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Part 1 Introduction

1.1 Objective and intended outcomes

The objective of this planning proposal is to seek a dwelling entitlement for Lot 1 DP 258921 by amending Part 6 of Byron Local Environmental Plan (LEP) 2014 to include additional local provisions.

1.2 Subject land

This Planning Proposal relates to 32 Grays Lane, Tyagarah legally described as Lot 1 DP 258921, as shown below in Figure 1.



Figure 1: Subject land




Figure 2: Land zone map under LEP 2014

The land is zoned RU2 Rural Landscape in accordance with LEP 2014 (Figure 2).

The land has an area of 4.207 hectares and the street address is 32 Grays Lane, Tyagarah.

The land contains an existing unauthorised dual occupancy (detached). However the subject planning proposal seeks a dwelling entitlement for a single dwelling only. The lot was created by subdivision registered on 1 August 1979 but does not have a dwelling entitlement.

The site is adjoined to the north by land containing a dwelling and a retail plant nursery / landscaping material supplies, to the east by a multiple occupancy / community title subdivision, to the south by the rail corridor and to the west by the Pacific Motorway. The land is accessed from Grays Lane via a registered right of carriageway over the adjoining lot to the north.

1.3 Background

Action No. 22 of the *Byron Shire Rural Land Use Strategy 2017* (BSRLS) recommends investigation into a strategic framework for resolving dwelling entitlement issues. This strategy was endorsed by the NSW DPIE in July 2018. This action provides the strategic basis for the subject planning proposal.

Further, Council resolution 20-283 at the Ordinary Planning meeting of 18 June 2020 provides that a planning proposal may be lodged to seek a dwelling entitlement for land containing existing (as of 18 June 2020) unauthorised dwellings but has no dwelling entitlement. This resolution references the “Unauthorised Residential Accommodation

Policy” which, via Council Resolution 21-448 dated 28 October 2021, has been converted to a guideline document for internal use by staff to outline the process for reactive investigations initiated by complaints and owner-initiated actions.

To support this planning proposal the following studies were provided by the applicant:

- Preliminary Contaminated Land Site Investigation
- Flood Assessment
- On-site Wastewater Management Assessment
- Bushfire Assessment
- Driveway and Access Assessment

Part 2 Explanation of provisions

The planning proposal seeks to include an additional local provision in Part 6 of Byron LEP 2014 to permit a dwelling house on Lot 1 DP 258921 with development consent.

Part 3 Justification

Section A Need for the planning proposal





Section C Environmental, social and economic impact

Q8. Is there any likelihood that critical habitat or threatened species, populations or ecological communities, or their habitats, will be adversely affected as a result of the proposal?

No. The planning proposal seeks to permit a dwelling house with development consent on land zoned RU2.

The site includes some mapped High Environmental Value Vegetation identified as coastal swamp forest and North Coast wet sclerophyll forest, and the entire site is mapped as bushfire prone land. This vegetation is located approximately 43m and 53m respectively from the existing dwelling. Given these significant distances between the existing dwelling and vegetation, the establishment of required Asset Protection Zones to comply with Planning for Bushfire Protection 2019 will not have a significant ecological impact.

It is highly unlikely that critical habitat or threatened species, populations or ecological communities, or their habitats, will be adversely affected as a result of the planning proposal.

Q9. Are there any other likely environmental effects as a result of the planning proposal and how are they proposed to be managed?

No. The planning proposal ultimately seeks development consent for the use of an existing dwelling which will not result in any significant physical change to the land.

Q10. Has the planning proposal adequately addressed any social and economic effects?

The planning proposal will have minimal social and economic effects as the site already contains an existing dwelling house.

Section D Infrastructure

Q11. Is there adequate public infrastructure for the planning proposal?

The existing public road network via Grays Lane is suitable to accommodate the minimal additional traffic generated by a dwelling house without any need for upgrades to be undertaken.

The Gateway determination has yet to be issued. It is anticipated that the following authorities and agencies will be consulted during public exhibition of the planning proposal:

Conclusion

This planning proposal seeks to amend Byron Local Environmental Plan (LEP) 2014 to permit a dwelling house with development consent on Lot 1 DP 258921, 32 Grays Lane Tyagarah

The land contains an existing dwelling house without a dwelling entitlement and has been constructed and used without consent.

The planning proposal is supported by a preliminary contaminated land assessment, an on-site wastewater management assessment, a bushfire assessment, a flood assessment, a driveway and access assessment and AHIMS search. These studies conclude that the site is suitable for the use of the existing dwelling house.

It is appropriate that the planning proposal be sent to the NSW DPHI for a Gateway determination so that it can proceed to public exhibition (subject to compliance with any Gateway conditions).
