with the known characteristic of the local archaeological record. This report is of relevance as it contributes to the archaeological record of the region and assist in establishing a predictive model for the nature and distribution of Aboriginal cultural heritage sites for the region.

Australian Museum Business Services, 1997

Cumberland Plain Regional Archaeological Study: Stage 1

This report documents the results of the Stage 1 Cumberland Plain Regional Archaeological Study (RAS). The study was conducted with the primary aims of examining and assessing the representativeness of Aboriginal sites on the Cumberland Plain (including an assessment of mapped information), critically assessing the planning framework in relation to heritage management and to establish guidelines on the identification of silcrete artefacts in the region. The report found that current understandings of Aboriginal occupation and settlement strategies associated with the Cumberland Plan were underdeveloped despite the large number of archaeological investigations that had been undertaken in the region. The reason for the lack of a robust understanding was put down to the nature of past assessments which largely comprised of isolated Environmental Impact Assessment projects involving small Subject Areas. Other limiting factors identified included: the use of simple pattern based predictive models, an overemphasis on descriptive site comparisons involving basic links between ethnographic, historical, environmental and archaeological data and the lack of adequate testing of the models that have been developed. This report is of relevance as it contributes to the archaeological

3.6 Summary of previous heritage assessments

Syntheses of the earlier work in the Cumberland Plain by archaeologists such as that undertaken by Australian Museum Business Services (AMBS) have set the groundwork for the characterisation of the Cumberland Plain (AMBS, 1997). The AMBS study aimed to examine and assess the concept of representativeness for known Aboriginal archaeological resources on the Cumberland Plain, assess the planning framework to achieve better outcome for heritage management and to produce guidelines for the recognition of silcrete artefacts recorded in high numbers around the Cumberland Plain. AMBS provided an overview of the archaeological works completed and also raised problems and issues in relation to techniques to identify archaeological site patterns and understanding the nature and frequency of past human occupation of the area. The assessment concluded that there is a lack of a satisfactory systems for defining the representativeness and modelling of the spatial distribution of archaeological sites on the Cumberland Plain. Consequently, it concludes that research models and methodologies should be developed, and adequately tested, to ensure that the archaeological patterns of the area are systematically developed and would be comparable to others within the Cumberland Plain.

Jo McDonald Cultural Heritage Management (JMCHM, 2007a and 2007b, White and McDonald, 2010) has had a large impact on the predictive modelling for the entire Cumberland Plain. According to White and McDonald (2010), using the size and permanence of waterways is possible to make general predictions about Aboriginal site locations and also inferences can be made of the intensity and nature of those sites. In the stream classification system waterways are given an order according to the number of additional tributaries associated with each waterway (stream order classification by Strahler [Strahler 1952]) it. This system provides a measure of system complexity and this complexity is correlated with the size, frequency and complexity of associated Aboriginal sites.

As summarised in the table above, Kelleher Nightingale Consulting (KNC, 2010, 2011 and 2017) have also carried out numerous Aboriginal heritage investigations in the region, including test excavations within close proximity of the Subject Area. Scientific (archaeological) significance of identified Aboriginal cultural heritage sites have been revised during the process and patterns of site distribution and impact of historical land used were also investigated during the assessments. KNC concluded that the Catherine Park Precinct has different levels of historical land use impacts that had various impacts of the survival of surface, and subsurface archaeological resources. The areas close to the Catherine Park Precinct displayed higher disturbance levels and the significant loss of top-soil due to historical clearing and subsequent erosion. Sites such as OPW-P3 (AHIMS ID# 52-2-3762) were revised from moderate to low scientific (archaeological) significance and were not recommended or additional investigations such as salvage excavation. Aboriginal cultural heritage sites closer to the main channel of South Creek and its higher order tributaries were assessed as having higher significance and were nominated for salvage works. The results mostly supported the Jo McDonald predictive modelling in a micro-environment of the Cumberland Plain.



4 Consultation process

In administering its statutory functions under Part 6 of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW Act) Heritage NSW requires that proponents consult with Aboriginal people about the Aboriginal cultural heritage values (cultural significance) of Aboriginal objects and/or places within any given development area, in accordance with Clause 80c of *NSW National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2009* ('the Regulation').

Heritage NSW maintains that the objective of consultation with Aboriginal communities about the cultural heritage values of Aboriginal objects and places is to ensure that Aboriginal people have the opportunity to improve assessment outcomes (DECCW, 2010a). This is ensured by:

- Providing relevant information about the cultural significance and values of Aboriginal objects and /or places.
- Informing the design of the methodology to assess cultural and significance of Aboriginal objects and/or places.
- Actively contributing to the development of cultural heritage management options and recommendations for any Aboriginal objects and/or places within the proposed Subject Area.
- Commenting on draft assessment reports before they are submitted by the Proponent to Heritage NSW.

Consultation in the form outlined in the Consultation Requirements (DECCW, 2010a) is a formal requirement in cases where a proponent is aware that their development activity has the potential to harm Aboriginal objects or places. Heritage NSW also recommends that these requirements be used when the certainty of harm is not yet established but a proponent has, through some formal development mechanism, been required to undertake a cultural heritage assessment to establish the potential harm their proposal may have on Aboriginal objects and/or places.

The Consultation Requirements outline a four-stage consultation process that includes detailed step-by-step guidance as to the aim of the stage, how it should be proceed, and what actions are necessary for it to be considered successfully completed. The four stages area:

- Stage 1 Notification of project proposal and registration of interest.
- Stage 2 Presentation of information about the proposed project.
- Stage 3 Gathering information about the cultural significance of the project area.
- Stage 4 Review of the draft PACHA report.

The Consultation Requirements also outline the roles and responsibilities of the Registered Aboriginal Parties (RAPs) including Local and State Aboriginal Land Councils, and proponents throughout the consultation process.

To meet the requirements of consultation it is expected that the Proponent (CKDI Bringelly) will:

- Bring the RAPs (or their nominated representatives) together and be responsible for ensuring appropriate administration and management of the consultation process.
- Consider the cultural perspectives, views, knowledge and advice of the RAPs involved in the consultation process when they assess cultural significance and work together to develop any heritage management outcomes for Aboriginal abject(s) and/or place(s).
- Provide evidence to Heritage NSW of consultation by including information such as cultural perspectives, views, knowledge and advice provided by the RAPs.



- Accurately record and clearly articulate all consultation findings in the final cultural heritage assessment report, and
- Provide copies of their final cultural heritage assessment report to the RAPs who have been consulted.

The consultation process undertaken to seek active involvement from appropriate Aboriginal representatives for the project followed the current NSW statutory guidelines – the Consultation Requirements. Section 1.3 of the Consultation Requirements describes the guiding principles of the document, which have been derived directly from the Principles section of the Australian Heritage Commission's *Ask First: A guide to respecting Indigenous heritage places and values* (Australian Heritage Commission, 2002). Both documents share the aim of creating a system where advice can be sought from the Aboriginal community.

The following sections outline the process and results of the consultation conducted during this assessment to ascertain and reflect the Aboriginal cultural heritage values of the Subject Area.

4.1 Stage 1 - Notification of project proposal and registration of interest

4.1.1 Notification of agencies

Notification was initiated on 14 January 2020 to all relevant organisations named under Section 4.1.2 of the consultation requirements. This is done to identify Aboriginal people who may have cultural knowledge relevant to the Subject Area and whom may have an interest in the proposed project. The list of the contacted organisations is provided in Table 4 below and a copy of the notification letter is provided in Appendix B.

4.1.5 Notification of Heritage NSW and LALC

Notification of RAPS to Heritage NSW and the Tharawal Local Aboriginal Land Council (LALC), as per Section 4.1.6 of the *Aboriginal cultural heritage consultation requirements for proponents 2010* was sent on 3 March 2020.

4.2 Stage 2 - Presentation of project information and Stage 3 - Gathering information about the cultural significance of the Subject Area

4.2.1 Assessment methodology

The RAPs were provided with a letter outlining information about the project and an assessment methodology in accordance with the Consultation Requirements (DECCW, 2010a) and the Code of Practice (DECCW, 2010c). The project information was provided on 26 February 2020.

- The purpose of the provided documents was to:
- Describe the project, outline the project scope, time frame and proposed works.
- Describe the environment of the Subject Area and information relevant to the PACHA process.
- Provide an opportunity for the RAPs to understand the process and comment on the proposed methodology.
- Set a time frame for providing feedback and comments on the methodology and project information.

The closing date for comments on the methodology was at 5 pm, 25 March 2020 (28 days). A copy of the cover letter and methodology is included in Appendix B.

A number of RAPs provided feedback on the project information and assessment methodology. Their comments and/or review are outlined in Table 6, and copies of all submissions made are included in Appendix B.

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4.3 Project Update- COVID-19

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Niche proposed a revised methodology to delay fieldwork until social distancing measures were lifted. Niche proposed a desktop assessment and a preliminary, targeted site walkover by Niche staff to identify any potential heritage constraints until the full site walkover could be completed with the RAPs. This would be followed by on-site meetings with the RAPs to discuss any Aboriginal cultural heritage identified in the desktop assessment and preliminary walkover. The revised methodology letter is included in Appendix B.

Following discussions with RAP groups, the methodology was again revised to exclude the preliminary site walkover by Niche staff. It was decided to hold on-site discussions with RAP groups to talk through the project. The RAPs who attended the site meetings are listed in Table 14.

4.4 Cultural heritage survey

A visual inspection of the Subject Area was undertaken over one day 11 May 2020 by Sarah McGuinness (Heritage Consultant, Niche), Wade Goldwyer (Heritage Consultant, Niche) and site officer Ralph Hampton representing RAP group Barraby Cultural Services.

Due to site access issues, further fieldwork was postponed until access could be obtained (Figure 6). As such, only 30% of the entire Subject Area was surveyed as part of the field assessment. All RAPs were advised of the changed methodology and agreed that a complete site survey is required prior to any works being undertaken within the Subject Area.

5 Archaeological Survey

5.1 Survey methods

A visual inspection of the Subject Area was undertaken over one day 11 May 2020 by Sarah McGuinness (Heritage Consultant, Niche), Wade Goldwyer (Heritage Consultant, Niche) and site officer Ralph Hampton representing RAP group Barraby Cultural Services.

The areas outlined in Figure 6 were surveyed as part of the visual inspection. All remaining areas within the Subject Area had restricted access and as such, all subsequent fieldwork days were cancelled. Accordingly, only 30% of the entire Subject Area was surveyed as part of the field assessment.

The Subject Area was surveyed on foot via a systematic meander (Figure 6).

The survey aimed to inspect areas of high archaeological potential within the Subject Area and identify Aboriginal cultural heritage sites that may be present within the Subject Area. It also aimed to provide further information on the Aboriginal cultural heritage values of the Subject Area. The survey methodology is outlined below:

- A hand-held GPS unit was used to record all tracks and appropriate site data for the survey with spatial data recorded in terms of Datum and grid co-ordinates (i.e. Zone, Easting, Northing) as per Requirement 8b of The Code.
- All data was recorded on recording forms with the following details noted: landform type, existing environment and level of disturbance for each transect.
- Representative photographs were taken of the survey units, different visibility levels, exposures, surface features and disturbed areas.
- All Aboriginal sites, artefacts and/or features identified during the survey were flagged and their
 location recorded using a hand-held non-differential GPS unit. The context of flagged sites,
 artefacts and/or features were additionally photographed, and the following details recorded on
 recording forms: description, photographic recording, context of the recorded site sketched, and
 the boundary/extent recorded using a hand-held non-differential GPS unit.
- Different types and levels of exposure was recorded, defined as an estimate of the area which has a likelihood of revealing buried artefacts or deposits. It is the percentage of land for which erosion and exposure was sufficient to reveal archaeological evidence on the surface of the ground, i.e. visibility refers to what conceals (Burke and Smith 2004:78-80).
- Effective survey coverage area was also recorded (the area of the survey unit multiplied by the visibility percentage and exposure percentage) as per requirement 9 of The Code.

There were no previously recorded AHIMS sites within the accessible Subject Area. Any newly identified Aboriginal cultural heritage sites were recorded in accordance with the requirements of the Code of Practice.

5.2 Survey coverage

Approximately 10% of the total Subject Area was effectively surveyed, and 33% of the accessible Subject Area. This number is representative of the Niche recorded tracks (Figure 6) and does not account for the percentage of the Subject Area surveyed by RAPs. The survey coverage achieved for the Subject Area presents a strong representative sample of the landscape.



A summary of the survey coverage by landform categories across the accessible Subject Area is provided in Table 17.

5.3 Survey Results

No previously recorded Aboriginal cultural heritage sites were located within the accessible Subject Area. Two areas of PAD (SCW PAD 1 and SCW PAD 2) were identified as having the potential to contain subsurface archaeological deposits (Figure 6).

5.3.1 SCW PAD 1 (AHIMS ID#TBC)

SCW PAD 1 (AHIMS ID#TBC) is located in the southern part of the Subject Area, within Lot 6 DP 1216926 (Figure 6). The site is located along a terraced bench that runs along the eastern bank of a non-perennial drainage line and an unnamed pond (Plate 9). The site is approximately 350 m long by 50 m wide and covers approximately 1.4ha in total surface area.

The site is situated within the Blacktown soil landscape and contains a silt deposit that appears to have a moderate depth and the potential to contain Aboriginal objects. SCW PAD 1 is covered in low pastoral grasses with some areas of exposed silt and small gravels.

SCW PAD 1 (AHIMS ID#TBC) has been subject to historical disturbances associated with removal of the native vegetation, as well as a long history of pastoral use that may have contributed to erosion and soil slumping. The area is currently used for horse and cattle grazing, evidence of which can be seen through tramping and compaction of soils within the site boundary (Plate 8).

5.3.2 SCW PAD 2 (AHIMS ID#TBC)

SCW PAD 2 (AHIMS ID#TBC) is located in the south-western section and along the western boundary of the Subject Area, within Lot 6 DP 1216926 (Figure 6).



The site is located along the top of a ridge line that overlooks rolling hills to the east and west (Plate 13). The closest body of water to the site is the unnamed pond that is situated approximately 400m to the south-west. The site is approximately 250 m long by 35 m in width and covers approximately 0.9ha in total surface area.

SCW PAD 2 (AHIMS ID#TBC) is situated within the Luddenham soil landscape and contains fine silt soils that have the potential to contain subsurface Aboriginal objects. The site has a moderate coverage of low pastoral grasses and some remnant Cumberland Plain woodland trees. There are some areas of with exposed silt and gravels.

The site is likely to have been subject to impacts associated with land clearing and cattle movement as well as natural disturbances of soil movement caused by erosion and water runoff.

5.4 Desktop Assessment

Using a landform analysis, as well as the results of the site survey, a desktop assessment of the unsurveyed Subject Area is concluded below and in Figure 7.


The desktop assessment concludes:

• Locations of previously recorded AHIMS sites are of high archaeological sensitivity



- Ridgelines, water courses and terraced banks around water courses are considered to have moderate to high archaeological potential
- Rolling hills and lower slopes are considered to be of low archaeological potential
- Open camp sites, isolated artefacts and PADs are considered the most likely site types to occur within the Subject Area
- There is potential for scarred trees in areas of residual Cumberland Plain Woodland
- The RAPs have identified cultural values associated with the landscape, including, that creek lines were used as thoroughfares through the country and ridgelines as lookout points.
- The RAPs see the entire area is a cultural landscape and that every tree and stone is a cultural item as part of the wider landscape.

It must be noted that a comprehensive site survey with RAPs should be undertaken within the unsurveyed Subject Area prior to any works proceeding to accurately inform an assessment of Aboriginal heritage within the Subject Area.



6 Summary and analysis of background information

The Subject Area is situated within the Cumberland Plain and the general location is considered corner country of the Darug, Dharawal and Gandungara Aboriginal groups.

The region has an extensive history of Aboriginal use, as stated by the Registered Aboriginal Parties. Vast numbers of Aboriginal cultural heritage sites recorded across the Cumberland Plain. Figure 5 highlights previously recorded Aboriginal cultural heritage sites within the region surrounding the Subject Area.

Previous assessments and landscape analyses of the Cumberland Plain indicate that proximity to water is an important factor in site distribution within the region. The Subject Area contains both perennial and non-perennial water sources and accordingly would have been a hub of daily life for the Aboriginal groups of the region. Access to year-round resources would have provided a bountiful setting and an ongoing cultural affiliation to the Subject Area and surrounds. The RAPs identified cultural values associated with the landscape, noting that creek lines were used as thoroughfares through the country and ridgelines as lookout points. The RAPs see the entire area is a cultural landscape and that every tree and stone is a cultural item as part of the wider landscape.

The Subject Area is situated within a landscape of rolling hills, ridges and terraced creek flats.

The land has a long pastoral history of land clearance and stock grazing which may have impacted Aboriginal cultural heritages sites through disturbances, erosion and soil slumping. Parts of the Subject Area have also been previously developed into low-density rural housing which is likely to have led to further impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage sites.

A site survey of the Subject Area was undertaken but was restricted to only 30% of the total Subject Area due to site access constraints. This survey identified areas of Potential Archaeological Deposit. The Registered Aboriginal Parties have indicated a desire for more complete survey to successfully identify Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal heritage values,

Eight AHIMS registered Aboriginal cultural heritage sites and two new Aboriginal cultural heritage sites were identified within the Subject Area during this PACHA. The Registered Aboriginal Parties have also identified cultural values associated with the landscape. As such, there are opportunities to incorporate heritage protections, conservation zones, active heritage management and incorporate, respond and celebrate Aboriginal heritage values into the design of the precinct, in consultation with the local Aboriginal community. Future phases of the development would impact Aboriginal cultural heritage objects or sites and values and as such, further assessment and investigation of the Aboriginal heritage constraints within the Subject Area is required prior to any development works in accordance with the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* and *National Parks and Wildlife Regulation*.



7 Conclusions and recommendations

Niche was commissioned by CKDI Bringelly to complete an PACHA for the rezoning of the Belmore Road Precinct. This PACHA was prepared to inform a draft ILP and PPP.

The PACHA included consultation with Registered Aboriginal Parties, details of which are in Appendices B and C).

Due to limitations of site access, only 30% of the Subject Area was surveyed as part of this assessment. The remaining 70% was assessed via desktop analysis only. The limited site survey identified two new Aboriginal sites (SCW PAD 1 and SCW PAD 2). Additionally, eight previously recorded AHIMS registered Aboriginal cultural heritage sites were identified within the Subject Area.

The Registered Aboriginal Parties have also identified cultural values associated with the landscape and these Aboriginal cultural heritage sites. As such, there are opportunities to incorporate heritage protections, conservation zones, active heritage management and incorporate, respond and celebrate Aboriginal heritage values into the design of the precinct, in consultation with the local Aboriginal community.

Future phases of development would impact Aboriginal cultural heritage objects or sites and values and as such, further assessment, consultation and investigation of the Aboriginal heritage constraints within the Subject Area is required prior to any development works in accordance with the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* and *National Parks and Wildlife Regulation*.

Part 6 of the NPW Act provides protection for all Aboriginal objects and declared Aboriginal places from harm. Harm is defined as destroying, defacing, damaging or moving an object from the land. An AHIP is a legal document that grants you permission to harm Aboriginal objects or declared Aboriginal places and sets out any conditions you must comply with.

Based on community consultation with the RAPs for the Project, and with the completion of this PACHA by Niche, the following recommendations have been made:

1.	CDKI should incorporate known Aboriginal sites and areas of moderate and high archaeological sensitivity into conservation zones wherever possible.	
2.	Areas for conservation of Aboriginal cultural heritage must be considered as part of the future development of the Precinct. Conservation areas should be within areas of high/moderate archaeological potential, preferably within the less disturbed parts of these areas, as well as riparian zones and ridgelines. Impacts to these conservation areas (e.g. drainage infrastructure, sporting fields, footpaths and other facilities/landscaping) should be avoided.	
3.	Consultation should be conducted with the RAPs to inform Designing with Country across the precinct. Following the recommended ACHA (see below) an Interpretation Plan should be developed with the Aboriginal Stakeholders, to enable Aboriginal cultural knowledge to be incorporated into the design and development of the Precinct.	
4.	CKDI Bringelly should continue to consult with the Aboriginal community in accordance with the Aboriginal community consultation requirements for proponents and the Protocol for Aboriginal Stakeholder Involvement in the Assessment of Aboriginal Heritage in the Sydney Priority Growth Areas, to determine and assess the cultural heritage values of the Subject Area.	



Recommendations 5. Further investigation and assessment is required in accordance with the Guide to investigating, assessing and reporting on Aboriginal cultural heritage in NSW and the Protocol for Aboriginal Stakeholder Involvement in the Assessment of Aboriginal Heritage in the Sydney Priority Growth Areas to fully assess constraints ,opportunities and impacts for the proposed activity on Aboriginal objects and cultural heritage values within the Subject Area. 6. Further site survey of the entire Subject Area should be undertaken with the RAPs prior to any development works. This will ensure a more complete understanding the Aboriginal cultural heritage constraints within the Subject Area. T 7. AHIMS site cards should be submitted for newly recorded sites SCW PAD 1 and SCW PAD 2 8. SCW PAD 1 and SCW PAD 2 should be subject to an archaeological test and/or salvage excavation program prior to any development works. 9. 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
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Appendix A: Revised Indicative Layout Plan - 15.09.2023



BHL has initiated this rezoning through the Precinct Planning Process, which includes the development of an Integrated Layout Plan (ILP) and Precinct Planning Report. The ILP will be informed by constraints assessments undertaken by consultants, including Aboriginal heritage constraints identified during this assessment. The ILP and Precinct Planning Report that will be submitted to NSW Department of Planning, Infrastructure and the Environment (DoPIE) to assist in the rezoning process.

It has been identified that the proposed rezoning and potential future development may occur close to the location of previously recorded Aboriginal cultural heritage sites listed in Table 1 and Table 2 below. Figure 1 depicts locations of these sites in relation to the proposed works.

Methodology for Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment

BHL has engaged Niche Environment and Heritage (Niche) to assist with the following for each of the two Subject Areas:

- The preparation of an ACHA report.
- Determining the cultural significance of Aboriginal objects and/or places relevant to the Subject Area.



- Preparation of an impact assessment and providing appropriate management recommendations for any identified Aboriginal objects that might be identified during the process.
- Detailing the community consultation process and any Aboriginal cultural heritage values identified, in compliance with the *Aboriginal cultural heritage consultation requirements for proponents 2010.*

The ACHA will follow the guidelines set out in the:

- National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974.
- Guide to Investigating, Assessing and Reporting on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in NSW.
- Code of Practice for Archaeological Investigation of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales.
- Aboriginal cultural heritage consultation requirements for proponents 2010.
- The Burra Charter The Australian National Committee of the International Council on Monuments and Sites.

The ACHA will follow the general methodology described by the tasks below:

- **Desktop assessment** compile and analyse previous assessments within the local region. The assessment will:
 - Include searches of the relevant heritage registers (AHIMS, Heritage Branch Heritage Inventory and Local Environmental heritage schedules from Camden City Council).
 - Include background research including; previous Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal heritage studies and reports; historical development and use of the area, and landscape analysis and settlement characterisation consistent with the current Biodiversity and Conservation Division (BCD) (previously known as the (Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH)) archaeological codes of practice.

Site Assessment

A site survey will be carried out (including representative of RAPs) for each Subject Area. We have allowed four (4) days of survey for each Subject Area. The site surveys will inspect areas of high archaeological potential within the Subject Area and identify Aboriginal cultural heritage sites that may be present within the Subject Area. It also aims to provide further information on the Aboriginal cultural heritage values of

- Flagging and recording the location of artefacts and features using a hand held non-differential GPS unit.
- Photographic recording of the location and surroundings of flagged artefacts and features.
- Recording every identified archaeological site on pro formas, including details such as a written
 description, photographic recording, a sketch of the context of the recorded site and extent using a
 hand held non-differential GPS unit.

- A discuss of site conditions with RAPs and a record made of all comments and recommendations for each site.





Thank you for the opportunity of commenting on this project. Firstly disappointed that we were not included in the initial survey.

- 1. The survey is incomplete and should be completed before any development works take place on any of the Precinct. It should be assessed as a landscape and not just on individual sites within the area.
- 2. The riparian corridors have been identified in Figure 7 has having high to moderate significance, and should always be avoided as best as possible. Conservation outcomes should be given a high priority.
- 3. Site 45-5-3799 on Figure 5 has been identified as having an AHIP. This site was not for complete destruction, only partially with a trench through it. All surface artefacts were moved from the process. However the site extends through the fence into the study area.
- 4. Site 45-5-5255 is on both sides of the study area.
- 5. I find it incredible that there was not one single artefact located within the surveyed area. I realise that there have been PAD areas identified, but not one single artefact.
- 6. I do not believe that the recommendation to the two identified PAD's, will be the only places that will need testing, based on the landscape.
- 7. The tree coverage within the Precinct, could also have further scarred trees, with one already registered, within the study area that has not been surveyed.

Looking forward to working on this Precinct proposal in the future.

Conservation outcomes should be given a high priority. 3. Site 45-5-3799 on Figure 5 has been identified as having an AHIP. This site was not for complete destruction, only partially with a trench through it. All surface artefacts were moved from the process. However the site extends through the fence into the study area. 4. Site 45-5-5255 is on both sides of the study area. 5. I find it incredible that there was not one single artefact located within the surveyed area. I realise that there	

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							have been PAD areas identified, but not one single artefact. 6. I do not believe that the recommendation to the two identified PAD's, will be the only places that will need testing, based on the landscape. 7.
