This is an important locality for koalas. All intact koala habitat must be maintained and corridors to connect the various pieces of good quality bushland. Water courses must be protected from any silting during construction and they can be used as corridors of bushland as well.

It should be recognised that quality habitat supports the whole range of local native animals, birds, reptiles, insects as well as koalas, and all are essential as part of the balanced environment.

Efforts must be made to ensure that the roads are all well marked with wildlife warning signs. A number of animal crossings need to be installed and include overhead crossings as well as underpasses.

It must be considered that increasing the population of humans in this area means many interactions that are not healthy for wild animals can occur. People will need to be educated about caring for their natural areas, and be made aware of the need to drive slower and to keep their pets away from the bushland.

This development sets a dangerous precedent as it is not based on best scientific advice including the NSW Chief Scientist with regards to corridor numbers or widths . I was unable to find a map showing the width of the Ouzedale Corridor for example and the NSW Chief Scientist was concerned about its ability to be secured as a functional corridor because it relied on land purchases

There are several Threatened Species mentioned in Niche document that will be impacted and it is unlikely the decision maker, the Minister for Planning , can be satisfied these species will survive in the long term - these include the Koala, New Holland Mouse and Grey Headed Flying Fox

There is no mention of Climate Change impacts and the impact urban heat from the projected dwellings will have on residents in an area already suffering 50 degree summer days and threats of bushfire

The safe evacuation of the projected residents onto one or two roads such as Appin Rd is impossible

The entire site of the Appin Massacre should be protected yet it appears from the maps that only sections will be

The Cumberland Plain Conservation Plan has underestimated the proposed dwellings as the area is now a Priority Precinct , that document reads like a developers plan more than a serious conservation plan as it is unfeasible conservationists would remove any Critically Endangered vegetation

This whole planning proposal needs to go back to the drawing board, its urban sprawl with grave consequences and not in anyones interests, let alone unsuspecting future residents who will find themselves in a fire prone area with pump in water and pump out sewage

●Gilead Stage 2 (Developer: Lendlease): 876-hectare site for up to 3,300 homes.

This proposal should be rejected because it fails to apply the planning principle for the Greater Macarthur Growth Area namely , the conservation of biodiversity for the koala population.

The planning proposal fails to show dimensions for the Koala corridors listed, scientific advice recommends corridors be at least a minimum of 390-450 metres wide.  
Without being able to see these dimensions the credibility and transparency of this process is undermined.

Zoning of Koala corridors (and buffers) as C2 rather than C1 allows for other uses that are not compatible with Koala conservation.

This concern was also brought up by the Technical Assurance Panel (TAP) for example, the proposed Riverside Reserve "is located within the Nepean Koala Corridor, it cannot support uses such as access roads, built structures, barbeques, lighting, dog walking, playgrounds, etc. The types of uses permissible in all koala corridors is consistent throughout the Greater Macarthur Growth Area."

Koala corridors should be zoned C1 and the ownership and management of these corridors should not remain in the hands of the developers.

The Urbis document prepared for Lendlease shows "Indicative Stormwater Basin Location Stormwater in wildlife corridors" (Urban Design Report 2022:27). This is contrary to the advice of the Chief Scientist and the TAP. In the same document Urbis have located a "proposed Figtree Hill Reservoir" in the biobank area adjacent to Brown's Bush which has also been identified as a future Koala Reserve.

Even more worrying, Lendlease has an "Indicative Sewer Pumping Station" located at the north-west corner of the Site.

The proposed infrastructure will sever both Koala Corridors A and B ( identified by the Chief Scientist), demonstrating Lendlease's insincerity to protect Koala Corridors.

The Koala is listed as a Threatened Species in Ecological documents not reflecting the Endangered Listing both in NSW and Federally, this oversight undermines credibility of the planning proposal.

#### THE PEOPLE

There are people who will be directly affected by this proposal, mainly the residents who live on Macquariedale Road and surrounds. The proposed road seems to take a path right over our newly-built home and the homes of our neighbours. We have homes we love, businesses that are based out of these homes, animals who need the space our homes provide. We are hard-working, ordinary people. We are volunteers and part of the Appin community. We cannot replace what we already have within this area, so would be unable to relocate locally, the place we call home.

Please do not take our beautiful homes.

#### WILDLIFE/KOALAS

Everyone is only too aware of the plight of the koala population, particularly since the devastation of the 2019-20 bushfires. We are also very aware of the fact, that the area that is set for urbanisation, is home to one of the healthiest koala populations left (many recent sightings on Macquariedale Road and in Appin). The thin strip of koala corridor that is edged on one long side by the proposed East-West Connection Road is not enough.

The proposed East-West Connection Road (4-lanes) runs almost the entire edge of one long side of the koala corridor, how can this possibly be a good idea?

If the East-West Connection Road does not go through Macquariedale Road, this would not only remove the obvious dangers from the presence of a road, but it would also give the koalas a bigger and safer area to thrive in, buffered only by rural properties.

The current plans only endanger the koala population further, no-one could agree that they are being protected.

#### THE ROAD

This alignment (through Macquariedale Road) of the proposed East-West Connection Road has already been deemed as a Fail in the OSO2 Sector 1 Corridor Options Report published in Nov 2022. This Report would therefore seem to support that to replace the OSO2 with another road would also not be a viable option. It has already been stated by the Dept of Transport that

diverting any more traffic to the already congested Mount Ousley, which is constrained by the Illawarra Escarpment, is a bad idea.

## INFRASTRUCTURE

Without the supporting infrastructure in place, no new homes should be introduced to Appin. The proposed plan states that any infrastructure would be delivered "in line with development, when required". When will this be? Only after so many homes are built? This should happen before any homes are built. This is only a part of the infrastructure that was declared unaffordable by the Government less than 10 years ago, on a site with significant environmental constraints and I believe nothing has changed since.

## HOUSING

We understand there is a need for homes and welcome the growth in our area, but why remove people from their own homes by putting a road in that would clearly cause more issues. Our home was only built in 2015 and is a great example of a modern eco-designed home on a 2600m<sup>2</sup> block. A beautiful family home at risk of being lost to me, my family and future families to come.

I implore the government to leave a little something of true rural living in Appin. Allow the small pockets of private land to remain in private hands, before all is lost. Allow the koalas more room to roam. We are only a very small part of a large area that is already owned by developers. Let the developers land be used for urbanisation, but consider the volume of homes that are planned to be built on that land. The CPCP Assessment Report acknowledges that only approximately 13 percent of the pre-1970 extent of native vegetation in the Cumberland Plain subregion remains intact, with an additional 12 percent occurring as heavily degraded communities (e.g. scattered trees) in disturbed areas.

The CPCP will impact 1,753.6 hectares of threatened ecological communities including Cumberland Plain Woodland, Shale Sandstone Transition Forest and River-Flat Eucalypt Forest.

Alarming, the CPCP also notes that "biodiversity loss significantly increases once habitat fragmentation by clearing exceeds 70 per cent of the landscape." This threshold has already been passed and will accelerate if the CPCP is implemented in its current form.

The importance of the Aboriginal heritage has been identified by the listing of the Massacre Site on the NSW State Heritage Register but will the NSW State Government protect the site from development?

1. In regards to the letter sent to existing Appin residents. The scale of the provided zoning map is not clearly defined and difficult for residents and the general public to gauge and understand the proposed development. It also fails to display the existing township.
2. Why is there no modelling of the proposal in the township of Appin for residents to view?
3. A restricted timeline to view large amounts of documentation for this proposal for a resident of the Appin township is not feasible for the time given.
4. As per the 2021 census data. The township of Appin has an approximate population of 3230 residents with 1050 dwellings. As it stands there is insufficient infrastructure & resources for this amount of residents.
5. The proposal is suggesting an addition of 12,900 dwellings. This would equate to an approximate population increase of 26000. 8 times the current population. This is a MAJOR concern for the following reasons.
  - Appin is surrounded by waterboard / wildlife nature reserve / coalmine / major river sources such as Nepean river, Cataract river.
  - Appin road is a known notorious blackspot road. As this road is a one-way in and out road raises a great concern in the event of an emergency. An example of this would easily be seen in the recent bushfires of NSW over the last few years. To make matters worse Broughton pass has been damaged by the recent floods ,still being repaired and is insufficient for high traffic flow or truck access.
6. On your letter reference map marked Appin the immediate area proposed for development west of Appin soccer oval there is a substantial Bellbird colony among many other animal habitats, i.e. Koala's. What studies & proposals have been done that will ensure it will not affect or cause loss of the native flora & fauna?
7. In recent years with smaller ongoing development in the township has resulted in severe damage to major and minor roads due to transportation of building development materials: What plans will be put in place to ensure this does not occur to the current road infrastructure?

8. Development in Appin already is causing ongoing disruption in electricity and internet supply issues?

9. In reference to the location of proposed development. Currently there is a major road concern at the Stop and Giveaway sign intersection of Appin Rd and Church St. Feel free to observe this during peak time. E.g Weekend afternoons. I strongly object to the fast tracking and rezoning of Appin Village and surrounding areas for more than 12,000 homes. This development will destroy part of the critically endangered Cumberland Plain Woodland and negatively impact Koalas and other threatened species, as well as seriously interfering with the water running into the Nepean and Georges Rivers and drinking water catchments.

It is disappointing that the majority of advice given to Department of Planning and Environment by the NSW Chief Scientist regarding Koalas, corridors and margins has not been adequately incorporated in the Cumberland Plain Conservation Plan.

Alarmingly, the CPCP notes that "biodiversity loss significantly increases once habitat fragmentation by clearing exceeds 70 per cent of the landscape." This threshold has already been passed and will accelerate if the CPCP is implemented in its current form.

The CPCP will impact 1,753.6 hectares of threatened ecological communities, even though the CPCP Assessment Report acknowledges that only approximately 13 percent of the pre-1970 extent of native vegetation in the Cumberland Plain subregion remains intact. It is tragic that habitat is disturbed and degraded and can therefore brook no further impingement.

The importance of the Aboriginal heritage has been identified by the listing of the Massacre Site on the NSW State Heritage Register and the NSW State Government has a grave responsibility to protect the site from development.

Appin and North Appin must not be further developed with a large number of dwellings. This will destroy the charming character of the area for humans and annihilate the habitat and corridors of Endangered and Threatened Species including the Koala.

**1: Re-Zoning**

The Planning Proposals do not seem to make specific mention of future rezoning for my property in the first rezoning. However, we are included in the 3a section. An adjoining road and conservation zone leads me to suspect that there will be a continuance of that zoning into my property. Previous Government correspondence has stated that existing land use rights will be continued. I trust that this will be the case in the future.

I have not been properly consulted with regard to any future development considerations for my property.

**2: Council Rates**

Whilst continuing to reside at my property and maintaining existing use rights, I do not wish to become the subject of an unfair and exorbitant increase in council rates. I am concerned that any zoning changes may lead to an attempt to unfairly increase council rates to a level of unaffordability.

**3: Property Acquisition**

I have not been properly consulted with regard to any future proposals for compulsory property acquisition.

I have been residing on my property for over 20 years and over that time have built a home and a fit-for-purpose property. A requirement to relocate will cause a great deal of stress, upheaval and inconvenience to my family and I. I can see from the posted Planning Proposals that there will be a requirement for nature and recreation land. Will my property be a part of this? Who will be responsible for implementing this? Will I be consulted at any stage to allow me to plan for my future?

**4: Future Property Value and Marketability**

I do not want to be financially disadvantaged in any way with regard to the future market value and marketability of my property. If forced to relocate, I will require sufficient time and compensation to identify and purchase another fit-for-purpose property in a suitable location. I do not wish to move to another property, however the Planning Proposal shows future residential

development at my fence-line. Such development will affect the tranquillity of the area and the quality of life and enjoyment of the land for my family and I. At present I do not know if my family and I will be able to continue to reside on our property with such anticipated activity occurring on our boundary.

I also do not wish to be placed in a position where I am unable to sell my residence should I desire to relocate in the future, due to ongoing large-scale land development next door.

#### 5: Local Infrastructure

I believe that the addition of many thousands of urban residences to this area will require a greater and more immediate infrastructure plan. The nature of the rural township will be drastically altered over a very short period of time and existing residents, as well as those new to the area will suffer from a lack of law enforcement and medical facilities, as well as insufficient places in the existing educational facilities and retail businesses.

#### Summary

I am concerned by the lack of proper consultation with the affected existing residents in the area of Appin. I do not consider the posting of voluminous documents containing government terminology to be a sufficient attempt at individual consultation.

I am also concerned about the push to develop the area over such a short period of time with the knowledge that the current infrastructure cannot support such a planning proposal. I am left wondering about the actual level of consideration given to the concerns of existing residents.

As there is no immediate mention of the exact proposed changes for my property, I believe there is sufficient time to address the issues I have raised.

I have been a hard-working taxpayer all of my adult life and do not want to find myself financially disadvantaged at my current stage of life, due to the business-dealings between land developers and governments.

There are many reasons why I am so strongly opposing this proposal. Some of these include:

-Environmental factors. The continued clearing of land for development is creating a concrete jungle which is making the space much hotter and the less habitat available for local animals is detrimental to the natural environment. The destruction of the last disease free koala colony in Sydney is an absolute disgrace and embarrassment. The rest of the world is seeing this and we should be ashamed. There is a water supply that runs through Appin that needs to be kept free from pollution. The bush areas of Appin are home to many species of flora and fauna.

-The roads. Wollondilly has some of the worst kept roads. We currently have no footpaths in many areas of Appin, meaning I walk with small children and the elderly and disabled also walk on roads that are falling apart and full of holes. Appin Road is in desperate need of work. A bypass of Appin would be ideal and duplication of the road is needed. The number of accidents, including serious accidents and fatalities, on Appin Road means that it is a anxious drive for locals and those using the road. During the summer months we can't turn right on Appin Road due to the long lines of traffic. If there is an accident or road closure on Picton Road or Broughton Pass, Appin Road traffic is even worse. I have seen how dangerous it is for an Ambulance to try and access Appin when traffic is bad. The increase in traffic is getting to be too much for the road. The number of heavy vehicles using the road is also making this route a more dangerous and traffic affected road. We have been promised by government over and over again for funding to spend on Appin Road, but what has been done? NOTHING

-Bushfire risk, Appin is surrounded by bushland. Should one access point be in the middle of a bushfire, the increase in people using the road to evacuate will become a serious problem. We see how busy the road can be in busy times and I would hate to be trying to drive out of town to save my family's life with increased traffic.

-Amenities and infrastructure. Some homes in Appin aren't connected to sewage, town water and have insufficient internet connection to their homes. Mobile phone coverage can be poor in parts of town. Many parts of Appin have no footpaths and insufficient street guttering. We need to have things in place BEFORE new housing is built. Walkers had made promises to Appin when they developed Appin Valley yet nothing has been developed to benefit the older parts of Appin.

-Semi-Rural lifestyle. Wollondilly council is a semi rural area of Sydney. If we continue to develop this shire, especially with stupidly small lot sizes, this area will become another ghetto suburb of Sydney (Which is why many of us have chosen to live here and escape the ratrace of Sydney). The increase in population, the more cars, the increase in light / noise / air pollution is destroying this once pristine part of Sydney and NSW. We are losing the farms that supply the food we all



need. This increases the costs and carbon footprint as we then need to ship produce from further afield.

-Schools. Appin Public School is a fantastic small school. It is historical and hasn't a lot of space to build upon. This is going to be a difficult thing to maintain should the population increase.

Where will all the additional students be housed at the current site? And then where will they all go to high school? There are only really options in Campbelltown as there is only 1 public high school in Wollondilly. This means even more traffic on Appin Road as students need to travel that way to and from school. More schools need to be built in the Macarthur and Wollondilly areas. Schools currently in the area need upgrades. Support for learning needs to be increased.

-Public Transport. Currently Appin is only serviced by a pretty poorly timetabled bus service from Wollongong to Campbelltown. It is difficult to get a taxi service to come out to Appin if needed. If residents have no access to a private vehicle, the public transport service can be a very long and inconvenient service to use. Many households will then be forced to have multiple vehicles meaning more cars on Appin Road and more pollution. School students are utilising the bus services and on many occasions have been stuck or detoured when accidents have closed Appin Road.

-Healthcare services. The continued growth in the Macarthur region is putting a strain on existing healthcare services. People are waiting months to see specialists, hours to be seen at the Emergency department of the hospital and services need to be increased dramatically before the population continues to grow in this area. The strain being felt on the staff and providers is at breaking point. The aged and disabled citizens need more support and services.

-Koala population. The Appin area is home to some of the last disease free koalas in Sydney. Each year they are seen more often on our roads, in peoples backyards and in parts of the area that aren't safe for them. Their habitat is being cleared for housing. The roads are busier. More and more koalas are dying as a result. The koala is on the endangered species list. We need to be doing as much as we can to protect them, not destroying more of their habitat and making their survival less likely. If this type of development continues to go ahead, this government will go down in history for all the wrong reasons, it'll be the government that wipes out the Sydney Koala population. The schoolchildren of Appin learn all about the Koala, it's even their school mascot. They are being taught at a young age about saving the koala and how important it is to preserve their habitat.

-Historical significance. Appin is a historical town. Over development in the area has really tarnished the look and feel of this historical town. I strongly object to this proposed rezoning. I also strongly object to the community not being provided enough time to review the proposal - and request an extension for the entire community, including myself, until 28 February 2023. It is unfair to expect we can reasonably get through the mountains of documentation in the time allocated, especially on top of the busy Christmas period, and especially considering how much time the developer has had to produce this information. This happens too often - exhibitions over the Nov-Dec period - it is not acceptable - if the exhibition period is to commence after 1st Nov, when everyone becomes very busy with Christmas work and family preparations, you should allow submissions until end Feb as a standard fairness clause.

My submission follows (to provide preliminary feedback, but I would like an extension to further evaluate the proposal documentation as I have not had time to read it all).

There is insufficient raw water supply (upper Nepean Scheme, operated by Water NSW) to provide water that can be treated for potable water consumption for the existing committed housing supply, so further rezoning must not occur without government commitment to augmentation of this supply including details of siting, funding and timeline. The dams got to 30% in the last drought - with the existing population. There are to be 50,000+ people at Wilton, and more in the urban infill in the Macarthur supply zone. The water filtration plants are currently struggling to produce adequate volumes due to the poor river and dam water quality after significant flooding in 2022 (Sydney Water advertisements on TV). This is a critical risk for this area and rezoning should be halted until it is resolved. There is no shortage of rezoned land as the Wilton development has plenty as yet undeveloped stages. It is very important that future rezonings do not compromise what has already been committed. We have significant climate risks going forward that will further compromise water supply (flood, fire and drought all impact heavily on the ability to supply water, as does peak demand on heat wave days etc) - this has not been fully evaluated. We cannot be confident that the proposed new Appin community will have adequate access to water supply at this current point in time. Water NSW already submitted on previous rezonings "subject to augmentation" but no detailed analysis or plans were forthcoming. This situation is getting very very serious, and entirely overlooked by all levels of government. This is unfair to future generations, and may potentially be the cause of social fabric breakdown and conflict in the future if adequate planning does not occur now. You cannot put more people in a region than your water supply can support. You must not progress this rezoning for this reason alone. The community must be brought along with this process - proper consultation on future water supply options must also be exhibited prior to this rezoning.

The constraints on housing supply are not the provision of rezoned land. There has been scientific analysis of this and developers themselves have plenty of rezoned land already - they constrain the supply in bringing blocks to market to preserve profit margins.

Therefore this proposed rezoning will not fix housing supply, and should not progress with that as a valid reason. (Eg Bingara Gorge, rezoned in 2005, 17 years ago, is still not fully developed, so supply of rezoned land is not what is limiting housing availability, it has always been there, available - it is the developers not releasing lots from already rezoned areas).

I strongly object to any further rezoning until the government has put in place legislation to capture the value uplift for the taxpayer. At the moment this value is propping up corporate balance sheets and shareholder profits. They have no intention of solving the housing crisis.

I strongly object to any further rezoning until the state of the koala populations across Australia is fully understood. The Appin area is critical core habitat - the Cumberland Plain Plan fails to adequately protect this core habitat. There is no need to put urban development here at this point in time until the preservation of this iconic species is assured. The status of the population is currently unknown. The development further destroys and fragments habitat that is threatened. This is unacceptable on environmental grounds.

I object to this proposal as there has been no consultation on the changed OSO2 route which now goes through Wilton. In fact, if you read some of the Walker proposal - they favour the Hume Highway/Picton Rd alignment of the OSO2 (seems practical to me, road already there), but recent OSO2 documentation shows a change to loop into the top of the Appin development and down Douglas Park Dr and Macarthur Dr (I smell other developer influence here - they don't want a motorway upgrade through their new land sales area) - none of this is reflected in the structure plan, so the exhibition documents are inadequate to communicate what is going on to the community. This proposal is premature and the OSO2 should not be rushed through to effect this rezoning - adequate community consultation should be conducted. There has not been adequate consideration of existing routes and existing infrastructure and upgrades - the route could follow the Hume Highway and Picton Road, if the proposed Picton Road upgrades consider the increased traffic requirements - this is bad planning to not consider the OSO traffic impact on the Picton/Hume intersection, despite the fact that the OSO1 will likely be completed prior to OSO2 - and the traffic will therefore be funnelled along this route anyway for decades! I was only made aware of this OSO2 document, which conflicts with some of the documentation I've skimmed in the Appin proposal, via another community member on facebook last week. The 4 NEW OSO2 options have not had ANY community input, despite "unacceptable to community" ratings being placed on some of those 4 options - how can this be determined without consultation? - that is fraudulent. This is unfair and does not follow due process. The rezoning must not occur as it relies upon this unconsulted OSO2 state road infrastructure likely required for bushfire/disaster evacuation needs of the proposed Appin community - but isn't even supported in the developers own reports?

The report states that it is not OK to have a motorway through the proposed Appin community (despite an approved consulted transport route being already picked - the blue option) flies in the face of the fact that the developers proposed just that with bringing the land at Wilton to the government to rezone - now they don't see its OK to have a motorway through Appin? But it was OK when they owned land at Wilton with Picton road and Hume Highway bisecting it? I call foul of developer logic here, they just don't want it where it is inconvenient for them (taking up urban block yield), it has bugged all community consideration in it. People in government really need to wake up and take the community and environmental needs and place them at the VERY TOP of the list of requirements, and actually having the courtesy to ask locals and take on board their concerns and very valuable local knowledge. Forcing a new motorway through private properties, so that the cost is transferred to the long suffering locals (though permanent loss of land value and unsaleable properties for many decades because of "swooshes"), is unacceptable. It destroys further habitat that is currently adequately managed on rural properties, and it doesn't



meet any environmental or community fairness test. To cap it off, transport needs of the future are likely to be public transport orientated if we are ever to have an impact on limiting climate change. This proposal does not adequately consider provision of such in any usable efficient form. The employment needs of the community are not adequately met by the proposal - further consigning it to be a commuter suburb with flow on poor social and environmental outcomes.

This proposal is inadequate, not future proof, not properly considered, and frankly, rezoning must not be rushed at this critical point in time. Rezoning will not solve our housing crisis. Time spent planning is time well spent - and planning out of sequence development, which is exactly what this is, is not conducive to good outcomes for community, environment, supply agencies (council, water authorities) or the potential future residents. DO NOT APPROVE.

This is a submission on the Appin (part) Precinct Planning Proposal on exhibition. These wide-ranging proposals will have a huge impact on the local Appin community & major implications for all residents of the Appin area. Local residents received letters in the mail which did not arrive for up to a week after the start of the exhibition period. Did all residents of Appin and nearby areas receive a letter advising them of this proposal which will impact their entire community?

The process of proposal assessment only by DPIE has resulted in a loss of council input, and so a loss of representation for the local residents and landowners whom they represent. The NSW Government, and its departments, are the overall proposers of the Greater Macarthur Plan, part of the development team (particularly through the new TAP process), and then they are the sole assessor, and final decision maker.

New information on both the Outer Sydney Orbital and Greater Macarthur Growth Area plan was recently released, without notification, at the same time as this planning proposal. These documents should have been out for consultation, in their own right, BEFORE this developer plan was released.

There are life changing impacts for many, including those surrounded by, enveloped within, or neighbouring the proposal. Some landowners appear to be included within the proposal area without their prior knowledge or input. Roads and other infrastructure set by this proposal will impact others, and will determine if their property can remain rural, can subdivide, or will be compulsorily acquired for a transport corridor or other infrastructure.

The rough "swooshes" and lines on the last available plan for the Greater Macarthur Growth Area were unclear, with no indication of exactly which properties would be affected by transport corridors. However, it seems these have noticeably changed, and the corridors are different to what was indicated. They are also different to the only previous road corridor exhibition - the OSO2 in 2020-2021. Even in this current plan there is no clear cadastre for properties outside the proposal, but they will be irrevocably affected by the continuation of major roads from inside the proposal.

**Outer Sydney Orbital (OSO)**

Despite a recent Upper House Inquiry regarding Acquisition by Transport for NSW, the corridor process remains seriously flawed, and I am deeply concerned about the process of corridor planning.

The OSO2 “blue” option was confirmed in August 2021 but now has changed to a public transport corridor with no consultation. This appears to travel through Lachlan Vale & we request this be pushed North through developer owned land, not privately owned land.

The prior “yellow” path that Appin residents did not want, is now the East-West connection road for the new development. Private landholders who thought they had been successful in saving their properties are now back in the path of a major road, even if not called the OSO. There are other parts of this road which have not been previously exhibited in any form. Paths have changed enough to impact different properties – without notice. The transit corridor now seems to stop in the middle of the proposed development, whereas some plans show that it continues until reaching the Hume Highway and rail line near Douglas Park.

Changing the road from a motorway to a public transport / rapid transit corridor would not appear to improve the impact on locals, indigenous heritage, koalas, or the properties which are in the path. It is still a major roadway. This whole corridor process is flawed, as is this proposal.

In some documents the OSO seems to be marked as a minor road and as a right turn off the main entrance road from the Hume Highway towards the housing development.

It is troubling that the developer for this proposal seems to have preferred the Picton Road path for the OSO, and now it has been changed to this outcome. Apparently, they also had prior knowledge of the road structure for some months before it was public, where other landholders were denied that opportunity. This is unfair, and a key issue that was identified in the Upper House Inquiry.

It will be too late to change these roads if the current housing development is approved.

This is a big project which must have more consideration for the existing population and history of Appin. This area is an important place for Aboriginal, agricultural, and colonial history, and home for generations of locals. This region needs care and respect and careful consideration. Thousands of houses and infrastructure cannot be built in a rush.

The overall site needs to be planned first, with public consultation, including major roads and infrastructure. Significant changes should have been released BEFORE this Appin Precinct Planning proposal, and they should have been open to public consultation. Approving tightly packed housing without supporting infrastructure is disastrous, as anyone in Western Sydney’s growth areas can attest. Removing so-called “Red tape” is not the solution to easing housing supply, and it does no one any favours to remove proper process, and the input of the local council.

People being pushed out of the homes, and forced to sell their properties, or have them acquired, have the right to full and proper consultation. The current Appin proposal should be withdrawn until consultation on the major recent structural changes can occur. At the very least there should be a long extension to allow residents time to assess all of the new information, and to make comment on the changes that will so impact their lives.

I object to the fast tracking and rezoning of Appin Village and surrounding areas for more than 12,000 homes for the following reasons. Appin (part) Precinct:

1. will destroy part of the critically endangered Cumberland Plain Woodland and negatively impact Koalas as well as other threatened species. The Koalas in Campbelltown are the largest recovering koala population in NSW and we want to secure continued growth for the Koalas of Southwest Sydney.
2. is underpinned by the CPCP which has not adequately incorporated the advice of the NSW Chief Scientist. The CPCP has only designated one east-west koala habitat corridor between the Georges and Nepean Rivers. This is in direct contradiction to The Chief Scientist's Second Koala Report, which states "the overall east-west connectivity should not rely on one corridor. Multiple corridors must be protected."  
No 425m corridors have been included. This proposal should be rejected as there is no guarantee that The Koala corridors mapped as part of the CPCP will be adequately protected. In fact, The Niche Biodiversity Assessment documents the fact that approximately 9.56 ha of non-certified land associated with the proposed SP2 Infrastructure zone occurs within a mapped Koala corridor. (p.38).
3. does not consider the uplisting of the koala to endangered status in NSW. This planning proposal should be resubmitted in the light of this up listing and the plans amended to include much stronger koala protections and improve connectivity.
4. puts other Threatened species at risk. As well as koalas, the future of the following threatened species are at risk with the size and scale of this and future planning proposals for Appin: Plain Land Snail, Grey-headed Flying Fox, Dusky Woodswallow, Powerful Owl, Large Bent-winged bat, Koala, Southern Myotis and Varied Sittella. (Threatened fauna records obtained from BioNet).
5. will endanger the water running into the Nepean and Georges Rivers and drinking water catchments through potential pollution into the Ousedale Creek from stormwater runoff and

other human impacts. Ousedale Creek as mentioned previously is the preferred Koala habitat corridor by the Chief Scientist. Pollution will seriously jeopardize the future of the Koalas.

6. threatens Aboriginal Heritage. In their petition No development at Appin Massacre Area, The Dharawal and Gundungurra family groups state "This area should never be built on. It's a place of trauma, great sorrow and death. Development on this land will yet again trigger that trauma for our communities."

7. is not in the public interest. The people of NSW do not want to see Koalas become extinct in the wild and, therefore, their protection is in the public interest. A petition to stop the rezoning of Stage 2 of the Gilead development and review the approval of Stage 1 collected 20,977 signatures clearly demonstrating the public concern over the threats to this important Koala population.

In summary, Appin (part) precinct should be rejected outright. We call upon the government to halt this process and insist that a full EIS be applied giving assurance that no impact will come to the flora and fauna that have been identified on the Appin and North Appin Precincts' land.

- Appin Precinct (Developer: Walker Corporation): 1,284-hectare site for over 12,000 homes.

I strongly object to the fast tracking and rezoning of Appin Village and surrounding areas for more than 12,000 homes. The protected rural landscapes have enabled koalas to disperse for breeding purposes and remain unusually free of the fertility impacting disease chlamydia. The strategic land release document designed to facilitate the construction of new homes on around 11,000 hectares will undo most of the sensible planning controls put in place in the 1970s, and set the area's koalas on a path to localised extinction. This is evidenced by dwindling koala numbers across the east coast as habitat loss, fragmentation and car strikes have resulted in the species becoming endangered.

The development will destroy part of the critically endangered Cumberland Plain Woodland and negatively impact koalas and other threatened species, as well as endangering the water running into the Nepean and Georges Rivers and drinking water catchments.

Despite the recent uplifting of the koalas' threatened species status from vulnerable to endangered, the revised CPCP fails to incorporate most of the recommendations made in the Chief Scientist and Engineer's Advice in the April 2020, (CS&E Report), designed to avoid the "rapid declines in koala numbers" that, according to the Report, have been experienced in NSW and Queensland when areas have undergone conversions from agriculture to urban environments.

The planning principle for the Greater Macarthur Growth Area is the conservation of biodiversity for the koala population yet this planning proposal fails to adequately conserve biodiversity and the Planning Minister cannot be confident that the Endangered Species like Koala will survive long term.

This planning proposal is underpinned by the Cumberland Plain Conservation Plan (CPCP) currently being assessed by the federal Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water.

A core commitment of the CPCP is to secure in perpetuity through conservation land a minimum of 5,325 hectares of native vegetation. The Plan says that the target has been calculated to offset biodiversity impacts from development as required under legislation but that the resulting area of conservation land, either protected or established through the CPCP, will be much

greater than this, “as we expect that more than double that amount of land may be required to meet the offset target for native vegetation.”

Nevertheless, in response to landholders’ concerns, protections for the 4,510 hectares of ‘avoided land’ in the revised CPCP have been weakened. Avoided land has been identified in the nominated areas for urban development because it’s considered to have high biodiversity values. It includes 3,610 hectares of threatened ecological communities and some riparian corridors.

The CPCP states this land will be avoided from development through up-front strategic conservation planning, but it has dropped the original proposal to rezone the ‘avoided land’ as E2 Environmental Conservation. Instead, new planning controls are only designed to avoid and minimise impacts on the lands’ biodiversity values from “intensive development”.

The NSW Chief Scientist identified one Koala Corridor across Wilton Road south of Appin Village and Ousedale Creek within the Village. The Chief Scientist was also concerned about whether the CPCP’s preferred east-west koala habitat corridor - Ousedale Creek - could be properly set aside as a workable koala habitat corridor, noting that its function is dependent on land purchases and restoration that will take an indefinite time to deliver. Whether the koalas can survive the anticipated timeframes for the implementation of the conservation measures is extremely doubtful.

Despite the Nepean and Georges River both being Primary Movement Corridors, there are no 425 metre minimum wide corridors at all included in this planning proposal. The majority of the advice given to DPE by the NSW Chief Scientist has not been adequately incorporated in the CPCP. How is a landscape species expected to survive the impacts of loss of movement corridors, habitat displacement and the increased threats from urbanisation? The impacts of stress and the resulting disease have been also been linked in research undertaken.

The CPCP Assessment Report acknowledges that just approximately 13 percent of the pre-1970 extent of native vegetation in the Cumberland Plain sub-region remains intact, with an additional 12 percent occurring as heavily degraded communities (e.g. scattered trees) in disturbed areas. The CPCP will impact 1,753.6 hectares of threatened ecological communities including the Cumberland Plain Woodland, Shale Sandstone Transition Forest and River-Flat Eucalypt Forest.

Alarming, the CPCP also notes that “biodiversity loss significantly increases once habitat fragmentation by clearing exceeds 70 per cent of the landscape.” This threshold has already been passed and will accelerate if the CPCP is implemented in its current form. Considering the unsustainable decline in our environment noted in the 2021 State Of Environment Report why would we allow this continued path of decline for the benefit of property developers?

I also note the impacts on the critically endangered Regent Honeyeater from this development proposal and yet we are captive breeding and spending millions to save this bird from extinction. Yet here we are again with development proposals impacting its very survival.

Also of noted importance is the Aboriginal heritage that has been identified by the listing of the Massacre Site on the NSW State Heritage Register, but will the NSW State Government protect the site from development?

In their petition, No development at Appin Massacre Area, the Dharawal and Gundungurra family groups are calling on the NSW Government to protect the Appin massacre site from future development. “This area should never be built on. It’s a place of trauma, great sorrow and death. Development on this land will yet again trigger that trauma for our communities.”

Appin and North Appin are now being considered as Priority Precincts, according to Minister Roberts, which effectively means the CPCP has grossly underestimated the amount of dwellings and the accompanying impacts on the Endangered and Threatened Species including the Koala.

This proposal should be rejected because it fails to apply the planning principle for the Greater Macarthur Growth Area namely, the conservation of biodiversity for the local koala population. The Niche Appin Precinct Assessment, prepared for Walker Corporation and dated 19 October 2022 has listed the koala as vulnerable when the species is listed endangered by federal and state governments.

So are we appeasing developers?

Wollondilly, which includes Appin, was included as part of metropolitan Sydney when Covid restrictions were put in place. If such restrictions ever take force again, will the residents of the new development be happy?

The development will be visible from my back boundary. The area is a koala habitat and water catchment area. RE: Submission and Objection to Walker's Planning Proposal to rezone Appin (part) precinct from rural to residential (urban development zone) to develop a 1,284 - hectare site on the Koala habitat corridors of South West Sydney.

The Importance of Koala Corridors: As of this year Koalas became endangered in NSW, the only growing, large, chlamydia free Koala colony (McAlpine 2015) left in the state is on Sydney's south western edge (CPCP Sub Plan B - Koalas p12) where this planning proposal is located. Putting aside the ecological significance of this colony to the state, it is also economically significant to Appin, if it replicated the tourism potential of similar endangered animal sanctuaries seen across the world, it would provide a long-term tourism industry that would dwarf the one-off development of these lands and keep those gains local. Koala protection therefore must be the priority if you are building within the Koala habitat corridors of Macarthur. Only a strict adherence to the Chief Scientist's 3 reports can ensure their survival, if these can't be met, this rezoning must be abandoned. People can live anywhere in the Sydney basin, Koalas cannot.

The Process of Approval: The Minister's decision to simultaneously fast track the approval process for both Lendlease's Gilead Stage 2 (826 Ha), and Walker's Appin (part) Precinct (1,284 Ha) the largest incursion into Macarthur by determining them as state significant development undermines their Koala protection. It speeds up a process that is critical for Koalas and removes Council oversight leaving approval solely at the Ministers discretion. DPE's previously fast tracked Walker's Macquariedale (60 Ha) project, after the Council objected to the development due to the destruction of over 20 Ha of Koala habitat (the bushland shown in red in the adjacent image), the fast tracking process here pushed it through and allowed Walker to dodge the need to provide any land offsets for the Koala habitat they will remove.

The Criteria : Within the Chief Scientists recommendations we can identify three criteria necessary for Koalas to survive in any developed landscape: large corridor widths, multiple corridors and well protected corridors. This proposal fails all three criteria.

1. Koala Corridors numbers: There are 3 Koala corridors that pass through Walkers Appin precinct, as identified by the Chief Scientist. Ousedale Creek (E), Elladale Creek and Simpsons Creek (F), and the primary Koala corridors of the Nepean and Cataract Rivers. The Walker plan puts aside some land for conservation along all these corridors. The only east-west corridor the CPCP identified was Ousedale Creek though it has the most degraded corridor and tightest pinch point where it meets Appin road, the result of a previous Walker development at Appin Valley. The Chief Scientist was also concerned about whether Ousedale Creek - could be properly set aside as a workable koala habitat corridor, noting that its function is dependent on land purchases and restoration that will take an indefinite time to deliver. Their functionality largely depends on their width and contiguity. Unfortunately this has been Walker's continuous Modus Operandi; corridors are continually narrowed and eventually made redundant (See Appin Valley, Macquariedale and South East Wilton). Corridor F too, must have contiguity otherwise the Chief Scientist warns it could act as a Koala Sink (Apr 2020 p55).

2. Koala Corridor Widths: Koala corridor widths and their contiguity are the single most important criteria as to their functionality. This planning proposal provides no dimensions for the width of their Koala corridors, this makes this proposal unassessable. The Department of Planning Conserving Koalas Report that supported the Biocertification of Lendlease Stage 1, also had no figures for corridor widths. This time the department has commissioned a Biosis report referred to in the Cumberland Plain Conservation Plan, this does show widths for areas near the Walker planning proposal.

No minimum corridor width is identified, without a minimum width you have no corridors. The Chief Scientist asks for an average minimum koala corridor width of 390 to 425m (with 30m buffers), that is 390m, and an absolute minimum of 250m. The minimum corridor width identified in numerous studies for this area is about 400m. This is because as Professor Robert Close's reports that looked at Koalas in Campbelltown have also identified they rarely (if ever) have a minimum home range that was less than 400m wide.

The Primary Koala corridor of the Nepean River is too narrow and fractured : It does not align with the Greater Macarthur Interim Plan 2040 which called for a minimum preferred width of 425 metres for primary corridors, that is the east side of the Nepean River, the Chief Scientist called for similar figures (390m + 30m buffers).

Yet along the Nepean River between Ousedale Creek and Elladale Creek the width gets down to 175m and does not go above 290m. See the image adjacent from the Biosis report (p15). This must average at least 390 (+30m buffer) and never go below 250m (+30m buffer). This is not achieved here, and is a bottleneck for Koala movements.

Ousedale Creek : It does not align with the Greater Macarthur Interim Plan 2040 which called for a minimum preferred width of 425 metres for primary corridors, that is the east side of the Nepean River, the Chief Scientist called for similar figures (390m + 30m buffers).

Both figures are of the same area. The Figure left indicates the Walker development footprint, Figure right indicates the Biosis reports Koala widths.

north Appin Precinct area of Walkers, along the Nepean River, in this section the width can never fall below 250m , and it must average 390m (both with buffers this is not happening here. The area between the Canal and Nepean river must be dedicated as a Koala corridor.

north Appin Precinct area of Walkers where Elladale Creek and Ousedale creek are closest, they need to connect so Elladale doesn't become a Koala sink and because there is no guarantee that the bike track will be bought yet, and if so that trees will be big enough, nor that the OUsedale Crossing will be built.

south Appin Precinct area of Walkers, along the Cataract River, this area by and large meets the Chief Scientists Koala corridor requirements.

south Appin Precinct are of Walkers between the Simpson and Elladale Creek, is poor form as that ribbon of urban development is likely to create a dead-end of both Simpson Creek and Elladale Creek and thus opens up a Koala sink that will take its toll on Koala numbers, there are also no dimensions here, so we do not know, what the widths are, another reason the urban ribbon running between them should not be there.

3. Koala Protection Zones inadequate : Zoning, Ownership and Biobanking arrangements are all essential to get right to protect Koala corridors.

Zoning, with a C2 zoning (Conservation zoning) as proposed the Minister can put other activities in this zone, under C2 we can already see drainage basins, riversider reserves, sewage treatment works, and water reservoir infrastructure being allowed, and in fact educational projects could also be placed in these zones. These corridors need a stronger zoning protection of C1 instead.

Ownership is also important, as it currently remains with the developer, the pressure to change the zoning at a later date and possibly sell it off later remains, ownership needs to be invested with the Government or a Trust.

Biobanking, Red Flagged and Offsets. The lack of enforcement of a priority conservation land established to provide a Koala corridor along Allens Creek in South East Wilton, when Walker asked for it to be removed, means that no undertaking by the DPE or Walker to protect or enforce Koala corridors can be taken seriously. All three diagrams illustrate the same area where Allens Creek crosses South East Wilton (bottom right corner)

Greater Macarthur Investigation Area : Biodiversity Assessment Report (Sep. 2015) for NSW DPE by Ecological Australia identified this 'Koala Thumb' as a Priority Conservation Land as did the Cumberland Plain Recovery Plan - diagram above from page 24 .

OEH's Conserving Koalas et al (2019) p30, this Koala thumb is again identified as a Priority vegetation area.

However by the end of 2019, DPE had removed the Priority Conservation Land and zoned the Koala thumb as Urban Development Zone (salmon) at Walker's request. Walker's pressure and DPE's cravenness have made Allens Creek a non functional Koala corridor.

Heritage - provide a large curtilage for the Appin Massacre site and contemporaneous structures in the environs : The Appin Massacre site that the Walker site overlaps is of such significance to Australia's history and as part of our reconciliation, that a much larger curtilage must be provided of a similar magnitude to that put aside to commemorate our early settlers at the Gilead homestead.
