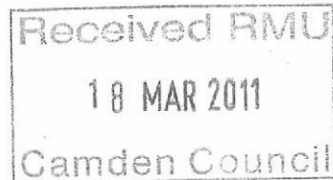

Thank you for providing the Department of Environment, Climate Change and Water (DECCW) with the opportunity to comment on the Integrated Development Proposal for A Richardson Road SPRING FARM, Lot: PT1100 DP:1139217.

This letter contains the DECCW's general terms of approval, in accordance with the Integrated Development Approval provisions of the EPA Act, for those known Aboriginal sites which would require an Aboriginal Heritage Permit (AHIP) pursuant to s.90 of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW).

DECCW notes that an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) application was received by the Metropolitan Branch, Planning & Aboriginal Heritage Section (PAHS) for this development on 7th October 2010. At this time, the proponent was informed that current DECCW policy is that Development Consent is required prior to any s90 AHIP application being determined and that determination of the application could not proceed until development consent had been granted.

The proponent responded by stating that an amended AHIP application will be submitted once development consent has been issued.


In the light of this, DECCW provides the following General Terms of Approval in relation to Aboriginal Cultural Heritage associated with the above development:
