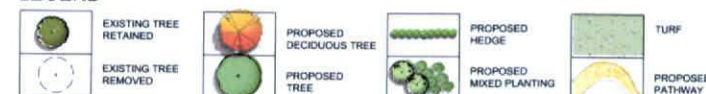


- 1 Courtyards with arbors and sitting areas provide opportunities for recreation activities.
- 2 Community garden beds form activity areas and supplementary fresh produce for residents.
- 3 Eucalypt street tree planting to compliment existing character and reinforce natural values of site.
- 4 Pedestrian walkway identified with key deciduous trees to create identifiable links between village sectors.
- 5 Private open space provides opportunities for individual expression and passive recreation.
- 6 Courtyard form protected open space for use and enjoyment of residents.
- 7 New Cypress hedge planted to reinforce curtilage to heritage garden.
- 8 Existing indigenous trees retained and protected.
- 9 Garden to Lober House refurbished to compliment heritage values of place.



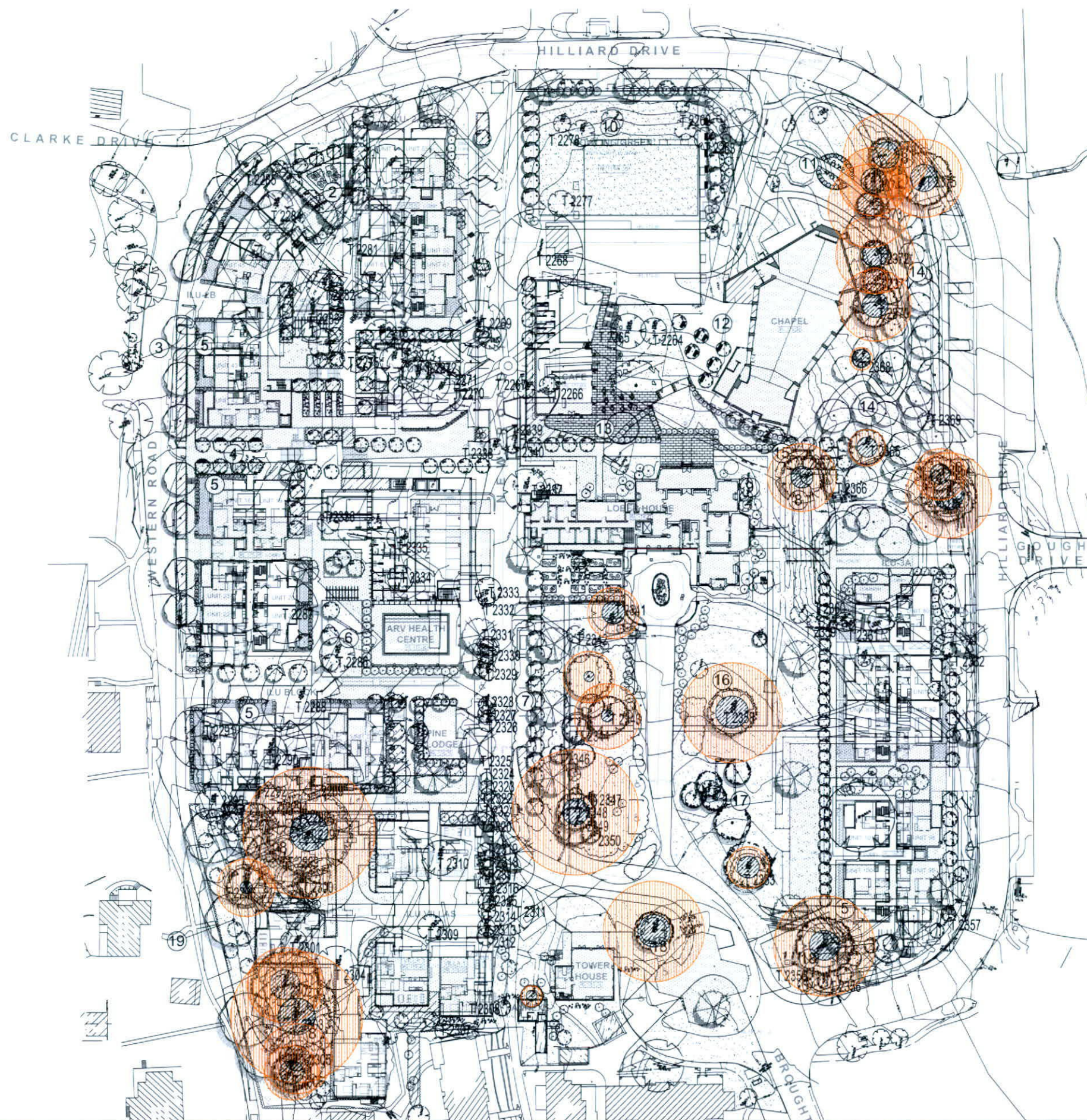
- 10 Bowling green located above carpark, provides facility and activity centre for residents.
- 11 Existing rose garden relocated with roses and plaques retained.
- 12 Meeting area created adjacent entry to Chapel.
- 13 Series of meeting spaces for residents created to the north of Lober House.
- 14 New grove of trees created to form shaded walking access area.
- 15 Axial planting of deciduous trees creates link between Lober House, wellness centre and cafe.
- 16 Heritage garden curtilage reinforced and reinterpreted to create appropriate setting for Lober House.
- 17 Well retained.
- 18 Landmark Norfolk Island Pine trees retained and protected.
- 19 Eight Eucalyptus saligna planted to compensate for lost Blue Gum canopy trees.
