1. INTRODUCTION

A proposal is to be lodged with the Tumut Council for a major expansion of Talbingo Village. The Village is currently comprised of about 280 dwellings. These dwellings are confined to about fifty percent of the "zoned" Village, in the eastern portion. The western half of the "zoned" Village (referred to as the Study Area) was previously owned by Snowy Hydro Limited and was a base for construction works associated with the Snowy Mountains Scheme. It included bunkhouse/dormitory style accommodation for workers, various workshops and fuel storage facilities. The various buildings in the western portion of the town were removed, apparently sometime in the 1970's but remnants such as the roads, drainage lines and building slabs are still evident.

Australian Archaeological Survey Consultants Pty Ltd was commissioned by the Siteplus Pty Limited, to provide a brief indicative assessment for both European and Indigenous heritage. At this stage no formal heritage assessment has been undertaken.

2. AIMS OF THE STUDY

The principal aims of this indicative assessment are as follows.

- To identify any cultural heritage sites or areas which may have been previously recorded in the Study Area.
- Review the available archaeological information for the Study Area.
- Carry out a brief field assessment of the proposed development.
- Develop a set of management procedures for heritage sites and areas of potential archaeological sensitivity identified within the Study Area

3. PROJECT METHODOLOGY

In order to fulfil the project aims, the following tasks were undertaken:

- A review of the relevant State and Federal legislation was made to help inform the proponent of their statutory obligations
- A review was made of the Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) AHIMS
 Heritage Site Register, to determine if any previously identified Aboriginal sites were
 located within, or in close proximity to the Study Area (Appendix 1).
- The following information was collated:
 - 1:25 000 maps of the Study Area;
 - historic and anthropological literature for the region.
- A review was made of the NSW Heritage Office data register to determine if any sites
 of European significance have been registered in the Study Area (Appendix 2)
- A brief field inspection of the area was carried out to determine the likelihood of sites
 occurring and the best method to deal with any heritage issues.

4. LEGISLATIVE REQUIREMENTS

4.1 State Legislation

European Heritage

European cultural heritage derives NSW State protection pursuant to the Heritage Act 1977. This legislation protects those areas or items considered to be of State or Local Heritage Significance and are placed on the 'State Heritage Register', which is administered by a Heritage Council

Should any person or company breach the terms of the Act, a penalty of up to \$1,100,000.00 and/or 6 months gaol, can be imposed.

Importantly, this Act also protects 'relics' that are not listed on the State Heritage Register or subject to an Interim Heritage Order (s.139). The damage, destruction, excavation or disturbance of a 'relic' without a permit is also a breach of this Act that attracts the same penalties set out above.

A Relic is any deposit, object or material evidence which relates to the settlement of the area that comprises New South Wales, not being Aboriginal settlement and which is 50 or more years old.

Each person has a duty to report the discovery of a relic to the Heritage Council within a reasonable period of time unless they have reason to believe that the Council is already aware of its existence (s.146).

In addition, if the Minister is of the opinion that an area or item may, on further enquiry or investigation, be found to be of State or Local Heritage Significance, he may make an Interim Heritage Order for a period of up to 12 months, (s.24). In addition or in the alternative, the Minister can direct that an area or item be listed on the State Heritage Register. For these areas or items, approval of the Heritage Council is required if any development, destruction or similar action is proposed (ss.58---69)

Even if an area or item is not the subject of an Interim Heritage Order nor listed on the State Heritage Register, the Minister or the Heritage Council can seek an Order that no work is to be carried out for a period of 40 days pending a decision regarding the making of an Interim Heritage Order.

Indigenous Heritage

The protection of indigenous cultural heritage in New South Wales is principally governed by the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* ("the NSW Act"), which is administered by the DEC (NPWS). When seeking approval for development, certain conditions will usually be imposed one of which is that an assessment be made of any potential impact on sites or places of indigenous cultural heritage.

For the purposes of dealing with indigenous land issues. NSW has been 'divided' into areas each of which are under the control of Local Aboriginal Land Councils ("LALC"). The DEC (NPWS) requires that 'sufficient consultation' be undertaken with each LALC in which the development is to take place. In addition, DEC (NPWS) requires that Traditional Owners of land who have lodged a Native Title claim may also be included in the consultation process.

Section 86 of the NSW Act requires that any disturbance of the land (to collect indigenous artefactual material) or collection of that material can only be undertaken under a permit issued by the DEC (NPWS). The permit will be issued subject to any terms and conditions that the Director General of DEC (NPWS) thinks fit (s 88). Again these terms and conditions will include sufficient consultation with LALCs and Native Title claimants. Failure to do so will result in a rejection of the permit application and the inability to undertake any collection of artefactual material (outside of the developmental area) or sub-surface testing.

Penalties payable under the NSW Act (s.90) for damage/destruction etc of indigenous cultural heritage (Aboriginal Objects or areas) are:

- \$5,500.00 for individuals + restitution costs and/or 6 months' gaol; and
- \$22,000.00 for Corporations + restitution costs

Litigious remedies are also available. Any person (whether they have a 'legal interest' in the area or not) can bring proceedings against a person damaging or destroying indigenous cultural heritage in the Land and Environment Court (NSW) to prevent or remedy that damage or destruction (s.176). In addition to individual penalties of up to \$11 000, an order can also be made that compensation is to be paid for the damage or destruction of the Aboriginal Object or area.

If the Director-General of the DEC (NPWS) believes that an action will or could have a significant effect on the 'environment of native plants' (which is also an indigenous issue) he can issue a Stop Work Order for 40 days, without any prior notice needed to be given (ss.91AA-EE). That Order can be extended for as many 40 day periods as the Director-General sees fit if the action that has been stopped is not able to be modified sufficiently to

protect the environment in question, the Director-General must recommend an Interim Protection Order be made (s.91EE) that will last for up to 2 years (s.91D). The Director-General can also direct that an Interim Protection Order be put in place if, in his opinion, an area of cultural significance is at risk of damage (s.91A).

Each person has a duty to report the discovery of an Aboriginal Object to the DEC (NPWS) within a reasonable period of time unless they have reason to believe that the DEC (NPWS) is already aware of its existence (s.91).

4.2 Commonwealth of Australia

As well as State Legislation there are also several pieces of Federal Legislation that provide protection for or are relevant to, Indigenous and European cultural heritage. These pieces of Legislation include:

- Native Title Act 1993
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984
- Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act (EPBC) 1999

Native Title Act 1993

This Act provides national recognition that Indigenous people had a system of law and land ownership prior to the arrival of Europeans. This Act has ramifications for land tenure and consultation under other Acts.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1987

The Act was passed to provide protection for Aboriginal heritage in circumstances where it could be demonstrated that such protection was not available at a State or Territory level. In certain instances the Act overrides relevant State and Territory provisions.

The major stated purpose of the Act is to preserve and protect areas and objects of significance to Aborigines and Islanders from injury and desecration. The Act enables immediate and direct action for protection of threatened areas and objects by a declaration from the Commonwealth minister or authorised officers. The Act must be invoked by or on behalf of, an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander or organisation.

Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act (EPBC) 1999

The Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (Comm.) has recently been amended, through the Environment and Heritage Legislation Amendment Act (No1) 2003 to provide protection for cultural heritage sites, in addition to the existing aim of protecting environmental areas and sites of national significance.

The 2003 amendments to the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* have resulted in the inclusion of indigenous and non-Indigenous heritage sites and areas. These heritage items are defined as:

'indigenous heritage value of a place means a heritage value of the place that is of significance to indigenous persons in accordance with their practices, observances, customs, traditions, beliefs or history;

Items identified under this legislation are given the same penalty as actions taken against environmentally sensitive sites. Specific to cultural heritage sites are §324A-324ZB.

In addition to the above amendments to the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* to include provisions for the protection and conservation of heritage, the Environment and Heritage Legislation Amendment Act (No1) 2003 (Comm.) also enables the identification and subsequent listing of items for the Commonwealth and National Heritage Lists. The Act establishes the National Heritage List that enables listing of sites nationally and internationally that are significant and governed by Australia.

The Australian Heritage Council Act 2003 defines the heritage advisory boards and relevant lists, with the Act's Consequential and Transitional Provisions repealing the Australian Heritage Commission Act 1975. The Australian Heritage Council Act, like the Australian Heritage Commission Act, does not provide legislative protection regarding the conservation of heritage items in Australia, but has compiled a list of items recognised as possessing heritage significance to the Australian community. The Register of the National Estate, managed by the Australian Heritage Council, applies no legal constraints on heritage items included on this list.

5. RESULTS

5.1 Indigenous Heritage

The Site Register from the NSW Department of Environment and Conservation indicates that no previously known Indigenous sites are located in the Study Area. There are however numerous sites recorded in the wider region (see Appendix 1). These sites include open campsites, burials, ceremonial grounds, isolated finds and scarred trees. The most common of these site types, and the most likely to occur in the Study Area, are open campsites and isolated finds. These sites represent the remains of day-to-day camping and living. Other sites, such as burials, occur less frequently, and their locations are more difficult to predict

Ethno-historic records and archaeological studies for the region provide a fairly clear indication that these sites are predominantly located on certain landscapes typically the most common site types (artefact scatters and isolated finds) are found near creeks, on locally raised, flat terrain. The terrain of the Study Area is mildly undulating and is nearby the flooded original River. It is likely based on known site patterning, that artefact scatters will be found in such areas. Although it is possible that other types of sites (mentioned above) may be located during a survey, the probability of doing so is low because very few of these site types have been recorded in the region, and in the case of sites such as scarred trees, suitable natural features are not present.

While it is recognised that most of the Study Area has been severely affected by previous development, remains of Aboriginal sites can nevertheless survive, and ALL sites regardless of their condition are protected under the various Acts.

The preliminary field inspection carried out for this assessment was limited by very poor conditions of ground surface visibility, particularly in those areas which were less disturbed. The only good visibility, where grasses did not obscure the ground, were in those areas where topsoil had been removed for buildings roads etc. Unfortunately, such highly disturbed areas are those very areas where sites are unlikely to be found, given that any sites that may have been present, would have been destroyed during soil removal. There remains a reasonable possibility, therefore, that undetected **surface** sites may be evident in those relatively undisturbed areas that were unable to be inspected due to thick grass cover.

There is also a possibility regardless of surface indications, that undetected sub-surface archaeological deposits (ie sites below the ground) may be evident in some areas. Given the level of ground disturbance across most of the eastern part of the Study Area, and the subsurface view afforded by the exposure of sediments along the old road easements this seems very unlikely in the highly disturbed areas. This is primarily because the sediments in such areas have been removed already. There may be, however, small sections within the highly disturbed eastern portion of the Study Area where localised islands of undisturbed sediments remain, that contain sub-surface sites. This was difficult to determine during the field inspection due to the thick grass cover in several areas. Based on the field inspection, the only significantly large area that appeared to have potential to contain undetected sub-surface archaeological deposits is the western most portion of the Study Area. Here some in tact sediments certainly seem to remain.

5.2 European Heritage

A search of the site register from the NSW Heritage Office indicates that there are no registered sites in the Study Area (see Appendix 2).

The remains of the Snowy Mountains Hydro buildings and infrastructure in the area appear to date from the 1960's when the original township was flooded Jourama Pondage. At this time (1966-7) the new Talbingo township was established as a construction centre. It is assumed that the remains in the Study Area date from this period. A preliminary inspection suggests the remains consist primarily of roads, building platforms, drainage systems and refuse.

While the remains may not technically qualify for protection under the Act, it is obvious that they form part of a significant and highly important part of the history of the area. Most historians would agree that the Snowy Hydro Scheme is one of the pivotal social and engineering projects undertaken in Australia. A plethora of information exists regarding the engineering and social history of the project.

The remains within the Study Area are most likely not of such significance that they should be afforded protection of conservation. Nevertheless they form part of the social history of the township and it would be disappointing to see them disregarded entirely.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS

6.1 Indigenous Heritage

There is a reasonably high potential for Aboriginal sites to occur in parts of the Study Area. These parts are areas that are moderately undisturbed. This includes any islands of relatively undisturbed sediments remaining in the eastern portion of the Study Area, and larger parts of the western portion. The sites in these areas may be visible on the surface (when conditions of ground surface visibility are good), or they may be located within the sediments below the ground surface.

It is therefore recommended that:

In the first instance, a surface survey for Aboriginal archaeological sites should be undertaken by a qualified archaeologist and representatives of the relevant Indigenous stakeholders for the area. If possible, this survey should be undertaken when the grass cover is minimal and the area can be effectively inspected. The survey must be undertaken according the NSW DEC Guidelines for archaeological investigations. As part of this survey the archaeologist should be able to make a determination regarding the potential for sub-surface sites to be present, as well as for the presence of surface sites. If it seems likely that sub-surface sites may be present, then some test pitting may be necessary in parts of the Study Area. Any test pitting must follow from the reporting of the surface survey and will require a Section 97 Permit from the NSW DEC.

The NSW DEC would require that the initial survey includes Indigenous stakeholders and that it be undertaken prior to any construction taking place. From the point of view of the proponent, it is also advisable to undertake this work as soon as possible to avoid potential delays, particularly if any sites are found and DEC Permits are required for their further investigation and/or destruction.

6.2 European Heritage

The remains present in the Study Area are part of an important phase in Australian history. It is therefore recommended that:

A basic pictorial and mapping project be undertaken to record the remains in the area.

As part of the recording, any local knowledge about the sites should be noted and form part of the report.

This work should be undertaken by a qualified archaeologist.

Again, it is advisable to undertake this work as soon as possible, thus avoiding any potential for delays in the construction phase of the project.

I am writing in response to your recent inquiry in respect to Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places registered with the NSW Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) at the above location.

A search of the DEC Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) has shown that 71 Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places are recorded in or near the above location. Please refer to the attached report for details.

The information derived from the AHIMS search is only to be used for the purpose for which it was requested. It is not to be made available to the public.

The following qualifications apply to an AHIMS search.

- AHIMS only includes information on Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places that have been provided to DEC;
- Large areas of New South Wales have not been the subject of systematic survey or recording
 of Aboriginal history. These areas may contain Aboriginal objects and other heritage values
 which are not recorded on AHIMS;
- Recordings are provided from a variety of sources and may be variable in their accuracy.
 When an AHIMS search identifies Aboriginal objects in or near the area it is recommended that the exact location of the Aboriginal object be determined by re-location on the ground; and
- The criteria used to search AHIMS are derived from the information provided by the client and DEC assumes that this information is accurate

All Aboriginal places and Aboriginal objects are protected under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act* 1974 (NPW Act) and it is an offence to destroy, damage or deface them without the prior consent of the DEC Director-General. An Aboriginal object is considered to be known if:

- It is registered on AHIMS;
- It is known to the Aboriginal community; or

• It is located during an investigation of the area conducted for a development application.
