## 1 Overview

This letter provides updated information regarding the Aboriginal archaeological assessment for the proposed Georges Cove Marina, 146 Newbridge Road, Moorebank (the project) prepared by Mary Dallas Consulting (Dallas 2004) (the 2004 assessment). It has been prepared on behalf of Benedict Industries Pty Ltd (Benedict).

The 2004 assessment was part of an environmental impact statement (EIS) accompanying a previous application to Liverpool City Council for development consent for the project in 2012. This application was granted to Tanlane Pty Ltd by the Sydney West Joint Region Planning Panel (JRPP) as the Consent Authority on 22 August 2014 with support from Liverpool City Council. The validity of the Consent was challenged by the proposal's sole objector, Moorebank Recycling Pty Ltd in the NSW Land and Environment Court. The court ruled in favour of the objector, declaring that the Consent was invalid and ruled that Tanlane should commission a preliminary contamination assessment, reapply for a consent and supply the preliminary contamination assessment report to the JRPP as part of the application.

EMGA Mitchell McLennan Pty Limited (EMM) has been engaged by Benedict to review the 2004 Aboriginal archaeological assessment in accordance with *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* (DECCW 2010) (due diligence guidelines) which aims to:

- identify whether or not Aboriginal objects are, or are likely to be, present in an area; and
- determine whether the proposed activities are likely to harm Aboriginal objects.

EMM reviewed the 2004 assessment report and completed an updated search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) register to confirm that Aboriginal sites have not been recorded, and are not likely to exist, in the project area. No further field survey was required because the project area is the same as that has not changed since the surveyed for the 2004 archaeological assessment.

## 2 Previous investigation

The 2004 assessment involved background environmental and archaeological research and a field survey of the entire project area accompanied by a site officer from the Gandangara Local Aboriginal Land Council (GLALC). No previously recorded Aboriginal sites were identified from background research and none were identified during the survey. The survey identified that over 90% of the project area had been subject to

past land use disturbance inclusive of deep sand mining, top soil removal and land fill. The trees inspected along the Georges River foreshore did not show signs of Aboriginal cultural modification. No areas of archaeological potential were identified. Dallas (2004) concluded that no further Aboriginal archaeological assessment was warranted.

### 3 AHIMS search

A search of the AHIMS register was completed on 8 April 2015. The search covered a 1 km by 2 km area centred on the project area and included the project area and surrounding land. No Aboriginal objects were identified in the AHIMS search area (Attachment A).

### 4 Conclusion and recommendations

The 2004 assessment and the updated AHIMS search fulfil the requirements of the due diligence guidelines because:

- the project is on disturbed land;
- no Aboriginal sites have been recorded in the project area; and
- an archaeological survey of the entire project area did not identify any Aboriginal objects or areas of archaeological potential.

As such, no further investigation is required for the project area. Although no Aboriginal objects are expected to occur in the project area, EMM recommends the following procedures be implemented to avoid harming any unknown Aboriginal objects:

1. If during the course of construction Benedict or any subcontractors become aware of any previously unidentified Aboriginal object(s), all work likely to affect the object(s) should cease immediately and the GLALC and an archaeologist be contacted for further advice.
2. If human suspected human skeletal remains are identified all work likely to affect the remains should cease immediately. The find should be reported to the police (as required for all human remains discoveries) and the Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) contacted for advice on the identification of the skeletal material as Aboriginal and management of the material. If the remains are Aboriginal ancestral remains, the GLALC should be contacted and consultative arrangements will be made to discuss ongoing care of the remains.
3. Benedict should provide heritage awareness training as part of the induction program for all on site personnel. The induction should include examples of Aboriginal objects so that unexpected finds can be identified during project construction.

ABORIGINAL ARCHAEOLOGICAL ASSESSMENT**

In September 2004 we undertook an Aboriginal archaeological assessment of Lot 1 in DP 515738 Newbridge Road Moorebank. The land is owned by Meron Investments Pty Limited and comprises approximately 15ha [See Figure 1]. The site is bound in the east by e Flower Power nursery and retail outlet and the Georges River, in the west end south by Boral Brickworks end in the north by Newbridge Road. The site is currently used by Benedict Sand Gravel for sand extraction, inert landfill and recycling.

**Site Condition**

The site is located within the Berkshire Park Soil Landscape [Bannermen and Hazelton 1990] comprising gently undulating rises on Tertiary clayey quartzose sand and clay terraces. Reference to the Penrith Geological 1:100,000 sheet indicates these deposits are located in the northern portion of the site. Quaternary alluviums, comprising medium grained sand, silt and clay, form the flank the Georges River in the east of the site. The bulk of these alluviums including topsoils have been removed by sand extraction.

The northern portion of the site has been filled to between 6 and 8m and contains a bitumen access road, weighbridge and Site Office [see Figures 2 and 3]. Topsoil had been removed, by the previous owner for sale, in the mid 1970s.

An open cut drain was constructed along the western site boundary in 1994 [see Figure 4].

The southern portion of the site has been sand mined by dredge to depths of 15m and currently contains three settling ponds covering the majority of the southern lands.

The site is largely cleared of vegetation. Older trees remain along the immediate shore line of the River along south eastern boundary [see Figure 5]. Portions of the riverbank are flood scoured and retained by rubble and earth fill.

## Archeeological Background

No previous Aboriginal archaeological survey has been conducted over the Lot [Refer Department of Environment and Conservation Register of Aboriginal Sites and Catalogue of Archaeological Reports]. Nearest Known sites were identified 1.5km to the south near the confluence of Williams Creek and the Georges River. These sites were open artefact scatters which have subsequently been destroyed under a DEC Permit.

Previous archaeological investigations in the general area have focused on lands proposed for housing development, in particular the suburbs of Wettle Grove, Holsworthy Village and Voyager Point, or the redevelopment of Department of Defence lands to the south. The discovery of the majority of sites has been the result of systematic archaeological site survey carried out prior to subdivision and the development. Archaeological surveys have been conducted in areas situated immediately to the south west and south of the present study area (for example Haglund 1995; Boot 1990, 1992, 1994; Dallas 1998a, 1998b 1998c; McDonald 1996). These studies have located a number of Aboriginal sites along the banks and flanks of Harris Creek and Williams Creek. These largely consist of open campsites in variously disturbed contexts, along with scarred trees.

Painted and drawn rock art sites dominate the recorded evidence that has been located to date south of the Georges River. The distribution of these types of sites necessarily relates to the presence of suitable exposures of sandstone surfaces and overhangs.

On the basis of previous archaeological survey in the general area and the landform contained within the study area, the types of sites which might be expected to occur on the study area in undisturbed areas would include open camp sites and scarred trees.

## Survey Results

The survey was conducted in consultation with the Gandangara Local Aboriginal Land Council [GLALC]. Mr Jamie Thomas, the Land Council Sites Officer assisted in the survey and has been commissioned to prepare a report on the GLALC's interest in the land [see Attachment 1].

Mr Ernest Dupre, of Benedict Sand and Gravel, assisted in identification of site boundaries, information on land use history and aerial photography.

The survey covered the entire Lot and concentrated on areas subject to least prior disturbance. The survey noted that over 90% of the Lot has been subject to past land use disturbance inclusive of deep sand mining, top soil removal and land fill. The western, southern and parts of the eastern perimeter of the site contains built up road surfaces to gain access to a series of settling ponds and fill areas. Any surface Aboriginal site as may have been located in these areas would not have survived such activities. None of these lands retain archaeological potential for buried undisturbed land surfaces or subsurface potentially artefact bearing deposits.

A narrow strip of Georges River foreshore [see Figure 5] marks the eastern boundary of sand dredging. A number of older trees are located in this area. None shows signs of scarring which could be ascribed an Aboriginal origin. Inspection of the river banks along this strip showed flood scoured bank sections and sections of introduced stone rubble and concrete fill. No undisturbed sections were noted. The likelihood of Aboriginal sites surviving past flood action and bank stabilisation works is minimal.



### Conclusions and Recommendations

No Aboriginal archaeological sites are located on Lot 1 in DP 515738, Newbridge Road, Moorebank. The past land use disturbances and major subsurface disruption on the Lot indicate there is little or no likelihood that buried deposits, not visible during the archaeological survey, would remain undisturbed or significant Aboriginal sites.

It is recommended that:

1. No further Aboriginal archaeological assessment is warranted or required for Lot 1 in DP 515738.

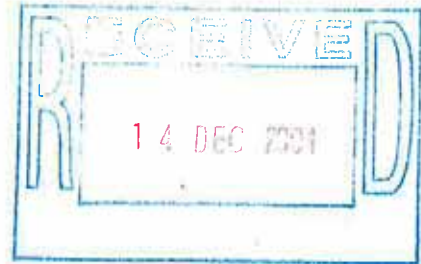
