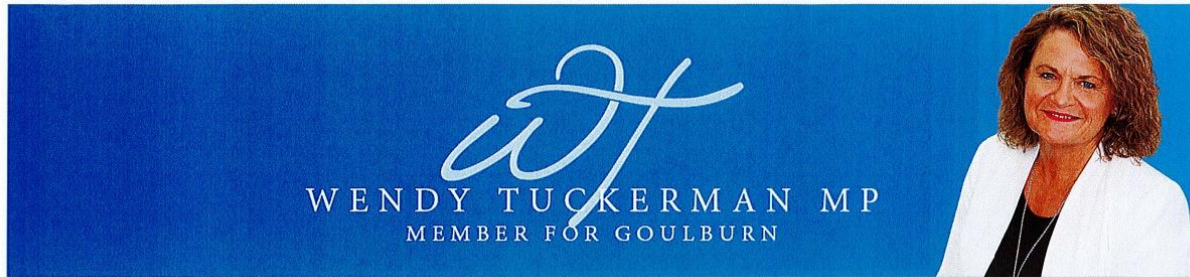

The Reserve has been a long-standing business that provides tourism for locals of Yass Valley and the wider region.

As Member for Goulburn I support the group of eight historical holiday cabins as Crown Land Lease Holders and Yass Council ratepayers since the mid-1940's, who are desperately awaiting a response from DPE, Crown Lands and Minister Kamper regarding a request of genuine consultation and engagement with the Department and greater transparency in the management of Crown Lands in these matters.


Since May the group has negotiated application with Yass Heritage Society as a group heritage application which has been supported and is now in the final stages of nomination, based on the establishment of the fishing village by returned servicemen and women from WW2 - which are the current 5 generations of families that have maintained these holiday cabins.

As I understand the group has been unable to communicate with the Minister or Department in any satisfactory or meaningful way with any response to the multiple requests resulting on only an eviction notice.

I kindly request an extension to the deadline provided in order to negotiate a fair and equitable outcome for the holiday cabin site owners.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. I eagerly await your positive response and the opportunity to discuss this important issue.

Proposed removal of Swinging Bridge shacks

I have recently learnt about the NSW government's plan to remove the shacks at Swinging Bridge. The huts are indeed a ramshackle collection, but they are an intrinsic part of the cultural history of the Wee Jasper area and should be preserved as such.

While writing the history of Wee Jasper, I spoke with many who have an interest in the shacks including Jess Sheather who built one of the shacks of materials cobbled together in the lean post WWII years. What came through very clearly was that after the turmoil and deprivation of the war years, people wanted to experience a simple life in a beautiful and peaceful environment where they could share time with friends and family year after year. I ended up devoting a section of my book 'You Can't Eat Scenery' to the story of the shacks because I felt they were integral to the history of the district.

Our history is too often 'sanitised' by the removal of elements that are deemed unsightly or past their 'use by date' by authorities of the day. Better that the truth be acknowledged and accommodated and shared with young ones – especially those who live inside their screens and can't imagine life without them, or who live in houses with all mod cons and can't comprehend that living in a shack can be a pleasant and restorative experience.

Proper sanitation is certainly necessary. Systems are available for this and used in many facilities near waterbodies. Appropriate standards and costs could be met by shack owners before continuing occupancy is agreed. Removal of the huts to accommodate more campers and caravaners, if that is the intention, is likely to increase rather than reduce visual and environmental impact and pollution.

The shacks have been part of the Wee Jasper community for as long as most residents and regular visitors can remember. People haven't stopped coming because the shacks look a bit untidy. As my grandson, who loves the area, said when he heard that the shacks were to be demolished, "Why? What harm are they doing?"

The document shown to me indicates removal of the shacks is a 'done deal'. I hope this decision can be reversed or, at the very least, delayed until a heritage assessment can be undertaken, and owners can genuinely be involved in a decision making. The latter is a minimum requirement of natural justice. There are other examples in our state where preservation of our history has been acknowledged as more important than demolition, or development of a different kind, and old buildings have been left standing.

Re Swinging Bridge shacks:

The Swinging Bridge shacks are a valuable asset and an integral part of the Wee Jasper valley.

The valley comprises of grazing lands at the northern, eastern and southern parts; the historic Allen Truss Wee Jasper bridge and village plus business area in the centre; the Swinging Bridge and Micalong settlements in the south; with five Crown Lands camping reserves distributed through the valley; the Goodradigbee River running from the south into Burrinjuck recreational and flood mitigation dam in the north; plus an extensive limestone cave system with Carey's Caves tourist attraction in the north.

This combination has always attracted a great variety of people. We have permanent residents, part time permanent residents, regular holiday makers who do not own property, first time visitors, school groups, scouting groups, leadership programs and defence force programs all enjoying the experiences that Wee Jasper offers.

It is the permanent residents (*81 including children*) and part time permanent residents who maintain Wee Jasper's community and who care for its environment enabling others to experience Wee Jasper. We are a small number and every person dedicated to Wee Jasper plays a role across the school, the extensive community activities or the volunteer bushfire brigade.

We cannot overstate the importance of an active Swinging Bridge shack owners contingent (*regulars are approx. 38 adults 12 children*) toward the overall functioning of our community. Removal of these shacks greatly undermines the available number of Wee Jasper volunteers.

As active community members we can comment on this through our experiences as continuous permanent residents, Ian since 1948 and Helen since 1978. Growing up in Wee Jasper Ian's family were socially connected with the people who established the Swinging Bridge shacks and before the village hall was built new years eve celebrations were held at Swinging Bridge. Indeed Swinging Bridge residents helped in the fund raising that built the Wee Jasper Memorial Hall.

We have read Jennifer Barton's letter of support on retaining the Swinging Bridge shacks and wholly support her points raised: the importance of preserving history; an understanding that 'beauty is in the eye of the beholder' and changes overtime; the role of modern technology to solve the sanitation problems; and the requirement for natural justice.

In closing we reiterate:

The Swinging Bridge shacks are a valuable asset and an integral part of the Wee Jasper valley.

My Name is Warren Page, I am a retired veteran. My service was during the second Malaysian Emergency 1969-1989 and served with the 3rd Battalion (Airborne) at Airbase Butterworth Malaysia protecting Australian Assets on the base. My service in 1982 included fully armed patrols of the Thai Malay border in search of Communist Terrorists (CT's) who had intentions of destroying Australian assets and personnel on or around the base. On My return to Australia I was suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and have over the past 41 years sort respite and rehabilitation down at the fishing huts in Wee Jasper, which has been a very significant factor in controlling the disorder to which I continue to suffer.

The shacks have been built by WWII Veterans, these veterans have and continue to assist in the eradication of the European Carp that plague the river that runs by the huts. These men and women have been instrumental in protecting the wildlife and fauna in this area.

These huts serve a huge part in the maintenance of many veterans mental health and will continue to do so for many years to come

In closing, I believe these Huts/shacks should be left in place as they have done since WWII and should be heritage listed and protected.

Something that has ubiquitous and unreplicable value. I can confidently say that they hold all the physical and intangible elements of something worth preserving. This is my letter of acknowledgement of the extraordinary lengths taken to ensure these infrastructures are well within the boundaries that recognise solidarity of frame work through essential build practices within their time as I know it. - Any areas of improvement needed are of little consequence to the overall imperviousness of each frame work & can be attended to without excessive/exorbitant means.

Robinson Family Cabin, 308 Nottingham Rd, Swinging Bridge, Wee Jasper

Our grandfather (Douglas Main) received authorisation to build on the land by Wee Jasper station manager in 1958, the lease has been officially passed down over the years with the approval of the Department of Lands (we possess all the original documentation to support this).¹ Although the shack has undergone minor modifications, such as the addition of a small back room and kitchen, it remains remarkably similar to its original form. These enhancements have allowed our many extended families to comfortably stay for extended periods during Christmas, Easter, and various long weekends throughout the year.

Throughout the decades, our shack has served as a constant presence in our lives, acting as a gathering place for our extended family. It holds great sentimental value, as the ashes of our father, uncle, aunt, and cousin have been scattered here. The front door serves as a unique record of our family's growth, displaying the height measurements of each sibling and cousin from childhood to adulthood.

Our shack has played a crucial role in providing respite and healing for our family members. We have always respected the local community and actively contributed to its well-being. As proud members of the fishing club, we have formed lasting bonds with many locals and witnessed the growth of their children over time. We cherish memories of spending time together on the old Swinging Bridge, attending movies and bingo nights in the hall, exploring Careys Caves, restoring the river's fishing grounds after the introduction of carp, and assisting in the clean-up efforts following the 2012 flood.

Trips to Wee Jasper have always entailed visits to Yass or Tumut to replenish our supplies, supporting local businesses along the way. We have regularly purchased timber, conducted pest treatments and inspections, acquired beds and appliances for our shack, and hired 'poo carters' to maintain the drop toilet's hygiene. Additionally, an annual excursion to Batlow enabling us to stock up on canned goods for the entire year and indulge in the joy of cherry picking.

Our mother, Beth Robinson (Douglas Mains daughter) is now 87 years old. Beth started going to Wee Jasper when she was 13 years old. I last took her for a visit on the 25th April 2023. Douglas Main great grandchildren have visited the shack since there were babies and we want his great, great grandchildren to continue the tradition. In summary, our shack holds a special place in our heart and in the hearts of the Swinging Bridge community, serving as a testament to our family's history and providing a sanctuary for generations. We have proudly embraced our role in the local community, forging enduring relationships and actively supporting businesses and initiatives in the surrounding areas.

Fryer Family Shack – known as “The Shack” 312 Nottingham Rd, Swinging Bridge Reserve.

As referenced on page 303 of Jennifer Barton’s *You can’t eat Scenery – Life in Wee Jasper 1850 to 1970* - Our corrugated iron fishing shack was built in the late 1940s by our founding family member Jesse Sheather. It sits across the dirt road from the Goodradigbee River in the area now known as Swinging Bridge Reserve. Our shack was passed down from Uncle Jesse when his wife Auntie Trixie passed away. It’s often hard to believe that these very humble fishing shacks and this nurturing location has provided so much to 5 generations of our extended family over the past 80+ years.

Traditionally, every Easter and October long weekend we’d drive from Sydney in convoy meeting up in Yass to stock-up with groceries before winding our way into Wee Jasper. The sense of coming home was felt by us all as we crossed the last cattle grid before descending to Swinging Bridge Reserve.

The first thing we always do on arrival is to walk down to the riverbank and breath, survey the rocks in the water, the current and scope out the campsite for those that didn’t fit in the shack.

The most senior generation of the family would sleep in the shack with the rest camped across the road on the riverbank, we had our own small town, with the number of tents varying depending on the number of friends that would join our annual pilgrimages.

This has been our family ritual, we come together, we breath, we take stock, and we share in the magic of Wee Jasper. Always going home with our reserves topped up enough to get back into the ‘real world.’

We have family members ashes scattered in Wee Jasper, my children and grandchildren caught their first fish in the Goodradigbee, they sat around our campfires and learned about stars in the clearest night sky that they had ever seen.

Over the years we have enjoyed being part of the community, contributing to the area and environment by:

- Being stalwarts of the long running fishing club
- Helping with bush fires and other community events such as re-stocking the river
- Helped clear debris from the river and riverbank following 2012 floods
- Bringing in revenue, as large extended families and friends gather to camp and visit us
- Advising tourists about things to do in the local area, when they stop and ask us about the history of the shacks
- Paying our leases, rates, insurances etc regularly over the years, our policies are current we have received and paid our current rates.

Our Shack and Swinging Bridge Reserve is our everything, we hope to remain grateful to be able to continue leasing from Crown Lands, supporting the Wee Jasper community and continue making memories with our families and friends at Swinging Bridge Reserve, Wee Jasper.

KERR Family Cabin: 325 Nottingham Road, Swinging Bridge Wee Jasper.

The Kerr family connection to Wee Jasper stems back decades.

Robert (Bob) Kerr, locally known as “Scotty” first came to Wee Jasper valley in the 1940’s. He was passionate about trout fishing and saw plenty of potential here, along with a landscape that reminded him of his homeland Scotland.

At first Bob and his family camped on the ground that is now known as Swinging Bridge Reserve, fishing and getting to know other campers. The same families returned year after year, forging strong bonds with each other and friendships with station hands and locals. This continued for about 10 years until Bob and some of the other campers chose to lease land and build more permanent structures in the late 1950’s. (Early lease and land map of leasees enclosed).

Our grandfather Bob built his cabin, originally a two room structure, and then later added a ‘verandah’ and internal bathroom in the mid sixties. Bob and family often stayed for months at a time, but now the cabin is used by his descendants throughout the year to reconnect with family, with the past and with nature. Our cabin has been well loved and well maintained for over sixty years.

Bob Kerr was integral to the construction of the second swinging bridge, along with Ken Grace, bringing labour and materials from his Newcastle scrapyards. He and his wife Mabel also petitioned Yass council to tar the road in front of the Swinging Bridge cabins to make life more pleasant in the era of large logging trucks passing regularly.

Our family provides financial support to the RFS and has participated in local and community events such as the Wee Jasper Fishing Club, rodeos, dances at The Station, and impromptu concerts at the Old Keg Inn!

Bob’s heart and soul was Wee Jasper. His ashes are spread there and he has passed this love onto his daughters Janet and Dianne the current lease holders, his grandchildren and great grandchildren. Our mother, Janet Kerr is eighty years old and has been going to Wee Jasper for over 70 years. We have old film footage of Janet and Dianne as very young girls camping on site at Swinging Bridge before the cabin was built. This history is hard to ignore. We have a deep connection to the area, our cabin and its evolution. Our mother Janet, is overwhelmed at the likelihood of losing this tangible foothold in Wee Jasper history.

These historical cabins are part of the landscape and have been for over 60 years. The community of cabins brings a picturesqueness of charm and nostalgia. Without them, the area would not be the same.

The King Family's humble holiday fishing cottage (shack) at Wee Jasper NSW began with family connections on the Goodradigbee River at Swinging Bridge Village, Wee Jasper. The era began with my late Grandfather Percy King and his 13 children. My father being one of the youngest of the 13 children, Ken King.

As my grandparents Percy and Mary King were settlers from England from 1879 in nearby Tumut (50) years after the settlement in 1925. The settlement was supported in a family lifestyle in establishing a local Greengrocer business and grandfather Percy King a local based mining engineer around Tumut and Adelong goldmines. My father Ken King was born in Tumut 1915 with 9 brothers and 3 sisters that later settled between Batlow, Tumut, and later south coast NSW, Narooma.

From the early family days and my Grandfather Percy King, Ken and his siblings would ride horse back to explore the bushland between surrounding towns of Tumut, one being Wee Jasper where the favourite trout fishing streams were abundant of fish.

Fly fishing being the choice of recreation in the natural spring fed streams in limestone beds that fed the Goodradigbee River through Brindabella Ranges and Wee Jasper. Fly lures were made from insects and natural flora and fauna to attract species of rainbow, brown trout, Murray cod, whilst yabbies were also abundant in the slow water being caught when underwater swimming.

Kens first son, Jon King was born in 1937 after his first marriage prior to WW2, introducing his family to Wee Jasper in the Swinging Bridge and Brindabella area in these early years.

In 1939 WW2 was declared and my father Ken was conscripted into the Royal Australian Airforce, serving in the South Sea Islands and Papua New Guinea against the Japanese and later in 1945 served service against the Germans in defence in France until 1946.

Ken's (12) brothers and sisters were also involved in active WW2 defence duties as well as my Grandfather (mothers side) Sidney Hyde in civil defence as a plumber. Sidney was unfortunately killed in WW2 civil services to Australia by injuries sustained during the WW2 years.

My uncle William (Bill) Hyde (my mother's brother) being an Australian squadron leader flying English Lancaster Bomber Aircraft in Squadrons for England in famous dam busters raids due to pilot shortages of persons killed in duty in the English Royal Air Force.

My father Ken King returned from duty with the RAAF from WW2 with brothers and my uncles with inspirations of his teenage years and settling with a holiday cabin for his family with a fishing village in Swinging Bridge Area, Wee Jasper NSW.

The opportunity created from the Crown Lands 99-year perpetual lease was then taken over by the Goobragandra trust, Ken King became an active member of since his spending his second marriage honeymoon with my mother Sheila, camping at the swinging bridge Wee Jasper in 1957.

Ken then building our family Shack with my uncles from Tumut and Batlow as well as my uncle Bill and that visited spending weekends fishing and planting both native trees and local fruit trees and wine grapes from the Tumut and Batlow area all used in making local jams.

Our family fishing cottage / shack served as a place of tranquillity from previous WW2 service and the sufferance of loss of life and injuries to family and friends' members.

My growing years were an experience of the strength of family members as returned servicemen with stories of only good times on the Goodradigbee river village and sharing weekend fishing catches with stories of good times in the neighbouring makeshift cabins.

These cabins were created using traditional methods and materials available after the ending of the war and earlier depression years in Australia.

These times of reflection for more joyous times initiated the basis on the initiation of the Wee Jasper Fishing Club with neighbouring shack owner and President of the club, Jess Sheather, and my father Ken King the secretary created family fun in fishing competitions and celebrations.

This club being carried thru to the recent days with President Dennis Smith, (the Mitchell /Grace family from the first original shack " the Old keg Inn ") in mid-1940's made from rolled out 44 gallon drums and timber tree hand milled frames.

Our holiday cabin on the Goodradigbee river, amongst the tranquillity of local landscapes served as in today's standards as therapy for Post Traumatic Stress in its hardest form, whilst supporting nature by the maintenance by family and friends who were both invited and visited.

RSL Sub Branch members of returned service were also common visitors within our holiday cabin with stories of long walks into the hills and valleys trout fishing from 5am to sunset.

Since these early days of settlement, family and friends have both spent lifetimes in seasonal holiday visits and ended with their lifetimes, passed away and been left in cremation ceremonies on both the property and surrounding landscapes initiating spiritual, cultural, and historic family values.

In 1998, my father Ken, passing away peacefully at our shack at 83 years of age. This serves as a tribute to our family heritage of all his labour of love in trees and fruit over 60 years that attract the multitude of native birds and wildlife such as wombats, echidnas and goannas living on the riverbanks.

I have personally kept our family spirit alive with the upkeep of maintaining the same gardens of our holiday cabin and the memories that are attached to everyday life and seasonal change of the native environment.

The maintenance of the riverfront in both flora, fauna, and eradication of introduced European carp/fish is a priority of our Cabin user. Whilst overseeing the care of local platypus in their breeding and playgrounds well known in the Swinging Bridge River area during all months of the year when seasonal day trippers and campers utilise the area with limited knowledge of the native environment that surrounds the village.

Fruit trees ranging from citrus Lemon, bush orange, naval orange, tangerine, (5) types of plums, apricot, peach, 3 types of apples, nectarine, grapes, and walnut. The fence line of our cottage being paperbark tree, she-oak, native bottle brush and cherry blossom trees sets a tranquil and welcoming outlook as well as make seasonal nesting for birds such as wagtails, wrens, bowerbirds, and odd fly in of lyrebirds.

My father Ken, last planting an apple tree and wisteria prior to his passing in 1998 serves as shade for our cabin during summer months whilst the maintenance of a rose garden offers natural garden scents. Our place is always alive with an extensive range of native birds that habitat within the surrounding native environment. Visiting campers always amongst the conversation and scents taking home fruits from our trees is an overwhelming experience for our family and introducing families to our culture that seasonally return in friendship and support of our well-established fishing village.

Since my personal childhood days with siblings, fishing and family river fun has been the lifeblood in our family values and supporting the surrounding families within the Swinging Bridge village.

My family being introduced to indigenous culture very early in life with Narooma NSW connections with family uncle and my brother Michael King also marrying a Tasmanian indigenous partner (Birralelee) into our family served as testament to the original Indigenous natives to Australia.

Birralelee's father being a famous artist with displays throughout local books and Melbourne International Airport in 2006-08 was inspired by the Goodradigbee river cottage and its settlement.

My brother Michael King also a returned servicemen from Australian defence force serving over 35 years in East Timor and Afghanistan and being OAM recipient for his military service to Australia has both been on the historical lease with myself and brothers. His own family of 4 children and 2 new grandchildren in current growing years and joyful memories of seasonal trips at the property.

Whist myself as a retired NSW Police Force member has enjoyed using the property in my own therapy of post traumatic trauma and police service history. Valuing my own family network with my now 9-year-old son Jack, teaching family cultures of both trout fishing methods and techniques of his late grandfathers and uncles that established the King's family Shack and village fishing ethics in developed family values towards the surrounding native title.

This tradition has been carried by our family for over 60 years at our holiday cabin with school friends since 1960's primary school days attending the property in growing years. Over these years these same children have grown and had their own families and brought their families to our cabin and surrounding campsites in perpetual teaching methods of yesteryear.

One of these family friends being Warren Page, another current returned serviceman. Warren has been visiting our shack since his defence force days between 1979 and 1989. His daughter Tammy another current Aust Defence force member with young 3-year-old Bella who is now in a new generation in traditional days and family shack use is another tribute to the upkeep of heritage values within the village.

Overall, our holiday cottage is, and has been a tribute towards the Post Ww2 veterans in our family and friends who over time enjoyed living the simple holiday lifestyle of fishing and recreation with the local native appreciation and conservation with regeneration being its purpose.

These traditions have since my family members passing away been and passed on to new generations of tradition in fishing and native conservation, again in new generations of Defence force personnel within our family tradition. Our King family hope is for all to be retained within the village it was originally formed as and now within the Yass Heritage Society nomination that it historically deserves for future balance of life in difficult and good times.

The policing, safety, security, and preservation of native habitat has never since the introduction of the historical leases in mid-1940's been maintained by Crown Lands staffing, rather than maintenance regarding day tripper campers within the area. Therefore, it is essential of the heritage nomination of the Swinging Bridge village in maintaining the surrounding environment under the Australian native title.

Please find attached, family and friends' pictures of returned defence force and Police within our King family that have carried the legacy and traditions of the "The Kings" cabin at the Swinging Bridge Village.

The Neragona shack was originally part of the housing development for immigrants that arrived in Australia to work. The shack was based in Chullora and when transported to Wee Jasper. My family have spent almost every Easter at Wee Jasper along with Australia Day, long weekends, New Year, Boxing Day and special birthdays including 16th and 21st for my daughter. We have spent 24hrs at Wee Jasper just because we love being there in the shack with the memories of family and friends. My children have a special connection to the shack as do my nieces, nephews, aunts, uncles and cousins on both sides of the family. Our family have had so many memorable times in the shack and as relatives get older we hold onto these memories. My youngest daughter loves the shack so much she had the coordinates tattooed on her arm.
