MATTER DETERMINED

PPSSCC-506 – Blacktown – DA0173/22 - 30 Tattersall Road, Kings Park - Designated and Integrated Development for a proposed battery sorting and transfer station.

PANEL CONSIDERATION AND DECISION

The panel considered: the matters listed at item 6, the material listed at item 7 and the material presented at briefings and the matters listed at item 8 in Schedule 1.

Development application

The panel determined to approve the development application pursuant to section 4.16 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*.

The decision was unanimous.

REASONS FOR THE DECISION

The panel determined to approve the application for the reasons outlined in the council assessment report, replicated as follows:

The proposed development is consistent with the objectives and provisions of the Blacktown Local Environmental Plan 2015 and applicable State Environmental Planning Policies (Section 4.15(1)(a)(i) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979).

The use of the site as a battery sorting and transfer station contributes to the recycling process providing positive environmental outcomes (Section 4.15(1)(b) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979).

The site is suitable for the proposed development (Section 4.15(1)(c) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979).

The proposed development is in the public interest (Section 4.15(1)(e) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979).

Further, the panel gave the following additional reasons for approval:

The EPA played a key role in reviewing the application as the proposal involves hazardous materials with related risks including the potential spread of fire that it was important to mitigate through the building design and conditions. Environmental protection measures have also been proposed to minimise potential impacts on the natural environment such as pollution of waterways, air quality and noise.

The site is within the Kings Park Industrial Area, which Council considers appropriate for the use. No submissions were received.

CONDITIONS

The development application was approved subject to the conditions in the council assessment report.

CONSIDERATION OF COMMUNITY VIEWS

In coming to its decision, the panel notes that no written submissions were made during public exhibition and therefore no issues of concern were raised.
